Water Rate Hike On City Agenda July 9

Water is the most important commodity in the Panhandle. Water, or lack of it, is a daily topic of conversation throughout the High, Low, North or South Plains.

What Friona city water customers pay for water will be one of the topics on the Friona City Council agenda Monday, July 9, at 7:30 p.m.

Among other items on the agenda, the council will consider an ordinance of the first reading "providing for an increase in the charges for water services."

increase in the charges for water services."
According to City Manager Paula Wilson, the amendment will seek an increase of the base water rate from \$7.10 to \$10. The base water rate is the amount customers pay for the first 2,000 gallons of water used. The \$7.10 is billed whether or not a customer uses 2,000 gallons. It is the

minimum rate for water customers.

Wilson said the average city water bill usage is 10,000 gallons and research has shown that Friona water rates are among the lowest in the state for cities our size.

She said the increase is necessary because of increased costs associated with water service. Unfunded mandates, i.e. state laws that require city action without funding to accomplish them, are one of the problems.

For example, the state requires cities to collect water samples for lead and copper testing. The state law requires a city to collect 20 samples to send for tests, then bills each city for each test.

State legislators also will begin requiring cities to pay a fee to each underground water district as a production fee. Recently passed Senate

Co. School Districts Benefit From Telecom Assessments

Bovina and Friona school districts have been the recipients of funding supplied through the state telecommunications industry.

According to an article in the July Co-Op Connection newsletter published by West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, the Bovina ISD has received its third grant in 18 months from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board.

The present \$100,000 grants to BISD follows \$50,000 and \$40,000 grants received earlier.

The latest TIF grant funds will be used to develop the distance learning/video conferencing lab within the Bovina school system. Construction of the lab is underway now at the west end of the school administration building.

The distance learning center will permit the school to share its own classes or to receive classes from distant locations. Members of the community will be able to receive classes from WTA&M and Amarillo College.

Evening college classes and GED classes will be made available to the community through the system.

The earlier grants were used to upgrade the school computer labs and place wireless internet access and laptop computers in the school libraries.

Superintendent Michael

Superintendent Michael Downes told the Co-Op Connection, "Our students are gaining the opportunity to use modern technology for researching via the internet, word processing and learning. We want our students to have the opportunity to succeed with the education they receive here. Thanks to TIF, the opportunity to fund this equipment and infrastructures is a reality."

According to Jim Steiert, Co-Op Connection editor, since its inception in 1995 by the 74th state legislature, the TIF Board has awarded grants of nearly \$500 million to public schools, libraries, institutions of higher learning and public, not-for-profit health care facilities.

TIF was designed to collect \$150 million a year from telecommunications utilities, such as WTRT and WT Services, Inc. These telecommunications firms pay assessments from local and long-distance services, mobile ser-vices including trunking, cellular telephone and

paging.

Steiert said that some major telecommunications firms pass the cost of these assessments along to their customers but WTRT and WT Services do not. Both WTRT and WT Services began remitting assessments to TIF in September of 1995.

For the period of September 1995 through June, 2001, WTRT has remitted \$47,241 in TIF assessments sent to the State Comptroller. During the same period WT Services remitted \$50,807.

In addition to the TIF assessments, wT Services cooperates with schools and libraries in the local area through the federal E-rate discount program.


E-rate discounts are targeted at schools and libraries that serve disadvantaged students. The federal program is intended to help schools and libraries with discounts on such items as local and long-distance telephone service and internet access.

The Friona ISD has saved

telephone service and internet access.

The Friona ISD has saved its taxpayers \$51,166 on telecommunications services since obtaining E-rate discounts in January 1999. The Friona Library has realized \$2,569 in savings since July 1999.

Bovina ISD is expected to begin taking advantage of E-rate discounts in the future, according to Steiert.

My Kind of Philanthropist
A headline in the Amarillo
Globe-News said: "Philanthropist
Dies." Carol and I both expected
it to be a Harrington, a
Whittenburg, a Bivins, etc. But
upon reading the first
paragraph, the story told us it
was Caroline Bush Emeny, who
was 91., I was surprised that I
had never heard that name, nor
seen it in print prior to reading the obituary notice. Most
people, if they make a sizable donation to a project, expect to
see their name in a prominent place in the list of "thank
yous." ('Ye Editor may be as guilty as the next person in this
regard).

By today's standard, it was refreshing to read about the projects that Mrs. Emeny had supported--and not only with the needed cash, but by physical means as well, and often took the bull by the horns and led by example.

Her father, William H. Bush, was a pioneer resident of Amarillo, coming to this region in 1880. A son-in-law of Joseph Glidden, he came to the Panhandle to organize the first fencing operation in the state of Texas, and his first project was the Frying Pan Ranch west of what became Amarillo.

Bush was responsible for, among other things, the street

Amarillo.

Bush was responsible for, among other things, the street layout in Amarillo, the first hospital in Amarillo, which is now St. Anthony's; and two schools, Bushland and the old Soncy School. He also designed First Presbyterian Church.

When the committee was formed that created the Amarillo Hospital District, and also the Amarillo Area Foundation, Mrs. Emeny hired and brought to Amarillo a city planner with expertise in hospitals to design what has become the Harrington Regional Medical Center.

When the planner indicated that a good layout required that hospitals be built on high ground, Mrs. Emeny and her sister's estate donated the land on which Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System and Northwest Texas Hospital now stand, as well as the land where the new Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, Amarillo campus is being built.

Much of the layout of power lines west of Amarillo came from her thinking as to how they would be least obstructive to farmers in that area.

She donated land for the Wildcat Bluff Nature Center, and was interested in preserving Palo Duro Canyon.

This silent benefactor helped fund special equipment for Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center; as well as a wheat research facility for Texas A&M Research Station at Bushland, and long-range planning for the Harrington Regional Medical Center. In 1993, she donated 640 acres to establish Wildcat Bluff Nature Center, and as "farewell" contribution, has provided a substantial grant toward the construction of a state-of-the-art performing arts center.

After this lady married, she has lived most of her married life in Cleveland, but has come back to Amarillo on a regular basis, and upon her husband's death, moved back to Amarillo.

Every city needs a philanthropist-supporter-booster like this person. Although she probably wouldn't like it if she were still alive, I'm going to mention her name one more time: Caroline (Carol) Bush Emeny, 1910-2001.







It has bounded from total obscurity to adorn coffee mugs, T-shirts, towels and other souvenirs across America and even some foreign countries.

It is totally fashionable these days to be part of the Prayer of Jabez crowd. I predict that with a little patience, by next summer you will be able to buy your very own Prayer of Jabez coffee mug at a garage sale for a dime.

But for now the Prayer of Jabez is hot.

I was wandering past B-Dalton in the mall at Clovis last week and spotted a display of the prayer books. They shove them out into the mall so you will be sure to see them.

The Jabez books had a bright red 25% discount sticker on the cover, so I figured some discount motivation couldn't hurt me much. A 25% off prayer is bound to be better than no prayer at all.

With the discount it ran about \$6. The little book measures 4 1/2 X 6 1/2 inches. It has 95 pages of large type, each page containing the same number of words you might find on a really nice greeting card.

The official title is "The Prayer of Jabez, Breaking Through to the Blessed Life." It is written by Dr. Bruce Wilkinson, the founder and president of Walk Thru the Bible Ministries which is an international organization dedicated to providing the finest biblical teaching, tools and training.

I had never heard of

finest biblical teaching, tools and training.

I had never heard of Bruce or his organization before.

No matter, I was curious about the apparent flood of good sweeping across America. Last article I read said the book has sold 1.5 million copies. That is phenomenal for a book.

I figure one reason for the success is because it doesn't take long to read and doesn't cost \$24.95. Many people only want a whiff of God. They don't want it to last too long and had rather not pay a lot for it.

The controversial book is

The controversial book is taken from a prayer found in 1 Chronicles, chapter 4, verses 9-10. The book of 1 Chronicles is probably the least read book in the Bible, according to Dr. Wilkinson.

It is the book that "chronicles" the geneaology of the Hebrew tribes. It is the "begat" book. The list in 1 Chronicles contains over 500 names of descendents. Boring to even the bravest of Bible scholars.

A man named Jabez is mentioned only once in the entire Bible, in 1 Chronicles 4:9-10. What Jabez did that has set modern Christians abuzz with excitement is pray for success. He asked for some stuff for himself instead of offering prayers for others and thanks for what he already had. (This assumes that he had some stuff. The Bible doesn't say).

What it does say is that he asked for a larger territory and to be kept from evil and that he may not cause pain. The last line is the clincher: "So God granted him what he requested."

God said okay, you've got it. End of discussion. You wanted it, it's yours.

Dr. Wilkinson says Jabez's prayer proves it is okay to ask for more success and more goods and more of anything you might need to make you happier. He says it is okay to pray for a miracle.

Heck, Oral Roberts has been saying miracles are okay for years. "Something GOOD is going to happen to you." (If you send some money, something really, really good is going to happen).

To me, living the message of the prayer is a lot different than drinking coffee out of a Jabez mug. To some extent, the Prayer of Jabez fad is tied to money too.

Dr. Wilkinson no doubt gets a few shekels for each book, mug or T-shirt sold. It is the same premise as all the money spent for that purple Barney the dinosaur stuff and those never-ending Chicken

Soup books.

According to a page at the back, you can purchase the Prayer of Jabez book in a leather edition, a POJ journal, a POJ devotional book, a POJ book for teens or a POJ gift edition.

The commercialization of a prayer bothers me, mainly because I didn't think of it. I've read the book. I'll discuss more about it later.

In the meantime, I'm

In the meantime, I'm asking God to help me write my own short little book that will sell at least 2 million copies and grant me a buck a copy. Then maybe I won't have to write this silly column every week.

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

Bring Home A Furry Friend, Save A Life

During the summer animal shelters see an increase in the number of animals left at their doors. Families who are busy with vacations, day camps and activities may have underestimated their ability to take care of an animal and resolve to bring the furry friend to a local shelter. While these animal rescue organizations see their share of pooches, cats often outnumber their canine counterparts considerably.

Ready to pounce and play, cats are the No. 1 pet in America. Independent and adaptable to a variety of living spaces, including apartments, they are widely popular because they often do not require as much attention as dogs. In honor of Adopt a Shelter Cat Month, make a trip to your local animal shelter and rescue a cuddly kitten or curious cat from his or her caged residence. If you've decided to bring home a cat as a pet, the ASPCA offers these tips for taking care of your new house mate.

Welcome Home

It is important to give your new family member time to adjust to his or her new surroundings. First, create a safe haven in his or her new environment (i.e. cat bed, plastic carrier with the door removed or cardboard box), perhaps located in a smaller room.

If you have other cats, your new cat needs to be kept apart from them for 10 to 14 days to allow time for a check-up, deworming and neutering. This also allows your new cat and resident cat(s) to get used to each others' scents and presence.

Developing new friendships among multiple cats takes time, even as long as a month.

Feline Safety It is important to keep your new cat safe within the home. Here s how:

*Block off nooks and crannies that are dangerous for cats to explore (i.e. under large appliances, behind furniture in basement crawl

•Remove small sharp objects from the floors and tabletops.

*Tape electrical cords to baseboards and install plug covers on unused outlets.

*Place breakables and plants that are poisonous to cats out of reach (i.e. ivy, philodendron, dracaenas, poinsettias). poinsettias).

*Avoid allowing your cat to run loose outdoors.

*Build a backyard cat enclosure or add a fence topper that will prevent your cat from climbing.

*Have your cat vaccinated if playing outdoors.

*Have your cat wear a safety collar with a tag listing your name and phone number.

Litter Box
Most cats are littler box
trained very easily. The
most important thing to
remember is that cats will not
use a messy or smelly litter
box, so make sure it's cleaned
often.

box, so make sure it's cleaned often.

Training a kitten to use the litter box may take some patience. Show him or her how-to the first few times by rotating his or her shoulders and making his or her paws scratch in the cat litter. Place your kitten in the litter box upon awakening, after meals and just before bed.

Place the litter box in a quiet, accessible location. A bathroom or utility room usually works well. In a bathroom or utility room usually works well. In a multi-level home, one box per floor is recommended. Avoid moving the litter box. If you must move it, do so gradually, moving it a few inches each day so you do not confuse your cat.

Scoop out solids at least once a day. When needed, dump all of the contents into the trash and wash the box with a mild detergent (not ammonia). Dispose of used litter in the trash. Do not flush clay-based litter.

By following a few simple tips and entertaining a little patience, your adopted pet will soon be your best friend.

Some people are so determined to achieve a bronze glow that not even the threat of skin cancer can deter them from seeking the perfect tan. Unfortunately, this devotion to the sun comes at a high price.

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States. One in five Americans will develop a skin cancer in his or her lifetime. The problem is even more serious for those living in Texas and other Sunbelt states, where one in three people will develop the cancer. While most people don't take the disease seriously, it can be deadly. In fact, someone dies of skin cancer every hour.

People of all ethnic groups and skin types who have had considerable sun exposure are at risk for skin cancer.

However, several factors may increase your risk of developing skin cancer:

You always burn or burn easily; you have light skin; you have blond, red, or light brown hair, and blue, green, or gray eyes; you have a history of blistering sunburns in childhood; you notice unusual spots or moles; you have a family history of skin cancer or have previously been diagnosed with skin cancer.

ways to protect yourself from long-term sun damage: Use sunscreen that has at

Use sunscreen that has at least a sun protection factor, or SPF, of 15 and that protects against both types of ultraviolet (UV) rays, UVB and UVA. Not all sunscreens do. Reapply often, especially after swimming or sweating.

Avoid the sun, especially between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., the hours when the sun's ultraviolet rays are the strongest. UV rays can be reflected off sand, water, snow, tile, and buildings.

Wear protective clothing with long sleeves and pants to shield against midday sun exposure.

When you are in the sun, wear a hat with a wide brim to protect your face, head, ears, and neck from damage.

Wear sunglasses, because the sun also causes cataracts. Sunglasses should block 100 percent of UVA and UVB radiation.

Avoid tanning salons, since artificial UV radiation is just as bad for your skin as sunlight.

Review the daily UV

Review the daily UV index - a scale of 0 to 10+ -

before going in the sun. The higher the number, the greater your risk of exposure to UV radiation.

Caught early, most skin cancer is curable. But how do you know if you have it? Watch for new moles on your skin or changes in the size, shape or color of existing moles. If you see any oozing, crusting, or bleeding, or notice any more subtle changes on your skin, contact your physician immediately.

YOUR EYES

Taking Care Of Your Lenses

After you get your soft contact lenses, your eye care specialist will suggest a type of lens care system-a group of products to clean, disinfect and take care of your lenses. Although there are many different products on the market, most lens care systems accomplish four different functions.

*Daily cleaning eliminates debris collected and attached to the lens. These loose fragments of waste can lessen comfort, reduct vision and keep the disinfecting solution from destroying unhealthy microorganisms.

*The disinfectant eliminates microorganisms on the lens such as bacteria, fungi and viruses.

"The disinfectant eliminates microorganisms on the lens such as bacteria, fungi and viruses.

Neutralization is required only when the disinfectant is hydrogen peroxide, which can irritate the eyes. Neutralizers make the hydrogen peroxide harmless by breaking it up into oxygen and water.


Rinsing and storing are usually part of the disinfectant stage. Since most saline solutions do not contain anything to kill microorganisms, they are not recommended for lens storage. Ask your eye care specialist to suggest solutions that will eliminate germs.
