

The association indorses the policies the United States and expresses its willingness to respond to any call in defense of the American flag. The proclamation reads in parti

"The time has come for former sub ects of the Austro-Hungarian Govern nent to emphatically and unequivocal y declare that they are utterly oppos ed to the Austrian Government in its lemand for an embargo upon the ship that the threat alleged to have been nade as to the mobilization of form er Austrian subjects and Austrian residents of the United States is the sheerest sort of insolence and impulence.

"When the Austro-Hungarian authrities speak of the mobilization of their former citizens living in the United States they wilfully close their yes to the fact that the majority of he Austro-Hungarian population is enirely out of sympathy with the desires 1 such Government and with German lesires. The Bohemian (Czechs) i un ortuntely enough, are still under the ron heel of the Austro-Hungarian ab solutism, but they are not in sympa hy with the aims of these Govern ments in the present war, and the American citizens of Bohemian extraction are only too glad to have severad all ties that have ever bound them to the Austrian Government."

BRITISH NOW HOLD 50 MILES OF FRONT IN FRANCE

London, September 16 .- Lord Kit chener announced in the House of Lords this afternoon that eleven di-visions (about 220,000 men) have been added to the British forces in France

and Flanders. Lord Landsdowne announced on July 13 that the Britsh forces in France and Flanders numbered between 440. 000 and 460,000. Lord Kitchener's statement indicates that less than 700,000 British soldiers are now in the western front.

These reinforcements, the War Sec-retary announced, have enabled the British to extend their lines for about British to extend their lines for about seventeen miles, taking ovr trachs formrly hid by th Frach. The British now hold about 50 miles of the 400-mile front of France, Flatid-ers and Alsace, their lines extending to a point south of Arras.
