The market showed very little feature in the late forenoon and the market gradually sagged off to a net loss of about 2 to 10 points.

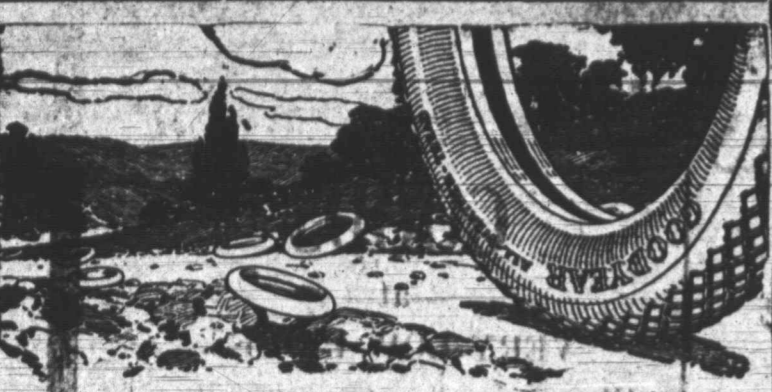

"Gainesville, Texas, July 21, 1915. Dear Bullock: I received your letter just as I was fixing to leave town for a few days, and am sorry I did not have time to secure more names. I could get ten times as many as I am sending if I had the time. I am a stock holder in both of the National Banks here, and while we had saloons here said banks paid ten per cent dividend and now they are paying twelve per cent. Vacant houses are scarce and hard to find and real estate men tell me that their business is better than it was before we had prohibition.

Gainesville is not that dead town that got the Girls Reform School that Patrick Henry declares Wichita Falls could not get because we had saloons. Gainesville is where 300 men are now at work building a big refinery. Gainesville is a town where there are no idle carpenters or brick masons, and where they have no use for a city judge since they have had prohibition but have discharged him. This is that town that had 45 graduates in the public schools this year while Wichita Falls more than twice its size had only 18. And yet the stereotyped cry of the antis is that prohibition will kill the town and hurt business. Carpenters and mechanics have been forced by the scores to leave here in the last year and go to the dry towns, to the country, and other places to hunt work. They say to close the saloons will ruin the laboring man. What has the saloon ever done for him or his family? If he has spent his money there it has robbed him of what should have gone to his wife and children. What has the saloon ever done for the home? What has the saloon ever done for the church? What has it ever done for the community? There can be but one answer, and that is nothing.

THOSE ANTI MEETINGS

The antis have hired the Airdome where they are giving a free vaudeville show. They have preempted the court house yard and have hired a negro band which is occupying the grand stand and discoursing sweet music to an audience, but are they defending their client, the open saloon? Almost every civilized nation today is outlawing the saloon and 19 states in America have driven it from their borders, while 179 counties in Texas have adopted prohibition. Yet a bunch of antis in Wichita Falls say prohibition is a failure. Who is right, a few men here or multiplied thousands elsewhere? We here and now challenge any anti speaker who lives in this county to meet our local speakers in joint debate at any time or place under heaven to discuss this issue. Will they do it?

WAR PREPAREDNESS ROOSEVELT'S THEME

(Continued from Page 2)

Argentina, for example, have already done. They now have universal military service in Argentina. The Argentine army is a great deal more fit to uphold the Monroe doctrine south of the Equator than our army, and in spite of its high average of individual efficiency and because of its lamentable smallness, is fit to uphold the Monroe doctrine north of the Equator."

Drawing to the conclusion of his address, Col. Roosevelt urged in-

creasingly high standards of efficiency in the army and navy. "The navy," he said, "should never be used, as it was so long used in Mexican waters, for a police work of a kind that injures its deterioration as a fighting machine. It should be kept up to the highest pitch of fighting efficiency. It should be kept superior to any possible foe which might attack us within the limits above set forth. "Our regular army should be greatly increased in size and render much more efficiency by yearly maneuvering in mass, as well as practice in other directions. Conditions in Mexico are such that unless the Mexicans themselves come to their senses and unless we are content to see foreign powers undertake the regulation of Mexico, we may ultimately have to intervene. Such intervention would represent not real war but a work of pacification and police. For such a work volunteer soldiers are not well

fit. It should be done exclusively by the regular army. For this purpose there should be a mobile army of over a hundred and thirty thousand men, so that the whole regular army should be about two hundred thousand strong. "In addition I firmly believe that there should be universal military service for our young men on the Swiss model. In Switzerland the boys are trained for their last few years in the public schools and after they graduate from the public schools they serve with the army for four or six months and then for eight or ten days every year for the next ten years. This training and service, so far from hampering the Swiss or Switzerland industrially, has added enormously to the industrial efficiency both of the individuals and of the nation, and to their social efficiency.

"Finally and most important let us remember that there can be no efficient preparedness against war unless we prepare our own souls. If we become soft and flabby physically and mentally, we shall fail. No nation ever amounted to anything if its population was composed of pacifists and goitroons, if its sons did not have the fighting edge, if its women did not feel as the mothers of Washington's continentals felt, as the mothers of the men who followed Grant and Lee felt; men who are not ready to fight for the right are not fit to live in a free democracy. The only women fit to be wives and mothers in a free republic are those who feel that their sons are not sons of theirs unless when their country calls their souls are eager and their feet jubilant to answer the mighty trumpet note which announces that the hearts of men are being sifted out before the judgment seat."

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SUNDAY LAW CANNOT BE CHANGED BY CITY CHARTER.

By Associated Press.
Austin, Tex., July 22.—Attorney General B. P. Looney has rendered a ruling that there is no similarity in the status of the pool-hall law and that of the general statute prohibiting moving picture shows on Sunday; that the court of criminal appeals and not the supreme court has final and exclusive appellate jurisdiction of all criminal cases, and hence, the decision of this court in sustaining the constitutionality of the pool hall law should be followed by all executive officers and the law enforced wherever it has been adopted by the people. The correction of this proposition, the attorney general's opinion holds, is not debatable. As to the law prohibiting Sunday motion picture shows, the opinion holds that it is a general statute, applicable throughout the state, and that no city or town has the authority by the adoption of a new charter, passage of ordinance, by referendum vote, or in any other manner to suspend or repeal the provisions of the general state law.

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
