

THE AEROPLANE STRIKES

TERROR TO THE TULK

This is Attributed to "Blood Memory" of Days When Winged Creatures Devoured Humans

Constantinople, Sept. 13.-Although the Turkish soldier is hardened to artillery, machine-gun and rifle fire, he is still so terrorized by the aeroplane that the mere sight of one sends him to cov-

The fear of the flying machine is due, of course, to the effect of the bombs and darts that are thrown by the aviators, but there are psychologists among the Turkish officers who maintain that the fear of the manbird largely arises from the fact that men still carry the 'bloody memory," as evolutionists call it, of the days when beings were the prey of huge winged creatures.

But the aeroplane bomb has qualities of its own to make it a fearful thing. Unlike the artillery projectiles, it has no trajectural curve, against which over can easily be obtained. In addition, although the scatter area of ither the aeroplane bomb or the steel larts is small, it is the form of a complete circle while the scatter area of the artillery projectile lies almost straightforward of the explision.
