## Warriors Of Moleskin Brigade Are Mobilizing

New York, Aug. 21.—With the issuing of mobilization orders for the mole-skin brigades of more than a thousand colleges and schools throughout the country, football leaders are preparing for the greatest gridiron campaign in the history of the sport. Within the next few weeks the initial games of the season will be played and each succeeding Saturday witness a steadily increasing schedule of contests until the crest of the sport is reached late in November and the play declines to the final matches of early December.

According to the official schedule prepared by the rules committee close to 3,000 games will be played by leading college and school teams of the United States between September 18 and December 4.

for the Carlisle Indians play Abright and Bucknell meets Bloomsburg Normal School in the initial games of the autumn on Saturday, September 18. One week later the activity will spread to scores of time-marked fields, for more than one hundred teams play the opening games of their schedules including Harvard, Princeton, Yale, Dartmouth, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Vanderbilt, Oberlin, Colorado, Oregon and many other eastern, western and southern eleven-men.

### NEW MEXICO'S WORST HILL IS UNQUISHED BY A 1916 MAXWELL

Silver City, N. M., Aug. 25.—Ever since the first automobile came to Silver City, motorists have bucked the long and grade of Church Hill, and the town has come out to sympathize. As one after the other failed the belief grew into being that the climb simply couldn't be made.

The stigma of being beaten by the hill thus removed, drivers began seeing how far up their cars would run. In this competition each new car brought to Silver City has always been tried out.

Several months ago Silver City was startled out of its calm by a challenge from a dealer in a widely advertised car. The challenge stated the dealer's desire to post \$100 as soon as any other competitor would do likewise. The two would then repair to Church Hill and the \$300 would pass to the one that could go farthest up the grade.

The boldness of the challenge took Silver City motorists' breath away. Rumor had it that the dealer had based his wager on a secret trial in which he had far exceeded all prior marks.

A week ago J. A. Smith bought a brand new 1916 Maxwell. Smith drove his car for a few days and those who rode with him noted the exhilarating effect that always resulted when he put his foot on the throttle. Then, late one afternoon, he dropped in at the challenger's place of business ascertained that the \$100 proposition still stood, and covered it. The trial was booked for that evening.

Up Church Hill to the alkali that marked the highest climb to date, glided Oakes Charles Buckley, ten double eagles making a merry jingle in a paper pocket. Along the course Silver City lined up—men, women, children and Mexicans. Even money prevailed; the mining element speculated heavily.

By agreement the Maxwell was to make the first trial. Smith took a long start and tore up the first part of the incline in second gear. Just before he hit the sand beds Smith shifted into first. He charged Buckley at a lively gait; Oakes Charles leaped into the mesquite just in time. Then he started in pursuit, yelling like a demon and losing ground at every jump. The Maxwell slowed down at the last sand spot, but carried through to the harder going nearer the top and at the peak was actually carrying his load.

Smith presented his mouth to a start and pushed out the trash, swinging his Stetson to the cheering crowd below. The other car essayed the hill in first gear. It plowed through the lower stretches of sand in good time, but also exceeded the best performance prior to the contest, but began to wobble jerkily in the heavy going nearer the top and stopped with a jerk about half way up the hill. The second car tried at a full tilt, but shot of the feet. An effort to rush the hill on second speed, as the Maxwell had done, resulted in disaster when a quick shift into first was made. Buckley turned the \$300 over to Smith and the Maxwell rolled majestically down, unquestioned champion of the grade.

GOLD POURS INTO FRENCH TREASURY

CALL FOR GOLD BY FINANCE MINISTER MEETS WITH LIBERAL RESPONSE

ALL CLASSES BRINGING IT

Little Children, Venerable Dames, Nervous Peasants, Prosperous Merchants in Line

Paris, Aug. 25.—There have been some remarkable scenes at the Bank of France since Alexander Felix Ribot, the French minister of finance, issued his call for the mobilization of gold.

Children Bring Gold. Hundreds of school children will associate the name of the venerable minister with their first visit to that mysterious and awe-inspiring institution, always so impressively guarded by the handsomely uniformed republican guards.

A man who had spent years collecting hundred-franc gold pieces, and had gotten together a hundred or so consecutive dates, including the serial numbers, brought it to the bank.

The counting of the millions of pieces received would take too long. It would also be too complicated since with the "double Louis" and "double Napoléon" there are "double pieces" in fact, pieces of nearly every nation that coins gold.
