Evolution of the Coffee Roasting Business

Chapter One—In the early days all coffee was sold green and roasted at home as needed. In those days the coffee was brought to this country largely on sailing vessels and on account of long voyages a great deal of it was damaged by water during storms. The Arbuckle Brothers were engaged in the wholesale grocery business in Pittsburg, Penn., and their business brought them to New York frequently to purchase goods. Being Scotch (a nationality that does not approve of waste) the sight of hugh piles of wet coffee lying on the wharves. sprouting and decaying, suggested to them the idea of roasting this coffee before it completely spoiled and Charles Arbuckle (being of an inventive turn of mind) built the first coffee roaster and they commenced buying and roasting this damaged coffee. This was the commencement of a business that was destined to assume immense proportions and completely revolutionize the entire coffee business.
