FRENCH STORMED AND SC. CUPIED MANY TRENCHES

TURK TROOPS ARE DISPIRITED

Their Hesitating Advances Met By Heavily Without Gains

Paris, July 23.—Exploits of the French expeditionary force on the Gallipoli peninsula June 21 and 30 and in the region of Kerezhos Bere holm, has been seized by the Gerare recounted in an official statement man; and taken into Swinmunde. tonight, regarding the operations in the Dardanelles. Dr. Andrews spoke with great ele quence in the advocacy of prohibition at the corner of Blath street and Indiana avenue and although thos who heard him were compelled to stand his audience constantly increased in size as he spoke and few, if any left. He declared that statistics showed the use of liquor decreased a man's efficiency at the rate of 15 per cent a year. "That which takes from man's efficiency is an evil to the man, his family and to the state." Dr. Andrews said. He declared that who statistics showed that a man drank was 31 per cent more liable to drink. He said that 100 per cent more deaths are due each year in the United States to the use of liquor than all the deaths from tuberculosis. They ask you," he said, "to perpetuate a thing that not only renders men inefficient but it is also the greatest curse on the physical constitution of man." He said that 75 per cent of the insanity of the world came through the use of alcoholic drink and charged that 50 per cent of the world's crime was directly traceable to whiskey. Discussing the influence of the saloon in a community Dr. Andrews said that it fostered lawlessness and encourages crime. "It's the headquarters for the criminal." he said. "It's where he goes for his inspiration and encouragement." ... He charged that the open saloon was not only a lawless institution but that it originates and encourages thirst of strong drink. "The saloon;" he said, "is obliged to make as many drinkers as men who drink die each year." He estimated that twenty-five per cent of the adult male population of Wichita Falls were drinkers and that ten per cent of them die each year and that their places at the bars be taken by young men. QUIET PREVAILED TODAY AT BAYONNE, NEW JERSEY





RALSIDE OF PROHBITION

* (Advertisement) Our friends of the prohibition committee consume considerable space in an effort to prove that their theory should be adopted, if for no other reason, that it promotes the morals of a community, but they only cite in support of their contention a few isolated towns, and such proof is not of a nature to be convincing.

This committee has shown from government statistics that prohibition did not only fail to improve the moral condition of Kansas, but that today that state has a greater per centage of crime of all kinds than many states that are wet. Twenty-four states have fewer murderers, nine license states have a lower per centage of prisoners, and sixteen license states have fewer juvenile delinquents in proportion to population. The proportion of paupers is greater than in ten license states and thirty-ore license states have a smaller per cant of divorces. Seventeen license states have a lower insanity rate and forty-one license states have a greater per centage of church members.

These figures are conclusive as to the moral effect of prohibition when applied statewide, but as our friends of the prohibition persuasion have side-stepped with a request for figures nearer at home, we herewith submit the record of Grayson county, a county that has had several years experience with the character of morality promoted by local option, which record is not at all encouraging to that cause.

Here is a record of some of the effects of prohibition in Grayson county:

GRAYSON COURT RECORDS

Of 52 felony convictions had at the term of the District Court just ended, 30 were for pursuing the occupation of liquor dealer in prohibition territory. At this term of court there were returned 160 felony indictments, more than half of which were for this offense. In several of the cases where trials were had and con-

A City to Be Proud and Not to Be Derided.

In the face of the facts contained in the history of those towns that have adopted prohibition, demonstrating that its adoption has at least interferred with further growth, we submit that the splendid record made by Wichita Falls under present conditions should carry weight in the consideration of this matter, and that every voter who expects to continue his residence here should bear in mind that it is to the interest of all to vote to perpetuate the progressive spirit that has made possible these achievements,

Pride in the accomplishments of this people should inspire everyone to strive for greater achievements in the future and none, even our prohibition friends, will seriously contend that there is hope for further development of consequence if prohibition is adopted. Then, why vote for a measure that can furnish nothing but a serious handicap for many years to come? Why support a proposition that means commercial suicide and sounds the death knell to business progress.

From a small village, Wichita Falls has within a comparatively few years, grown to a city far ahead of any town in the state that has been afflicted with prohibition. It has progressed by leaps and bounds, adding new enterprises and increasing in population from year to year, until now it is the envy of other cities with commercial ambition.

In June of this year, in one of the precincts of the county, the justice court bound over 44 men to a sait the action of the grand jury, all being local option cases. In these complaints it was being charged that the goods was being sold at threshing outfits, country stores and elsewhere.

6,583 CRIMINAL CASES

From 1904, when the saloons went out of business, to 1909, when the sale of whiskey was made a felony, 6,583 criminal cases were docketed in the county court alone, half of which were local option cases. Since 1909 there have been docketed in the district court more than 2.100 felony cases, of which it is estimated more than half are local option cases. The number of criminal cases in this county since prohibition is estimated as being three times the number of those for a like period of time prior to its adoption. During the first five years of prohibition in that county one citizen was arrested in more than 270 cases for the illegal sale of whiskey. Every Christmas an order is issued by the court to confiscate all the whiskey on hand and the sheriff's department estimates that more than 600 gallons were confiscated at one time last Christmas. The prosecution of one man for the illegal sale of liquor is estimated to have cost the county more than \$6,000.00.

More than three dozen barrels and boxes of whiskey, captured from bootleggers and confiscated by the federal government, are stored in the basement of the post office building pending the disposition of the

that the record of crime referred to above, involving thousands of witnesses called upon to tell from whom they made their purchase, with the attendant evasions and in many instances perjury, is conducive to better morals?

- And they talk eloquently of Sherman as a splendid school town, a model, moral city with prohibition, and of course tell it in a way to leave the impression that prohibition has made it so. But they do not tell you that these splendid schools, such as Austin College and Kidd-Key College were located there prior to the adoption of prohibition. And they do not tell you that Sherman came near losing both institutions and that in each instance, had such move resulted, the school would have been located in a city that was wet.
