IN FRENCH STATEMENT Paris. July 22.—The French official

"Relative calm prevails along the front. There were some military actions in Artois in the Argonne, between the Muese and Moselle near Eparges and in the forest of Apremont. During the night of the 20 and 21 and the day of the 21 there extremely flerce fighting on the heights at Little Reichackerkopf, west of Muenster in Alvis and the attack was followed by nine German counter attacks. Two battalions of chausseurs held the enemy's troops and inflicted heavy losses upon them We captured and held a trench 150 meters long and maintained all our previous positions. North of Muenster our forces organized the positions they had conquered on the west of La Lingo. In this fighting we took 107 prisoners.

Our aviators dropped eight bombs of 90 and four of 150 millimeters on the station of Autrey to the southwest of Binarville in the Argonne. "In the Dardanelles quiet has pre-vailed since our successes July 12 and 13."





Our prohibition friends have had quite a little to say about Amarillo, but as usual have failed to produce statistics in support of their claims. In order to keep the record straight this committee has secured the figures and present them therewith that the voter may decide for himself whether or not prohibition has been conducive to the progress of Amarillo, whether it has proved economical from the standpoint of expense to the county, or whether it has promoted the moral or educational advantages of that city. These figures were taken from the records and we defy our prohibition friends, here or at Amarillo, to successfully contradict the facts contained therein.

AMARILLO TAX RATES

Prohibition went into effect in Potter county in September, 1911. For that year the county tax rate was 39 cents. This rate was increased in 1914 to 45 cents.

The city tax rate for the city of Amarillo for the years 1909 to 1913 was 65 cents on the hundred dollars valuation. For the year 1914 this rate was increased to \$1.00, notwithstanding the fact that dur additions, viz: Glenwood, Denver leights, Hughes and San Jacinto, have been included in the corporate limits, materially increasing the total valuation from which to derive revenue for the support of the city government.

Does this in the least measure strike you, reader, as in any way a proof that prohibition reduces taxes? But, our pro friends will tell you matters improve with prohibition. Then why was the county

rate higher in 1914 than for any year since 1909? Why was it necessary to increase the city rate three years after the county had voted dry?

JURY COSTS INCURRED BY COUNTY

We ask our prohibition friends of the committee to note especially that for the two years beginning in 1910 the cost to the county for jury fees amounted to \$8,513.00, whereas for the term ending 1912 the total cost was \$13,078.05, showing a remarkable increase in the cost to the tax payer immediately following the adoption of prohibition. While this committee is not advised as to the cause of this increase, it might be charged that it was largely the result of bootlegging and other unlawful practices following prohibition. But we will be more charitable in this respect than the opposition, which would leave the impression that every wrong, and every expense to the county is directly or indirectly traceable to the fact that prohibition does not exist. BUT THAT IS NOT ALL.

JAIL EXPENSE TO COUNTY

· Another striking comparison is afforded in the jail expense in Potter county, which includes the running expenses of the jail, feeding prisoners, etc. In 1910 and 1911 this expense totaled \$2,928.0 in 1911-12, \$4,926.02, while in 1912 and 1912 it was \$3,974.56. Does this increase harmonize with the imaginary calculations of the prohibition committee as to the probable result if prohibition is adopted in this county. If prohibition prevents crime as they would have you believe, and reduces the number of prisoners, the jail menu in Potter county must have been of an extremely tempting nature to have cost so much more than prior to its adoption. And again:

CONDITION OF THE JURY FUND

On October 31st, 1911, one month after prohibition was adopted, the jury fund for Potter county was \$430.84 in the red at the bank. On the morning of July 19th, 1915 this particular fund showed to be overdrawn \$9,293.90. And yet our prohibition friends would try to make you believe that with that theory in practice so many juries will not be required to take care of the business of the courts.

The figures contained in this article were compiled by the auditing force, now at work at the court house in Amarillo, which had only completed its work to and including 1913, as effecting the jury and jail expense.

GENERAL SUMMARY OF CONDITIONS

There has been practically no building in the way of business houses since prohibition went into effect, and you will find fine store buildings that should bring \$150.00 per month, renting for \$50 and occupied by auto salesrooms, etc. The street car system is very poor and not kept up, with a car every half hour, sometimes, and no paving has been constructed since prohibition went into ef-

CONDITION OF WORKING MEN

The fact, as indicated above, that there has been little building under prohibition, is sufficient to demonstrate the effect the change has had on working conditions at that place, but a comparison with Wichita Falls as to the number of carpenters should be most convincing

argument to the laboring man of the unsatisfactory conditions that follow in the wake of prohibition. There is at present only 31 union carpenters in Amarillo, this list including two initiated only this week. In Wichita Falls there is a union membership at present of 93, three times the number in Amarillo.

DO WE WANT TO MAKE THE CHANGE?

Surely in the face of such conditions this people will not permit the imaginary pictures of the prohibitionsts to induce them to vote upon this county a similar state of affairs without the guarantee of a single advantage in connection with the proposed change.

Four speakers offered suggestions as to how to clean up Wichita. More than 200 people left the church perspiring freely after Mayor O. H. Bentley offered a remedy for getting rid of joints in the city.

In answer to the charges that booze is being sold in the city and demands, that it be stopped, the mayor said: "If you people want to help me get rid of the joints and want to assist me in cleaning up the city; dump the beer from your own ice boxes and practice






