

GIVE WICHITA FALLS 11,499, FIG-URED ON INCREASE FROM

### BASED ON OBSERVATION

Texas Total, Figured Out By Arith-metical Progression, Is Now Placed at 4,343,710

Figuring population on an "arith netical basis" the census bureau es timates that Wichita Falls now has 11.499 inhabitants. The estimate is ot based upon any actual calculaita Falls, but upon the percentage of increase from 1900 to 1910. By figuring the population of Abilene and Amarillo by the same arithmeti cal process, the bureau's figures show both those cities with a larger popu lation in 1915 than Wichita Falls, though it is generally conceded that an actual count would show them considerably smaller.

In the same way, San Antonio is estimated to be still a larger city than Dallas, though there is little question that the North Texas eit; has far outstripped the Alamo city The bureau assumes that the annua decrease is one-tenth, approximately parison of the 1900 and 1910 census; the increase for five years

As a matter of fact there can be little doubt that Wichita Falls has 15,000 inhabitants at present. If the school census and other reasonably accurate means of calculation are considered, the present population is

In view of the fact that some cities have gained much more rapidly since 1910 than in the period from 1900 to 1910, the figures given out by the census bureau can hardly be considered as true indications of the popu-The arithmetical process gives Amarillo a population of over 17,000 which is rather an extravagant estimate.

The figures for Texas cities are set forth in a Washington dispatch to the Dallas News, as follows: Texas has gained more in popula

ion during the five year period end ing July, 1915 in proportion to the 1910 population than has the State 614. The estimate of population as of July 1 of this year gave New York 10,086,568 and Texas 4,343,710 thus giving Texas a gain of 447,168 and New York a gain of 872,954.
