Would Internationalize Narrows and Would Remove Tariff Walls as Far as it is Possible to Do So, Leaders of Party Declare

Boston, Mass., Aug. 25 Governor Winfield S. Hammond, of Minnesota, who addressed the Governors Conference here today on "Efficiency and Economy of State Government," said that one reason for the present lock that one reason for the present lack of efficiency was that in effect, most states have several governors instead of one. Enumerating the various have come into being as a part of the executive department of a state administration, he said:

"All this has resulted in giving the fundamental that the executive and the judicial departments shall be independent of each other. If a judge resigns, the governor may appoint hi successor, so if one of these members should resign, the governor could appoint his successor, but he has about as much to do with the policies and work of these bords as he has with the hearing and determination

of cases of law. Little Coordination. "There is little or no co-ordination between these various bodies. Inspec tors, examiners, investigators, and employees of these various governing bodies, busy in the performance of their duties, are traveling over the state, some times several of them de-scending at the same time upon a lit-tic hamiet of two or three hundred inhabitants, where all examinations and investigations for all of the state departments could be done by an able-bodied man in half a day. Salaries and traveling expenses are continual-

ly increasing, while in political cam-paigns the cry for economy goes mer-rily on. "in Minnesota for some time there has been a feeling that there should be a thorough reorganization of these various offices, that they should be included in the executive department. and should be under the control and direction of the executive himself or department officers selected by film. CORPORATIONS MUST TOE THE MARK, SAYS MCKAY

Austin, Texas, Aug. 25.—Strict comof the Texas corporation laws will be required of the 12,000 corporations doing business in Texas, with the commencement of the new fiscal year on September 1, according to announcement just made by Secretary of State John G. McKay. This announcement was the result of a number of corporations failing to pay their franchise taxes by May 1. These delifiquents were penalized on July 1, and some of them have still failed to pay the penalty on the tax and their charter rights are to be forfeited. In the future only one notice is to be sent to each corpora tion and if it fails to heed the warning the penalty will be assessed. There are also certain concerns that have failed to report the final payment of capital stock and also to make other returns required by law. These are also to come under this ruling of the secretary of state.

There are, however, not more than 200 such delinquents at this time.

EVOLUTION OF THE COFFEE ROASTING INDUSTRY

Chapter Two—Seeing the success made by the Arbuckles others began to engage in the business. Levering & Company of Brooklyn being the first to follow and they put on the market the first package roasted coffee. At first only damaged and inferior goods were offered in the roasted state but a demand came for better grades until in a few years practically all coffee was sold roasted. Until very recently coffee was roasted by large concerns in the cities, who sold it to jobbers and wholesalers who in turn sold it to retailers and they resold it to the consumer, and this is the way most of the business is carried on at the present time. As can be readily seen this is a very expensive and roundabout method of distribution, as in order that the coffee may reach the consumer in even tolerable condition it is necessary to put it in a tin can which adds about five and one-half cents per pound to the cost. Again the freight is higher on roasted than green coffees and freight has to be paid in the tin and container as well as the coffee thus adding from one to two cents per pound. The roaster must add about seven cents per pound to cover the cost of advertising, salesmen, office expenses, credit department, etc. The jobber gets from three to four cents and the retailer from five to ten cents, as to grade. These figures refer to the higher priced grades sold in tin cans, cheaper grades and bulks of course being handled at a less expense. (Chapter three will follow in an early issue.)
