

NO ANSWER BY BULGARIA TO ULTIMATUM IS RECEIVED

Time Limit Expires Today--Considered Certain She Will Side With Turco-Teutonic Allies

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 5.—Whether by delay in telegraphic communications or by some other unexplained cause, Bulgaria has obtained an additional 24 hours in which to decide her course.

The Petrograd dispatch making the explanation reached London this forenoon, too late to comment in the first editions of the newspapers.

An Athens dispatch to a London newspaper declares that Greece was obliged to raise a "formal protest" against the landing of allied troops at Saloniki, where French and British forces are reported to have been put ashore because under the Greek constitution special legislation was necessary to sanction the landing of foreign troops.

Roumania according to her premier, who is thus quoted in Italian newspapers will maintain neutrality for the time at least.

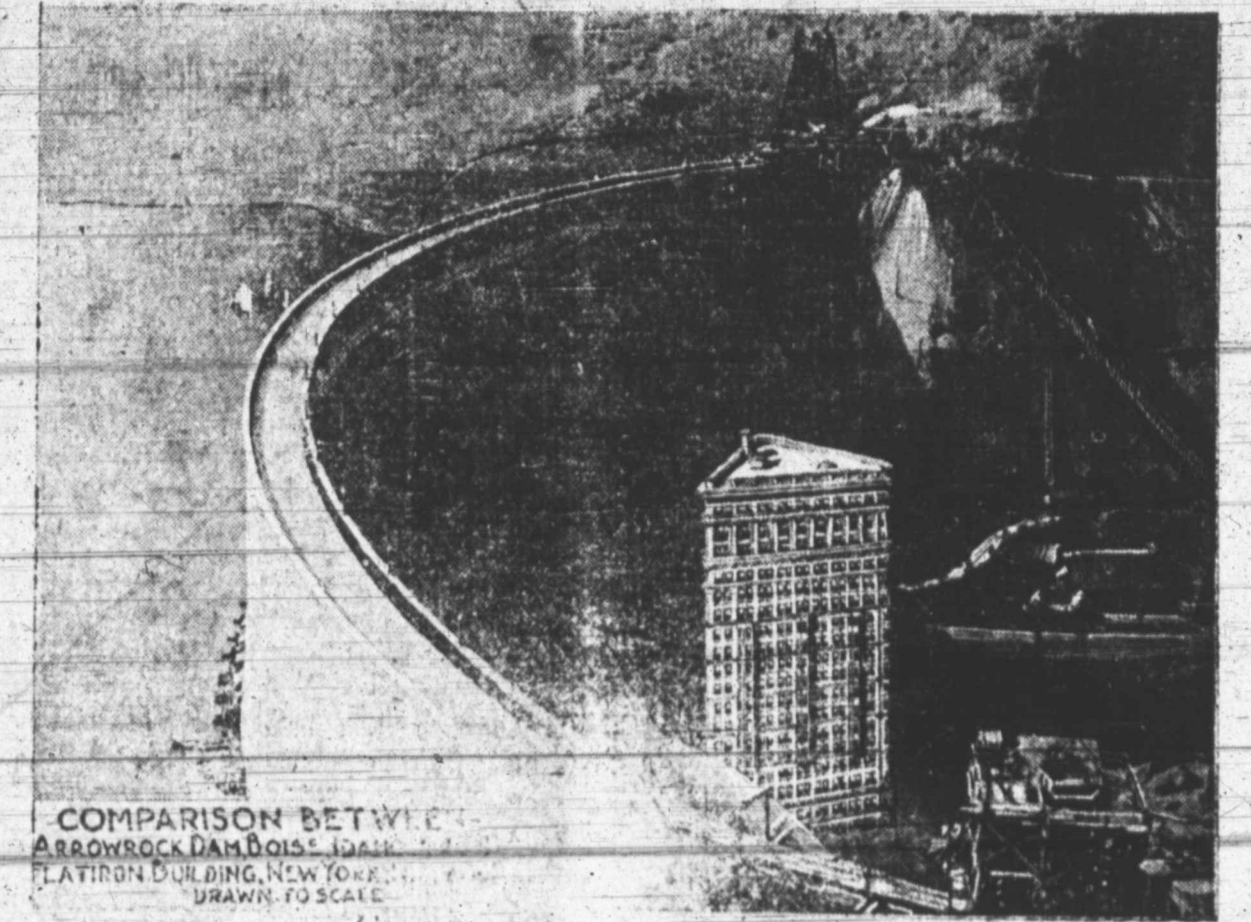

## PEOPLE MAINTAIN MENTAL BALANCE

REFUSE TO BECOME ALARMED OVER INTERNATIONAL SITUATION—PROGRESS STEADY

### MONTHLY BUSINESS LETTER

National Bank of Commerce Issues a Letter on Business Situation Over the Country.

"In the face of grave international problems and complicated business conditions without precedent, the country continues to progress steadily and the people of the United States refuse to become alarmed or to lose their mental balance," says the monthly business letter of the National Bank of Commerce for October just issued. Continuing the letter says:

"One result of the common sense policy of attending strictly to business is indicated by the figures recently made public by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce covering the exports of the world for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915. For the first time in history, the United States leads the entire world in exports, the United Kingdom taking second place. While, of course, when hostilities cease in Europe our exports in certain lines will be materially affected, yet a distinct part of the increase during the past year is on a firm and permanent basis and with care and energy on the part of our business men our export trade should continue to lead the world.

**World's Merchant Tonnage.** Few industries have suffered more acutely through the war than merchant shipping and it is therefore interesting to note that in spite of all drawbacks, the world's merchant tonnage during the eleven months since July 1, 1914 increased over one hundred and seventy-two thousand tons.

"The largest increase was under the American flag and amounted to over half a million tons or about four times our average annual increase for the past ten years. Practically all of this increase is due to the transferring of vessels to American registry under the ship registry act of August, 1914.

"British tonnage for the year increased two hundred and thirty thousand tons as compared with an average annual increase of over four hundred thousand tons for the past ten years. As was to be expected, German tonnage shows an enormous loss each month being in excess of seven hundred and fifty thousand tons as compared with an average ten year annual increase of one hundred and eighty-nine thousand tons. The world's total tonnage is now 49,261,769 tons as compared with 49,089,552 tons in 1914. These figures cover vessels of one hundred tons or over.

**Trade With South America.** The trade of the United States with South America is showing a marked improvement, particularly in exports from the United States. It is a peculiar fact that during the first half year of the war period, exports from this country to the South American continent showed a marked decline, but in the more recent months a wonderful improvement has taken place, and starting with March each month shows a material gain over the corresponding period of last year.

"With continued intelligent effort on the part of American export and financial houses, our exports in this part of the world should continue to increase steadily month by month. The shortage in shipping facilities is being overcome and the outlook for trade with South America is distinctly bright.

**The Public Domain.** "The day of the settler is far from being past in this country. The general land office of the United States in its annual report shows that during the past fiscal year nearly eleven and a quarter million acres of land were eliminated from the public domain by homestead and other entries and sales to individuals.

"There still remain, however, close upon two hundred and eighty million acres unappropriated and unreserved, and in addition to this enormous area there are approximately three hundred million acres in Alaska which will be available to American citizens. There is, therefore, no immediate danger of any overcrowding or lack of land in the United States.

"The United States is at once the greatest producer, exporter and consumer of tobacco. Our production of leaf of all sorts averages over a billion pounds a year, having a value of about \$100,000,000. During normal years about one-third of the crop is exported, exceeding in value the exports of such items as cotton manufactures, electrical machinery, leather and leather manufactures.

"The war has had the effect of eliminating the trade temporarily as the sale of unmanufactured leaf has suffered most, because it is practically impossible to ship to some of the belligerents and in the second place the shortage of labor in the factories of other countries prevents the usual supply being handled.

"In the actual war zone, the enormous increase in consumption of tobacco by the men in the field is one of the most interesting features of the situation, though it does not, of course by any means offset the general decrease due to other causes.

**Nation Wide Saving.** "The example of Governor Foris of Michigan in designating the first Sunday in September as a day in

which the gospel of saving shall be preached is likely to be followed in other parts of the country. The governor's idea is that every year on this Sunday, clergymen, teachers and others interested in church work, make a special effort to inspire youth with an appreciation of the value of the habits of thrift.

"The lack of thrift among American youth," says the proclamation, "is an alarming symptom. Thrift does not mean stinginess, nor does it mean undue regard for the dollar. Habits of thrift in youth would largely do away with the demand for old age pensions. Thrift is really a practical form of patriotism. This nation, in order to maintain its high position in civilization needs to train American youth to habits of thrift. With thrift other desirable habits are invariably associated.

**Concerning Alaska.** "Alaska was bought from Russia in 1867 for \$7,200,000 in gold. Since that date Alaska has produced over a quarter of a billion dollars worth of gold, two hundred millions worth of fish, sixty-five millions of furs, twenty millions of copper, five million of animal oils and sufficient of other materials to bring here total output during the past half century to considerably over half a billion dollars.

"It must be remembered that this has been done with a very small population and entirely inadequate transportation facilities. With the new government railroad construction and the general development of the territory it is safe to predict that the wonderful past will be followed by a far more wonderful future."

NEW WAREHOUSE LAW HAS TEST IN HIGHER COURT

Winners of State Have Case at Austin on Writ of Habeas Corpus To Test the Law.

Austin, Tex., Oct. 5.—The taking of oral testimony in a habeas corpus case was the unusual proceeding Monday in the Court of Criminal Appeals when a hearing was begun of what is to be the testing out of the validity of the permanent warehouse law of Texas, the outcome of which will be watched with interest by merchants, farmers, cottonseed oil men, ginners, bankers and warehousemen throughout the State.

The style of the case is ex parte Debnay White, from Smith county. White is secretary of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association and the owner of a number of gins. He was arrested at Tyler on a charge of violating the provision of the permanent warehouse act requiring the taking of three samples of cotton by ginners. He sued out a writ of habeas corpus direct to the Court of Criminal Appeals, thereby making it an original case.

In the brief filed by relator the constitutionality of the permanent warehouse law is attacked on two grounds.

Proposal Conditioned on Her Siding With Allies is Nullified Says London Report

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 5.—Authoritative confirmation was obtained today of the statement that the offer of the entente powers to Bulgaria conditioned on her adhesion to the allies in the war had been withdrawn.

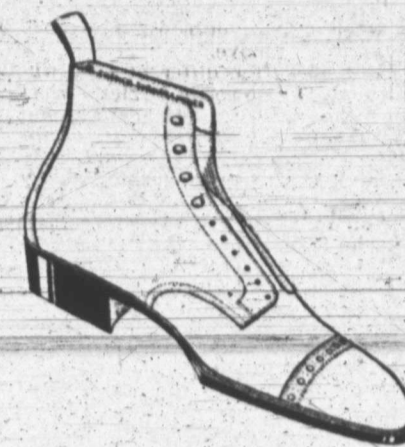

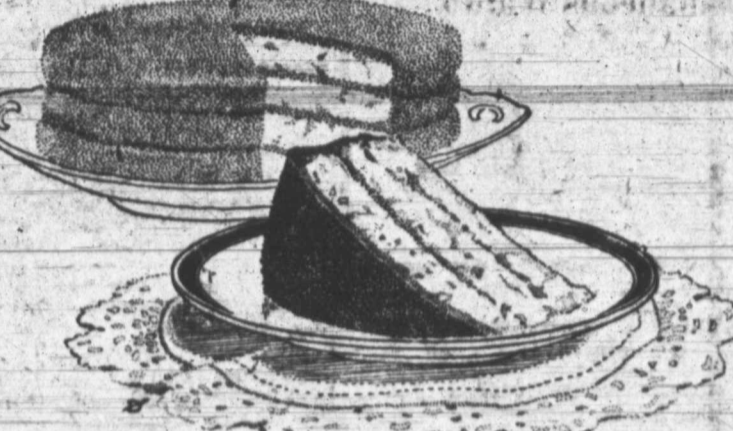
The two white women who made the complaints left town immediately after doing so and it is doubtful whether they can be found to appear as witnesses.

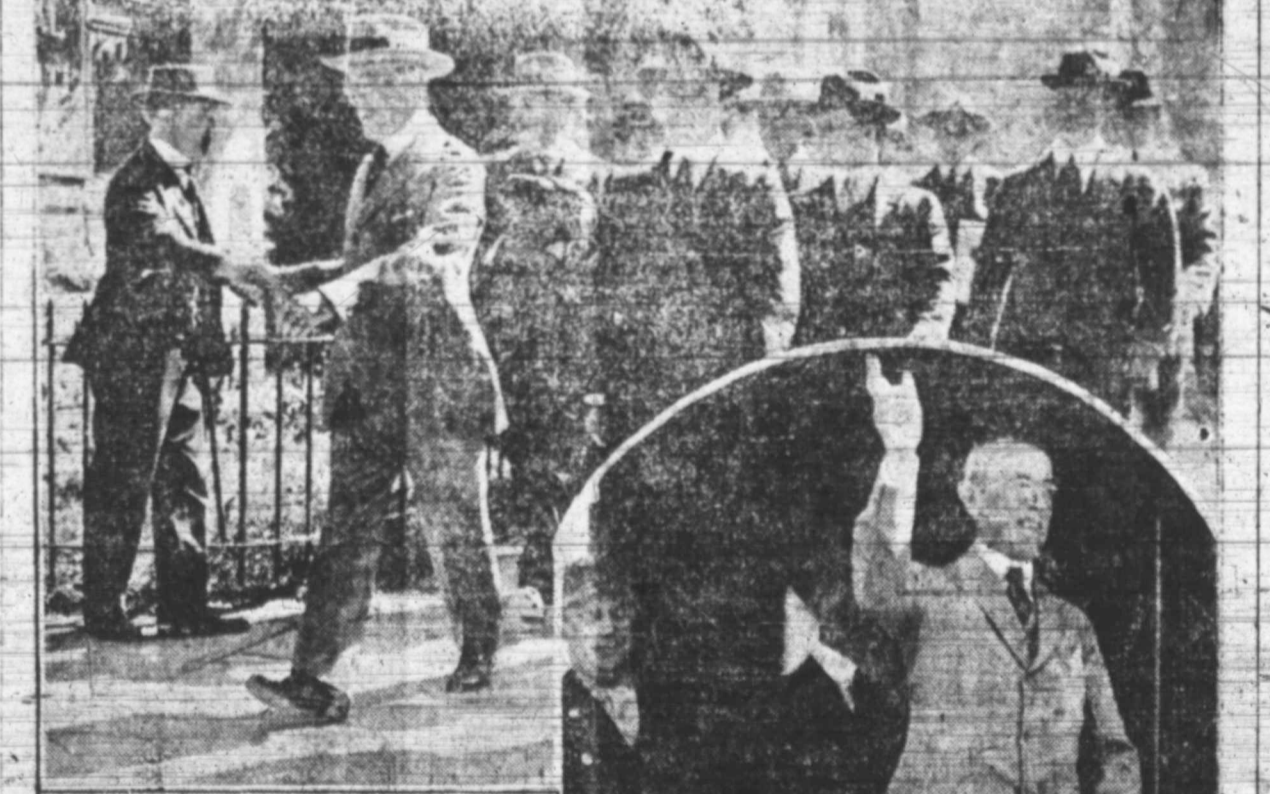
