### "WHAT WILL YE DO IN THE END?"

REV. CHAS. CLARK SMITH DISCUSSES THE QUESTION OF FINALS IN SERMON.

### LAW OF CAUSE AND EFFECT

Hearing of This Law on Our Moral and Spiritual Natures Emphasized by Speaker.

The law of cause and effect holds not only in the physical world but in every other realm, this is plainly brought out in Christ's teaching. Rev. Chas. Clark Smith declared in her sermon at the First M. E. Church, corner Seventh and Lamar Sunday night. His subject was "A Question of Finals." His text was from Jer. 5, 31: "What will ye do in the end?" His sermon in part follows:

and to stem the incoming tide of wickedness. Jeremiah was very much alone in his sturdy rebuke of sin and in his calling the people back to righteousness. The priests were generally following the lead of the people instead of leading. The rulers were bent on gaining wealth and power and their own personal sinful gratifications and in it all Jehovah was given little place. In the midst of this condition the prophet Jeremiah lifts his voice and calls attention to the fact that there will be an end to this sort of living. Every course of life has its end and the wise man will be given to considering this end. There are inevitable consequences to every course of living. It is nothing more than the mark of good sense that we consider what the consequences will be. "There are not many laws in God's universe but rather a few laws with diversified application. In nature we have observed what we know as the law of cause and effect. It would be hardly correct to say that this law was ever discovered. It is almost if not quite instinctively embodied within us. The child puts his hand on a hot stove and thereafter has some idea as to the effect of too close contact with heat. We observe some action a few times and always the same result follows and we easily conclude that it will continue to follow. We have formulated the law of cause and effect but God has written it so plainly on the surface of everything with which we have to do that there is no escape from it. Every event has a cause and every cause has a consequence. Everything brings with it a result. The law is universal and holds not

alone in the physical world where we are most familiar with it but it holds as well in any other realm. It is a law of thought. The resultant of a certain thought if nothing more, is a modified brain and a tendency to think that same thought over again. After awhile that thought will ripen into action. We should consider well what the outcome of certain lines of thinking will be. To cherish hatred is to breed the spirit of murder. To feed on lust is to cultivate the principle of licentiousness. This is plainly brought out in Christ's own teaching. "This law then is a challenge to the man who has some desire to live right. It seems perfectly reasonable that we should consider the outcome. Every action has its result. Our lives are largely the sum total of these results. Then why should we be careless about these vital consequences? The business man seeks to the best of his ability to arrive at possible results before he makes a business venture. He knows that there will be some sort of outcome and if the indications are that this outcome will be unfavorable he does not take the venture. Why not be as considerate of moral conditions as of business? "Every thoughtful man will weigh carefully the question of outcome. The man who moves solely or largely by impulse is hardly entitled to be called a man. He is undeveloped and immature. The end resulting from the effort should determine whether we should do that thing. Sometimes we say that consequences are not the highest end. If we limit consequences to the physical this will be true. But we can not with propriety

so limit consequences. The greatest part of man is not the physical. If we believe in a hereafter at all it is a mark of discretion for us to consider what effect, if any, our present day living will have upon that hereafter. Plainly there is an end to this life and with it an end to our mode of living. What are we going to do when the end comes? This is not a mere sentiment but rather it is good sense to consider what we will do in the end. This is what the business man must do. It is no more than any legitimate activity demands and therefore when we turn to religious things we must make the same consideration. We must apply the law of cause and effect here as well as in other realms. "If we attempt to apply this law it will be found to have a bearing in many ways. Here is a young man who is casting about to determine what his life work is to be. He will consider the end not only in dollars but also in life. Not only how much money can he get out of this or that profession but what sort of man will the profession make out of him. One's business should return to him sufficient money to enable him to live well but besides this it should return to him a thoroughly developed character. This law will have a bearing on our attitude toward intellectual development. What is the end of study? The consequences of thinking is character built along the lines of thought. If we desire good character we must think in that direction. It will have a bearing on our social life. Do we desire social life simply for amusement or for other more worthy ends? We need contact with our fellow men in or

der to smooth up the rough places in our natures. Do we seek the sort of social life that will contribute to the making of such character as we really desire? All of these considerations are of very great importance and worthy of our most careful attention. "But there remains the allusive consideration. What shall the end be religiously to our course of living considered as a whole? It will be a success or a failure according as we have lived. We have a desired end in view. We must accept the necessary causes in order to secure that end. What will we do in the end of life? Not what will we want to do but what will we do? We will finish in accord with this law of cause and effect. Certain causes have been moving in our lives and now that the end of causation is at hand and it remains only for the effect to develop we must expect the effect to be in line with the causes which have been at work in our lives. The thing we must all do today as reasonable folk is to ask, "what can I reasonably expect from my way of living? If I can not expect what I really desire then I must change the causes in my life so as to insure that desired resultant. It is a simple principle but one that challenges our manhood. It requires the best there is in us but only thus can we live well."

### DUTCH COLONIAL ARMY

NOW NUMBERS 40,000.

The Hague, Netherlands, Aug. 23.—The constant departure of detachments of troops to fill up gaps in the Dutch Colonial army in Dutch East India calls attention to the fact that Holland possesses a Foreign Legion whose military record does not take second place even to that of the better known Foreign Legion of France. Every year nine or ten detachments of varying strength leave this country—the annual total ranging from 1,000 to 4,000 men. The elements of this legion are the same as those of the French corps, except that Dutchmen serve side by side with foreigners and natives. It has existed a much greater length of time and its fighting qualities have been proved, and are still being proved on many occasions. This is shown by reports just to hand from Borneo, Celebes, Macassar and Ceram, where expeditions against refractory natives are now in progress, involving constant bush fighting and a considerable number of casualties. Originally the Dutch colonial army was formed by Van Diemen in 1637 when he was Governor-General of the Dutch East Indies under the old East India Company. The force then was small, but it has increased constantly ever since until now it totals some 40,000 men. It comprises 16,000 white soldiers, of whom about 50 per cent are Dutchmen, specially enlisted or voluntarily transferred from the home army. The remainder of the white troops consisted of approximately 4,000 Germans, and about 4,000 Danes, Belgians, Frenchmen and other nationalities, interspersed with a few Britons and Americans who have taken service out of love of adventure. The term of enlistment for the men is six years, but many serve two or even three terms. The soldiers are comparatively well paid and after 12 years service, in the tropics (where each year is counted two) are entitled to pensions for life. In all the smaller towns and many agricultural districts of Holland numbers of these pensioners reside when they retire, which they are often enabled to do when only about thirty years old in case they enlist when very young.

### ROOSEVELT SAYS IT'S NOW TIME TO ACT.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 23.—Former President Roosevelt has issued the following statement: "I see suggested in the papers that the German answer to our last note, that is, the sinking of the Arabic by a German submarine and the consequent murder of certain American citizens, will be adequately met by the administration—dismissing Bernstorff and severing diplomatic relations with Germany. I earnestly hope the administration will not take this view, for to do so would be a fresh sacrifice of American honor and interest. "The president's note to Germany in February last was an excellent note if only it had been lived up to. But every subsequent note has represented nothing but weakness and timidity on our side, and the sinking of the Lusitania and of the Arabic, the attacks on the Gulf and Falaba and all the similar incidents that have occurred represent the arrogant answers which this weakness has inspired. Germany will care nothing for the mere severance of diplomatic relations. "The time for words on the part of this nation has long since passed, and it is inconceivable to American citizens who claim to be inheritors of the traditions of Washington and Lincoln that our governmental representatives shall not see that the time for deeds has come. What has just occurred is a fresh and lamentable proof of the unwisdom of our people in not having insisted upon the beginning of active military preparedness thirteen months ago."

### HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT PENSION WOUNDED SOLDIERS.

Budapest, Aug. 23.—The Hungarian government has just announced a scheme of limited pensions for veterans of the war. A cripple totally incapable of work will get \$27.50 a year; if only disabled to a small extent, \$25. A widow is to have \$11.25 a year. It is hoped that it may be possible to increase rates after peace is declared.

The San Francisco Fair has now been running for about eight months, and so far ten million people have passed through the gates.

It is said that since the camp of the United States troops at Texas City was destroyed by the storm the government will seek and find a new location in a different part of the state, and many enterprising Texas cities are preparing to make the government offers.

Tom McClure, known all over the state as the man who served as sheriff of a county in this state during the time never carried a six-shooter, has been made police captain in North Fort Worth to succeed the man who was cut or stabbed to death a few weeks ago.

Governor Ferguson is appealing for aid for those who lost their all in the Galveston storm. In round numbers the property damage is right close to \$50,000,000.

Henry Ford, the great automobile manufacturer, speaks and writes in a very optimistic way regarding the present and future prosperity of the people of the United States.

The governor's mansion is valued at \$10,000. One year, while occupied by Colquitt, the state paid \$12,000 for repairs alone.

In the matter of the right the United States has to sell arms to the nations at war with each other The Outlook has the following to say:

What is both lawful and right, may be inexpedient. Is it expedient for the United States to allow its citizens to sell arms to foreign nations at war?

possibility of war, and the consequent necessity of defensive war exist every country, no matter how devoted to peace it was, would have to keep armed to the teeth; it would mean specifically that the United States would have to deny itself the right to buy arms from other nations in time of war, and therefore would have to prepare at once great stores of ammunition and keep those stores of ammunition not only replenished but also renewed with every advance in the science of warfare.

POLITICAL THUNDER

The activities of Attorney General Looney in the brewery cases has aroused the suspicion that his efforts to enforce an illegal trust are not inspired alone by the desire to enforce the law against such concerns.

"Some of those on the inside have declared that the prosecution of the State's anti-trust suit against the Texas breweries is going to uncover a lot of political snakes and snake-charmers that will have more or less important bearing on future developments in Texas politics.

The proceedings before the special commissioner so far gives color to the suspicion that it is 'snakes' the department is after for use in future political campaigns, rather than a vindication of the State's anti-trust laws.

The Times-Herald is not prepared to join these brethren in their charges of bad faith on the part of the Attorney General. If he had reason to believe that the breweries were or had been violating the law, it was his duty to proceed against them without reference to political effect.
