VILLA WITHDRAWS ARMY TWELVE MILES SOUTHWEST: IS SHORT OF AMMUNIT

ANOTHER FAILURE ATTENDS EFFORT TO

OUT OF WATER AND SUPPLIES

Not Understood By American Army Observers—No New Attack Expected at Present Time

Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 3.—Gen. Villa treasurer for the fund and a number forced by hunger, thirst and scanty of subscribers have already paid in supply of ammunition to abandon his plans for an immediate assault on the strongly entrenched city of Agua Prieta commenced withdrawing his army today and shortly after 9 o'clock most of his force was moving towards Anacacahi Pass, tweive miles southwest.

It is his apparent intention to reach water which is plentiful farther southwest and provision his hun-gry men. Gen. Mendez with about 1500 men had been holding the past for several days and will remain there guarding the entrance to the valley for the return of Villa.

Meantime, it is said, heavy supplies of ammunition will reach Villa from the east. That Villa's intentions temporarily to withdraw his forces from the vicinity of Agua Prieta was sudden, was shown by the fact that his men in command of rapid fire guns on the right wing took nothing but their guns with them. American army officers are somewhat mystified at this movement.

Villa dead left on the field 336. Two hundred were counted lywest of Agua Prieta and 136 to the east. Carranza deaths were 25 soldiers killed and 70 wounded.

FORCES LANDING MAY PROVE MENACE

ING OUTFLANKED IS PRESENT.

Russia Reports Germany is With drawing Men from Eastern Front-One Dispatch Says Serbians Almost Surrounded

London, Nov. 3.—The landing of French troops at Kavela on the Greek voast is reported in a Sofia telegram to Berlin and although this news is unconfirmed it seems a likely sequel to yesterday's information that British and French transports have been sighted off this Greek port. Whether these forces will be able to con-nect speedelly enough with the other troops to form a line against the Bul-garians from Hripolak to Strumitsa to relieve the pressure there and by a possible flank attack threaten the rear of the Bulgarian forces is admittedly problematical. But the appearance of these fresh troops in the Balkans is regarded in London as the gratifying materialization of Premier Asquith's positive announcement terday that the independence of Ser-bla was one of the essential projects of the war and that Great Britain and France were in agreement re-garding the means whereby this end might be attained.

With the exception with this re-ported landing of troops the Balkan situation today presents little beside conflicting rumors including that Monastir is laiready in Bulgaria's hands and that the Serbians are almost surrounded by the Austrians, Germans and Bulgarians and are re-treating to their last position in the Albanian mountains. 




