BOLLE WEEVIL RUIN TOP CROP IN ELLIS COUNTY

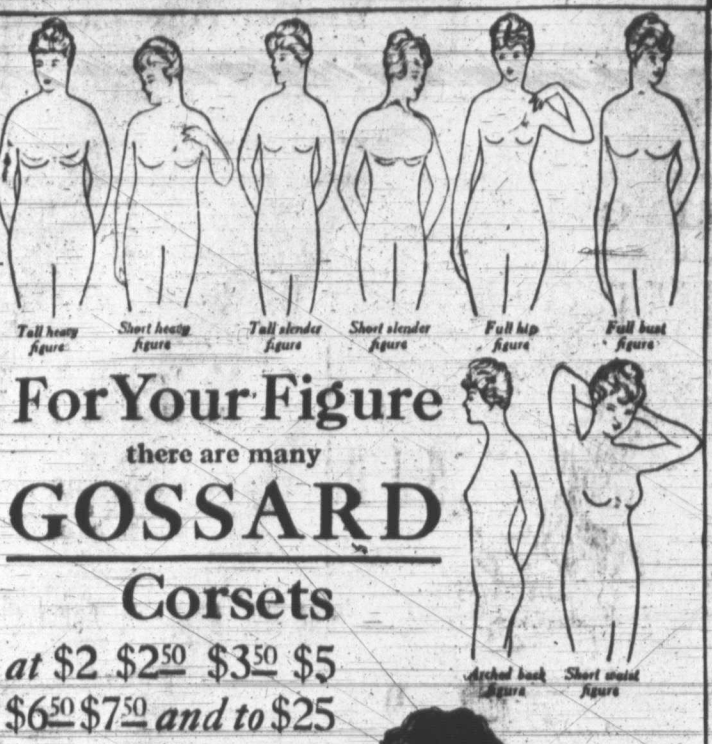

BRITISH PRIZE COURT CONDEMNS FOUR CARGOES

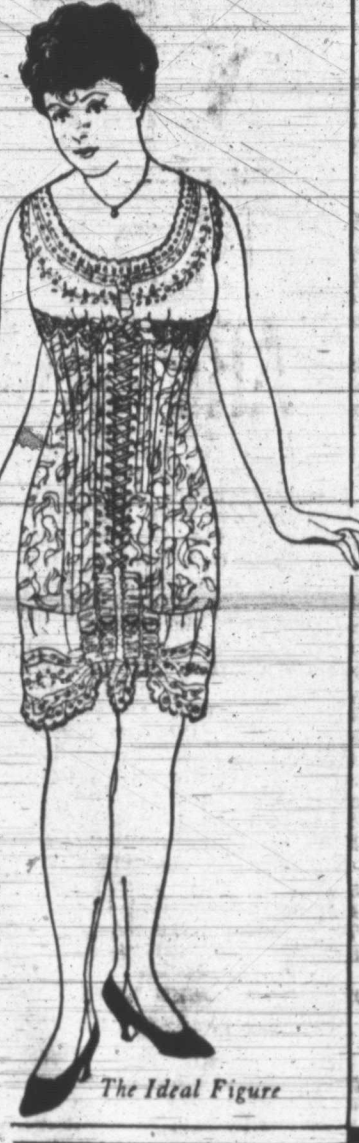

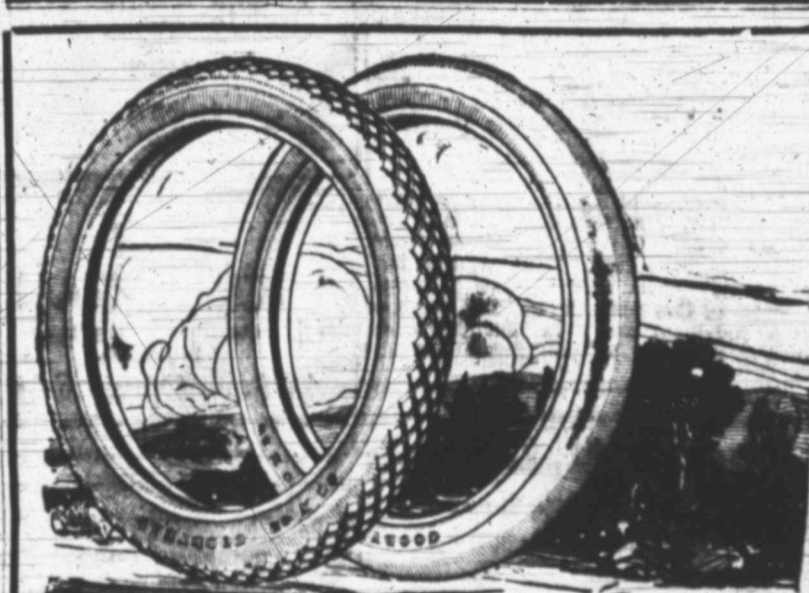

Iron in Water. Iron can be detected in water by taste when there is one-half unit of it to a million units of water; and more than four or five units would make the water unpalatable. In some mineral springs iron is the constituent that gives the water its medicinal value, but ordinarily, says the Youth's Companion, it is undesirable. If more than 25 units in the million are present in the water that the laundress uses for laundering, the clothes will be stained. If more than two or three units in the million are in water that the paper-maker uses, his paper will be stained. The iron made from water that contains iron, is cloudy and discolored. Some Displays For Fall Style Show

FIRE WHISTLE AT 7:30 WILL SIGNAL OPENING OF STYLE SHOW

BRILLIANT DISPLAYS IN ALL LINES OF MERCHANDISE

Some Offerings For Mere Man At The Style Show

It isn't only the women folks who are concerned about the styles these days. While the male contingent perhaps doesn't ever become deeply perturbed over this or that fashion in male duds, it is nevertheless a fact that men folks who want to be well dressed—not necessarily well dressed either—are paying considerable attention to what is, and what is not, deemed the proper thing. And so in inaugurating the movement for a fall style show, The Times asked that everyone understand that it wasn't just a ladies' affair, but that all the styles for all the folks should be displayed. When the curtains go up tonight and the lights go on, it will be seen that mere man is also to be reckoned with when the question of clothes is up for attention. In order that its readers who attend the style show tonight may better understand and appreciate what is being shown in the line of men's attire, The Times this afternoon attempts to present a sort of survey of men's fashions for this fall.

Head Piece Offerings.
 To begin at the top, the hat and the cap present some new features. The principal feature of the hat question is the popularity of the Alpine or fedora lid. This is presented in a variety of colors and styles, but the telescope, so popular in years ago, is not yet ready for the discard. Passing through the hat sections of the shops, one finds a wide range of choice. The Jones-Kennedy store offers some Alpine in oyster gray, with a black band that is in sharp contrast. At the Loeb-Lepold store there are some distinctive shapes, the Alpine styles in lower crowns as well as an assortment of the telescopes that appeals to those who have not gone back on that old stand-by. There are some pleasing shapes in derbies, black and brown, and these are shown to excellent advantage at the Kahn store, which of course has its usual complete line of head-gear of all styles. Some color notes such as African brown and battleship gray are to be seen at the Baum-Gardner store, and the Globe store has a line of derbies and Alpines the latter with heavy corded bands that afford a wide choice. At the McClurken store both the crush and Alpine shapes are in evidence, but the soft hat worn Alpine shape seems to be the favored idea. At the P. B. M. store the line of soft hats is found in variety, with both braided and roll edges and numerous colors, bottle green being a popular choice. At Collier & Hendricks, still further choice may be had, with such shades as London smoke, pearl and dark green, among the most favored selections. The cap, which of course is staple, is this year known as the "tipperary" being a distinctly jockey style affair, with a long bill in checks and plaids. The P. B. M. store has a pleasing array of these.

The Suit Question.
 The suit question is more perplexing. Some will tell the buyer that the English suit which has had such a run for two or three seasons, is no longer quite the thing, while others assert that English suits are still in place No. 1. The sum-and-substance seems to be that there is a tendency away from the so-called English clothes, and that a semi-English style will be popular this year. The P. B. M. store recommends for young men an English effect with a wide soft roll, measuring 29 1/2 inches as the regulation length; for more conservative dressers, a regular three button sack is favored, with the same soft roll and 31 inches as the proper length. Collier & Hendricks have some offerings in browns, grays and plaids that give the buyer a wide choice in styles, with the certainty of excellent appearance. Baum-Gardner have a line of clothing in which the general note is one of roominess with broad openings and in which the English cut is less prominent than in other lines. The Kahn store is displaying a line of browns, greens and grays, in which the English cut is still favored and which are already proving quite popular. Some suits of a semi-military effect, with a high waist line and a variety of lapels are included in the suit assortment at the McClurken store.

In brief, the suit question is one to be answered by the individual likes or dislikes of the wearer, with nothing in the way of a fast rule dictated by fashion this fall. The "Haber-dashes" a magazine which is considered an authority on fashions, does not describe the suits as being either English or non-English, although it mentions that since the war began, clothes of a distinctive American note are coming more and more to command attention, not only in this country, but abroad.

Overcoats.
 In overcoats, there are several offerings. The balmaccan, the rather short coat with a flare effect that became very popular last year, is still in evidence this year, but in modified form. There is suggested a trim, quite dressy affair, rather close fitting about the chest, either single or double breasted, with three buttons, only two of which are supposed to be in use. And of course the regulation old style overcoat still has its devotees, with some done in chinchilla that look very comfortable and stiff. The man who is particular about his shirts will be wearing the stripe effects this fall. The starched cuff, which has heretofore been considered rather nice for fall wear, is in evidence this year, and the Globe store has a display of them that looks quite inviting. The Jones-Kennedy store has some shirts in which the broad stripe is featured, with a heavy band edge cuff.

Neckwear.
 Neckwear demands nothing very new or very startling. There is a classy new collar, called the "Gothic" in which the opening is shaped somewhat like a Gothic window, and this promises to be much in demand for fall and winter wear. In neck ties

the main feature seems to be the wide ends, and there is no end to the styles, combinations and colors that are offered. The Globe store shows some with embroidered butterfly and clover designs as well as a novel bat wing tie with colored wings. Ties that sell for 50 cents and a dollar are made with the slip easy scarf arrangement that causes less conflict with the rear collar button.

Shoes.
 In shops the fustiest thing is the cloth top English effect. The McClurken store offers some varieties of this, higher in the heel and arch than the straight English shoe, and with three laces replacing the eyelets at the top. At Collier & Hendricks there are some cloth top shoes, the black shoes having "London smoke" tops and the tan shoes having brown uppers. The new store of Messrs. Baum & Gardner offers some interesting varieties and the Kahn store has a line of shoes in which both the new cloth top and the old style shoe are offered in profusion of style and shape.

In boys' clothing most dealers are offering two pairs of pants, an idea which seems to be meeting with favor and which is based upon wisdom.

ANCIENT SEA ONCE COVERED PART OF WICHITA COUNTY

Many million years ago, long before the birth of the Rocky Mountains, a large inland sea spread over the western and central parts of North America. The shore traces of this sea may be found in the northern and western portions of Wichita county. These evidences were discussed in a bulletin prepared by the bureau of economic geology of the University of Texas several years ago.

In geologic language the invasion of this sea occurred in Mississippian time—a period just preceding the one in which the bituminous and anthracite coal beds that extend over portions of central and eastern North America were formed. This sea covered much of the present site of the Rocky Mountains area, the central plains, and at times a part of the Great Plains in the United States. At different times it opened into the Arctic Ocean on the north, the Pacific on the south, and probably, the Gulf of Mexico on the southeast.

This incursion of salt water was not the first or the last to invade the American continent. At each incursion muddy, sandy or limy deposits mixed with sea shells and other animal remains were laid down along the beach and upon the sea floor. Strange as it may seem, most of these rocks formed ages ago now stand above sea level and constitute plains, plateaus and even mountains.

Animal life was very abundant in this Mississippian sea. Nearly if not all the classes of animals now living were present. Sharks and fishes, though different in appearance from the present forms swarmed along the shore or swam the deep. Sea lilies or crinoids, animals built on the same general plan as the starfish but having a calcareous cup with an attached stem, decorated the sea floor. Sea shells belonging to the same class as the oysters and snails were there. The lamp shells, or more technically speaking the brachiopods, resembling butterflies, mingled with a corkscrew like sea net. Other forms, minute and large, figured in this life and have been wonderfully well preserved to the present time. Finally the sea bottom began to rise and at length it emerged; the waters withdrew to the deep basins, and land life was substituted for marine.

Bulletin 595, written by G. H. Girty and just published by the United States geological survey, describes the fossil shells of animals living at one time in this ancient sea in the vicinity of Batesville, Ark. The rocks—known as the Boone chert—formerly had been placed with the Boone limestone but the author in this report has separated the two and classified the Boone chert as a distinct formation. Contact with contiguous formations, correlations with non-adjacent chert beds, lithology and faunal character are considered in the discussion. The bulletin is a technical description and is of interest to those investigating the paleontology of the Paleozoic rocks and the geology of the Mississippi Valley.

BRITISH PRESS SKEPTICAL ABOUT SUCCESS OF LOAN

London, September 14.—The British press receives skeptically the reports from New York of efforts of the Anglo-French financial commission to establish a billion-dollar credit on behalf of the allies.

"A good deal of water is likely to flow under the Brooklyn Bridge before any such proposal can become practicable," says the Times.

The Morning Post considers the commission has not yet had to arrange any definite plan, but it is not surprised at the amount mentioned.

"We believe," says the Post, "that these large credits will have to be supplemented by good many other measures, such as more gold shipments, further sales of American securities and the attracting of American capital to this country for investments."

"The credit must be made on a large scale on the assumption that the war will last a long time."

The mistakes are mostly attributable to the delivery companies, who are entrusted with the handling between the tailor house and the customer.

Your social standing may be established and maintained by your clothes-line. The neighbors are largely conversant with your mental development through the medium of what the clothes-line reveals when you hang all your clothes on it on wash day.

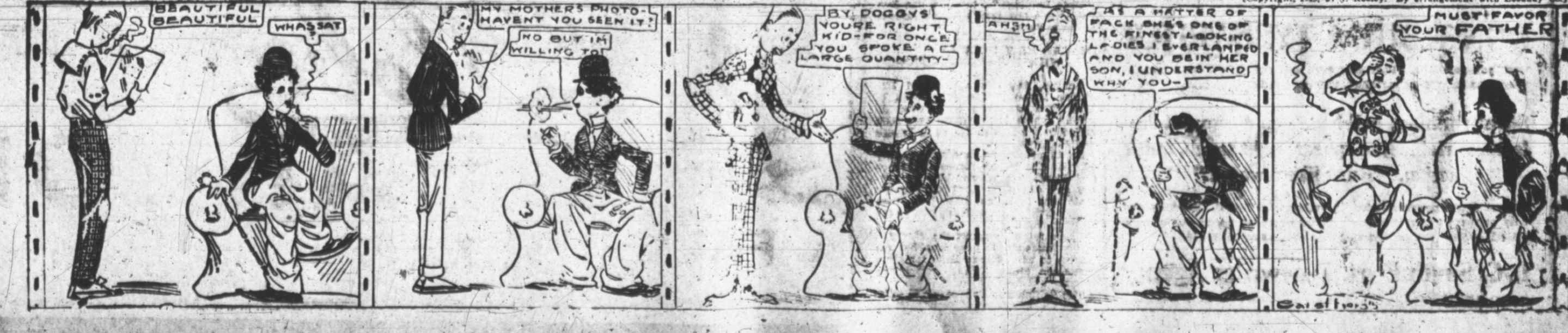

(Austin American.) According to friends of Governor James E. Ferguson, his choice for president of the University of Texas is Dr. L. M. Keasbey, professor of Institutional History.

When the board of regents meets on October 22, the selection of a permanent president probably will be made.

It is said that two members of the Board of Regents may advocate former President Mezes as a compromise between Dr. Battle and Dr. Keasbey.

BRITISH NOW HOLD 50 MILES OF FRONT IN FRANCE

London, September 16.—Lord Kitchener announced in the House of Lords this afternoon that eleven divisions (about 220,000 men) have been added to the British forces in France and Flanders.

Lord Landsdowne announced on July 12 that the British forces in France and Flanders numbered between 440,000 and 460,000.

The British now hold about 50 miles of the 400-mile front of France, Flanders and Alsace, their lines extending to a point south of Arras.
