

GEN. CARRANZA DENIES ANY PARTICIPATION IN TROUBLE ON THE BORDER

ORDERS GENERALS TO MAINTAIN A STRICT NEUTRALITY

GEN. NAFFARRATE WANTS TEXAS RANGERS OUT OF IT, SAYS THEY FIRE FIRST AND INVESTIGATE LATER

DENIAL ALSO FROM VILLA

Says No Convention Forces Have Crossed Border or Committed Depredations on American Side—Thinks Bandits are to Blame

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—General Carranza and his commanding general on the Mexican border telegraphed the Carranza agency here today denying that any of his soldiers have taken part in raids on Texas or in trips across the Rio Grande.

"The report," wired General Carranza, "that Generals Nafarrate and Trevino are supporting the Texas movement are absolutely false. The fact that the disturbers may be wearing uniforms similar to those of our soldiers does not indicate any connection between our army and the above mentioned movement as the clothes, hats and shoes used by our troops are the same as those used by the other side of the Rio Grande, for all our equipment has been bought in the United States. I have ordered the commanders on the frontier line to maintain strict neutrality. In order to avoid complications I have withdrawn our detachments from many places in order to avert difficulties."

General Ricart, commander of the Carranza garrison at Nuevo Laredo, also forwarded a long statement denying that his troops took part in the raid. Another denial from General Nafarrate from Matamoros was made public.

VILLA DENIES CONVENTION TROOPS ARE IMPLICATED.

By Associated Press. Washington, Sept. 7.—General Villa's denial that any of his forces participated in the Texas border raids were communicated to the state department by American Consular Agent Carruthers.

"General Villa says that none of the Convention forces have crossed the border nor committed depredations on American soil," Carruthers' message stated. "Villa thinks the raids were committed by bandits or outlaws."

RANGERS SHOOT FIRST INVESTIGATE AFTERWARD

Special to The Times. Brownsville, Texas, Sept. 7.—The most important development Monday was a statement given to American newspapers by General Emiliano P. Nafarrate, the Carranza commander in Matamoros, in which is said among other things, that if he had to deal with the American military authorities alone he could work in harmony, but that if the Texas Rangers continue to work on the river front separately from the soldiers, as he said they now do, they will be causing trouble all the time.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—Mrs. J. Ogden Armour, wife of the millionaire packer today related the story of her struggle last night with two masked and armed robbers who looted the Armour residence of jewelry valued at \$7,500.

Colonel Robert L. Bullard, in command of the American troops, has the best of intentions and I desire to cooperate with him to prevent trouble. We believe that there is a party of outlaws on the Texas side that had been firing at American soldiers and at the same time shooting at Mexican soldiers so as to start a battle between the two. They have taken advantage of the loops made by the

river bends, enabling them to create confusion as to whether the shots first came from the American side or the Mexican side.

Referring to his request to Colonel Bullard Sunday to guarantee safety to Carranza soldiers who wanted to go down to the river to get the body of a dead Carranza lieutenant killed on the bank of the Rio Grande opposite Hidalgo, Texas, General Nafarrate said: "Our soldiers can not approach the border because they will be fired upon and I have given orders for my troops to keep at least three kilometers back from the river. But they have to go to the river sometimes for water when they are in territory where it is not otherwise obtainable."

"If there were a good understanding between the American troops and my troops my men could approach closely to the river and do better patrol work. If we had to deal only with the American military authorities we could work in harmony, but if the Rangers work on the river front separately from the soldiers, as they now do, they will be causing trouble all the time."

General Nafarrate charged that the Rangers were not careful enough to distinguish at whom they were shooting on the Mexican side. Unless the American troops do effective work on the American side, he said, he could not accomplish anything on the Mexican side because of the effect of the incidents in Texas on the sentiments of the Mexican people.

\$75,000 DAMAGE FROM EXPLOSION AT TOPEKA

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 7.—A gas explosion today damaged plate glass windows and business property on Kansas avenue to the amount of \$75,000 and injured one man. The injured man, a negro, was struck by a clothing form dressed in a Paris gown. The explosion was followed by fire which destroyed a clothing store and damaged near-by buildings.

PROMINENT METHODIST DIES AT LONG BEACH

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 7.—Dr. Gross Alexander, editor of the Methodist Review and book editor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died late yesterday at Long Beach, Cal., of apoplexy, according to vivante advices received here today.

GREEK DOCUMENTS ARE SOLD TO BELLIGERENTS

Athens, Sept. 7.—The arrest of two men and a woman charged with trafficking in messages addressed to King Constantine and the general staff of the Greek army by representatives of the belligerents of both sides of the war have caused a sensation. The censor will not permit full details to become known, but it has been established that German and Austrian messages were sent to Russia although many dispatches from the British admiralty are said to be missing. The persons arrested are charged with carrying on a regular trade, selling information impartially to either side.

Map Shows Balkan States Before And After The Treaty Of Bukharest



The dotted section on this map represents the area added to old Serbia under the treaty, signed at Bukharest on August 16, 1913, which ended the conflict among the Balkan powers that followed their way with Turkey. The shaded portions show the territory added to Montenegro, Greece, Bulgaria and Rumania, all being arced out of old Turkey except the slice added to Rumania, which was ceded to her by Bulgaria. The crux of the whole Balkan problem, so far as it concerns the possible participation of the new neutral powers as allies of the quadruple entente, is whether Bulgaria shall receive back all or virtually all of the fragments of Macedonia that were given to Serbia and Greece as a result of the inter-Balkan war. The boundaries of Macedonia can be only loosely defined, but to the westward it stretches nearly to the present Albanian front-

JURY READY FOR TRIAL VOTE CASES

Twelfth Jury Selected at Corpus Christi This Morning—Indictment Read This Afternoon

Corpus Christi, Texas, Sept. 7.—With the selection of Claude McGill of Jim Wells county, a stockman and George Clegg of the same occupation and residence, the jury to try the famous election fraud case in Nueces county is now complete. These two additional jurors were obtained this morning after a short session of the court, completing the panel. Immediately after the jury had been empaneled the district attorney read the indictment to the jury. This document covered sixty typed written pages and required several hours to read.

INVADERS CHECKED AT DVINA

London, Sept. 7.—The immediate objective of the Austro-German campaign in Russia becomes clearer with the growing indications that the invaders need the Baltic port of Riga, not only as a base to press operations in the direction of Petrograd but as winter quarters in case the attempt to reach the Russian capital should be postponed until next spring.

THOUSANDS OF ITALIAN RESERVISTS LEAVING

Between Three and Five Thousand Are Arriving in New York to Sail Each Week

New York, Sept. 7.—Between three thousand and five thousand Italian reservists are arriving in New York from all parts of the United States each week and sailing for Italy to join the army. The steamship Sant'Anna which sailed for Naples today will have 1,600 reservists in her stowage. Another eight hundred will leave tomorrow and about one thousand more Saturday.

RIGA DESIRED BY GERMANS AS BASE FOR WINTER MOVES

Want Port Now in Preparation for Drive on Petrograd When Spring Returns, Advance is Slow

Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is experiencing great difficulty in bridging the portions of the Dvina held by the Germans. The current of the river is too swift for their construction under the Russian artillery fire. As the rainy season comes on it will be more difficult for the invaders to bring up supplies for their advance forces. The urgent need of capturing Riga is indicated in an army order which a Paris newspaper credits to Von Below. The general exhorts his troops to one more great effort to capture the port, making it their winter home preparatory to marching on Petrograd next spring. Along other sections of the eastern front the impetus of the Austro-German rush has been considerably checked. Vienna admits that fierce counter attacks by the Russians have brought the advance along the Galician front almost to a standstill.

SEPTEMBER 16 DATE FOR BIG FALL STYLE SHOW OF WICHITA FALLS MERCHANTS

The Times' plan for a fall style show received the indorsement of the Retail Merchants' Association at a meeting of the directors of that organization this afternoon and Thursday, September 16 was selected as the date. This is somewhat later than was originally intended, but it was decided that on account of so many shipments of goods being held up at Galveston, the date should be as late as possible.

GOLD AND SECURITIES ARRIVE FROM ENGLAND

Portland, Me., Sept. 7.—The value of the gold and securities sent to Halifax yesterday on the fast cruiser, AF-376, which passed through Maine early today on the way to New York to strengthen British credit, is nearly eighty million dollars. The gold consists of 11,650,000 English sovereigns, equivalent to about \$58,500,000 and \$7,350,000 in U. S. coin. The value of bonds is \$14,000,000.

SEPTEMBER 16 DATE FOR BIG FALL STYLE SHOW OF WICHITA FALLS MERCHANTS

The show windows of all the stores will be decorated, and promptly at 7:30 the curtains will be raised and the doors opened for the public. In many stores this will be the occasion for the usual fall opening. This is Wichita Falls' first attempt at a fall opening, but it is planned to set the precedent at this time.

CZAR TAKES PERSONAL COMMAND OF ARMIES

By Associated Press. Paris, September 7.—In a message to President Poincare, Emperor Nicholas announced he had placed himself in command of all the Russian armies.

The message was sent from Tsarkoe Selo, the emperor's residence near Petrograd under date of September 6th. It follows: "Am placing myself today at the head of my valiant armies. I have in my heart, Monsieur President, the most sincere wishes for the greatness of France and the victory of her glorious army. (Signed) 'Nicholas.'"

CARRANZA COMMANDER ISSUES A STATEMENT

Declares No Acts of Banditry or Trouble With American Troops in His Territory

Laredo, Texas, Sept. 7.—General Alfredo Ricart, a Carranza commander at Nuevo Laredo, in a statement today, tells the public that no acts of banditry or trouble with United States troops have occurred in the territory which he controls, lying 140 miles along the border. As an evidence of his desire to lessen the chances of anti-American demonstrations he denied permission to the people to celebrate the recent victory at Sotillo, lest drunkenness might give way to outbursts.

12 REPORTED MISSING IN IOLA, KANSAS FLOOD

Cloudburst and Flood in That Section Maroons Many People in Lowlands About Iola

By Associated Press. Iola, Kan., Sept. 7.—Twelve persons were missing as a result of a cloudburst and flood in this district early this morning. No one is known to have been drowned in this city. Four M. K. & T. Railway section men near Iola were washed from a hand car and took refuge on a crossing sign. The latter was washed away. Every available man was working today trying to rescue people marooned in the lower sections of the city where people could be seen crouching on housetops barely above water. Few boats were available and rafts could not make much progress in the strong current.

MORE SHIPS FLYING AMERICAN FLAGS THAN SINCE 1863

Washington, Sept. 7.—More ships are now flying the American flag in the foreign trade than at any other time since 1863, and the United States is pressing close upon France and Norway as a maritime nation. For the year ended June 30th, according to figures made public at the department of commerce today, there were registered in the foreign trade 2,768 ships, totalling 1,813,775 gross tons, an increase of 363 ships and 737,623 tons for the year.

GAME WARDEN'S HOUSE AT CADDO LAKE IS BURNED

Houston, Tex., Sept. 7.—While the family was at Marshall, the state game warden's residence on Caddo Lake occupied by Deputy Warden Roe, was destroyed by fire at midnight Monday with all contents. Incendiarism was suspected. Roe has been active against illegal fishing. His daughter, Miss Myrtle Roe is in a Marshall hospital, recovering from a pistol wound inflicted by her father.

Increasing Exports From United States To South America

Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—Exports from the United States to South America during recent months show a marked improvement over last year's total for June, 1915, being valued at \$13,744,000, against \$7,875,000 in June, 1914; and for the six months ending with June last, \$60,573,000 in comparison with \$22,568,000 for the first half and \$38,751,000 for the last half of 1914.

Agricultural Experiments

Washington, Sept. 7.—The results of experiments conducted in 1914 on the government experiment farm at San Antonio, Texas, a report of which has just been published by the United States department of agriculture, indicate that Canada field peas and Sudan grass should come into very extensive use in this region in the near future.

Canada Field Peas. Canada field peas have been grown on the experiment farm since the winter 1907-08. They have given such uniformly excellent results that the report already mentioned describes them as the most profitable winter forage crop for San Antonio.

Sudan Grass. The experiments with Sudan grass have now covered four years and the average yield for the past three has been 5.22 tons per acre. Although this is smaller than the average yield for Sudan sorghum grown under similar circumstances, the Sudan grass has been found superior in other respects.

Further experiments are also reported showing the advantages of securing a thick stand of milo to insure a crop of this grain in spite of the ravages of the sorghum midge. The milo was planted in rows different distances apart, and the plants were thinned to different distances in the row.

Tables in the June "Summary of Foreign Commerce" show a few of the more important items making up our export trade with South American countries. Thus in the month of June exports of agricultural implements to Argentina doubled; sales of automobiles to South America as a whole nearly trebled; a ten-fold increase marked the shipments of bituminous coal to that section; a similar gain occurred in exports of steel rails; sales of wire roves from 3 million to nearly 30 million pounds, half of it going to Argentina and a fourth of it to Brazil; leather exports doubled and those of boots and shoes increased in the case of Argentina. Over 2 million pounds of lard went to South America in June, a decline the quantity a year ago.

90,000 AUSTRALIANS ARE NOW UNDER ARMS

Melbourne, Australia.—Everything possible is now being done to get more recruits in Australia—every thing short of conscription itself. There are, after a year of the war, 90,000 Australians under arms, either in the firing line at the Dardanelles or in training camps, but instead of these being any let up in the call for men, the demand for them grows more insistent.

Although the ministry of defense denies that it looks to conscription as a means of determining the fighting strength, the result of this has not been made public. The campaign to enlist volunteers, however, takes on new vigor each day.

Business houses all over Australia are making a rush for young men in their employ to enlist, by either keeping up their pay or promising them their old places if they return; and to induce men—even with dependents—to join the colors, the press is by request of the military authorities printing almost daily the liberal rates of pay for Australians on active service and the pensions which will be paid the disabled and the relatives of such officers and privates as may be killed.

A novel suggestion, offered with the idea of increasing the interest in the ball, is advanced by a well known umpire, who has studied the National Sport in all its angles. He proposes to move the bleachers nearer to the diamond and double the seating capacity of a majority of these stands in the big league parks. According to this authority the secret of baseball's popularity lies in the enthusiasm of the bleacherite. He says: "Modern baseball has crowded the bleacher fan to the far corners of the lot. He is so far removed from the play that he has lost his intimate acquaintance with the player and the game has suffered as a result. In the old days he was the life of the game. He was within speaking distance of both the infield and outfield players and never failed to speak out his opinion of plays both good and bad. His comments keyed the players to their best efforts and they never shirked in their work for they knew that the bleacherite would not spare their feelings if he thought they were not trying their hardest. The bleacher fan carried his enthusiasm with him twenty-four hours a day and was a constant booster for the game and a spur for the players. Baseball needs more fans of this type but little boxes a quarter-of-a-mile from the diamond are not going to develop this much needed class of roofer."

Liverpool, Sept. 7.—The upward trend of steamship values is well maintained especially for tonnage suitable for liner service; the death of such boats, becoming more and more marked, has created a scarcity of available labor into naval shipbuilding and aircraft work here as well as in France, Russia, and Italy, has been complete, and shipbuilders are unable to accept orders for new tonnage with any prospect of making delivery, so that shippers can get almost any price they ask for available boats. The North German Steamer Schleppen which sold at auction in January for 63,000 pounds has just been sold for over 100,000 pounds.
