ASKED THAT MERCY BE SHOWN MISS CAVELL, BUT NO DIS-COURTESY SHOWN

EMBARRASSED BY PUBLICITY

Washington Officials, However, Do Not Believe Ministers Usefulness Has Been Impaired

Washington, D. C., Nov. 3.—Brand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium, has transmitted a lengthy report to the United States government reviewing in detail the steps taken by him and the members of his legation staff in connection with the execution by the German military authorities of Miss Edith Cavell, a British nurse.

The minister declares that reports made by him on the subject consisted merely of a recital of facts without expression of opinion and that he had submitted them to Ambassador Page at London for his information, but not for publication.

Publication of the letters, Whitlock says, greatly embarrassed him in Brussels with the German authorities, although he adds that the latter now seem satisfied with his explanation.

Referring to reports from London that there was evidence of bad faith on the part of the German authorities before the execution of Miss Cavell took place, the minister says the legation officially received no pledge or promise that it would be kept informed of the disposition of the case.

It was made clear today that some of the reports on the subject had been referred to the state department here before they were made public and that the United States obtained its first information of the incident through the press reports.

SAYS COLONIES ABSOLUTE NECESSITY FOR GERMANY

Berlin Official Predicts Passing of England's Overseas Domain In Near Future

By Associated Press. Budapest, Hungary, Nov. 3.—The political and economic position of Germany makes a great overseas colonial empire an absolute necessity, declares Herr Solff, the German minister of colonies, in an interview with the correspondent of Azeet.

"It is necessary for us not only to maintain our previous colonial possessions, but even to increase them, irrespective of the European issues and of the settlement in Europe after the war.

"Our only enemy from a Colonial point of view is England. How the future Germany overseas will be built up depends on the result of our war with England.

"The Turkish army will advance through Asia Minor and Taurus. In order to concentrate for a further advance at Damascus, every new army corps which will pass through the Kilikia Gate of the City of Saladin will aggravate the terror of London.

NEW LAW DOES NOT AFFECT UNSURVEYED LAND
 Austin, Nov. 4.—Under a ruling today by the attorney general's department, the new land law of the 34th legislature does not govern the sale of unsurveyed land, except where it specifically sets forth such control. The effect is that unsurveyed land will continue to be sold

under the act of 1905. The new law also changes the settlement feature, reducing the number of acres sold to one person to 160 acres in certain portions of the State. Under the old law, as many as eight sections were permitted to be sold to one purchaser.

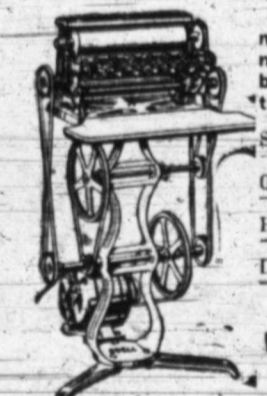

Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany for about the third or fourth time since the European war started, is reported dead. This time authority for the circulation of the report of the Crown Prince's death is credited to a diplomat accredited to the Vatican.

Carranza says there will be no elections held in Mexico for two years. That means that he will endeavor to govern by force during that time, and with the backing of the United States, may succeed in restoring peace. It is to be hoped that he will succeed, and it now begins to look that he soon will be rid of Villa and Zapata, the two leaders of factions that are endeavoring to hold out against his authority.

Of the twelve federal reserve banks, the three in the South, located at Dallas, Atlanta and Richmond, have proven the best money makers. The Dallas bank is the second best paying and the third largest money maker in the new system. The gross earnings of the Dallas bank for the ten and one-half months aggregate \$176,981, and its net earnings \$16,000.

Suffragists lost by big majorities in New York, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, and the prohibitionists met defeat in Ohio by a majority of at least 40,000 in yesterday's election. Massachusetts also elected a Republican governor, but Democratic governors were elected in Kentucky, Maryland and Mississippi. The Republicans made gains in New Jersey, and the next legislature will be controlled by that party. The Republicans also made a gain of two, and perhaps three congressmen in New York.

During the past few days cotton has dropped off in price about \$1.50 per bale. The Times can't figure out what has caused the drop, but perhaps the newspapers and statesmen who take credit for themselves for shoving up the price from 5 cents to 12 cents per pound can explain just why the slump came and how long it will stay. They ought not to withhold this information.

The Democratic National Committee in Ohio sets its authority for the statement that wool growers throughout the United States, regardless of party affiliations, are praising the Wilson administration. "When the Simmons Underwood bill was enacted, placing wool on the free list," said Mr. Sells, "it was said by its opponents that the sheep industry would be destroyed. On the contrary, it has resulted in greater prosperity to the shepherms than they have ever before experienced."

Before Texas flour mills began advertising foreign flour mills were able

to capture the trade through ads printed in the cheaply priced magazines, it was at a demand for a particular brand of flour. Now Texas mills will try some of that same kind of publicity, only the ads will be circulated in Texas newspapers.—Temple Telegram. THAT FOOTBALL GAME.

Editor the Times:— I have noticed your unsportsmanlike "write-up" of Sunday's football game at Electra, between Wichita Falls and Electra. To prove yourself a sportsman, you should apologize to the Electra team and to the citizens as your accusations were unjust and unwarranted.

It seems as though the Wichita Falls boys take the sting of defeat awfully hard, but they as sportsmen should not do so. If they cannot accept defeat gracefully they should quit the game, and as to "dirty" playing, some of the Wichita Falls players have the world beat, and have that reputation.

Before the game the captains agreed to a clean game in every way and the Electra team did not break their word, while the Wichita Falls boys did.

As to the referee, Mr. Stanforth, we can sure praise him, as there never was a squarer man stepped on the football field.

The Electra team has a game scheduled to be played at Wichita Falls on November 14th, and we will give the Wichita Falls people a chance to see for themselves that accusation of "dirty" playing and "rowdiness" is false. We expect to defeat the Wichita Falls team in an even more decisive manner on their home grounds than they received up here in the oil fields. Hoping this letter will meet with the approval of the public and will cause no ill feelings, I beg to remain, Very truly yours,

The report of the game was prepared by the undersigned, who witnessed the contest and who was one of the unfortunate officials. The report makes no accusation whatever against the citizenship of Electra, for the writer is not and does not believe that the representative citizenship of the neighboring town indorses the conduct of those of the spectators whose behavior caused the unpleasantness. Nowhere in the report is any player accused of either dirty playing or rowdiness. The first accusation of the kind to be written appears in Mr. Green's letter.

If Mr. Green, who was one of the Electra players and one against whom playing and conduct of criticism could be uttered, really considers Mr. Stanforth a square referee, why did he, as manager of the Electra team, stand passively by and permit the spectators to swarm on the field and "game" the officials? If Mr. Stanforth was a square official and was attempting to conduct the game impartially and according to the accepted rules, was it sportsmanlike to allow his decisions to be overruled by the mob spirit? Or was the sting of possible defeat being felt too keenly when Electra fumbled and a Wichita Falls player ran the length of the field with the ball?

The terms "unsportsmanlike" and "discourteous" were used in describing the treatment given the visitors, because of the threats and oaths used by some of the spectators against the Wichita Falls players, because of the general conduct of the spectators, and because of the offers of bodily violence made to the officials by some of the Electra players, under circumstances when it was impossible to re-

vent them. The undersigned could not possibly be mistaken as to these facts, and he does not believe Mr. Green will deny them. The undersigned has in the past criticized Wichita Falls players and Wichita Falls spectators when their conduct did not measure up to that degree of sportsmanship that ought to characterize a friendly contest. If a Wichita Falls crowd had acted unfairly toward visiting players and officials, it would certainly not have been spared in commenting on the game. And the undersigned, as a lover of football and of clean sport, hopes that when Electra appears here on November 14th, there will be not the slightest suggestion of unpleasantness.

GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE ARE TO EXTEND RECOGNITION

Will Follow Example of United States in Mexico, Ambassador Announces

Great Britain and France, it was said, are acting on their own initiative and not necessarily following the lead of the United States.

POSTMASTER TELLS HOW CITY GOT NAME

O. T. BACON IS PRINCIPAL SPEAKER AT ROTARY LUNCHEON TODAY.

NEW MEMBERS ARE ELECTED

The name Wichita, he said, resulted from the visit here of an Indian tribe which was migrating to the southward. When the Indians reached the Wichita River, they did not know its depth, so sent a squaw ahead to wade the stream. The river was low and the water came up to the squaw's stomach. The Indian words meaning "tip to the stomach" are pronounced "Wichita" and so that rather unpoetic manner the Wichita River was named, and Wichita Falls took its name from the river.

Mr. Bacon called attention to the promised automobile mail routes out of Wichita Falls and said that when they were established, which will probably be in the near future, much greater opportunities for selling goods by parcels post will be afforded Wichita Falls merchants, and he expressed the hope that they would avail themselves of the opportunity. He gave a brief history of the Wichita Falls postoffice, which appears to have been moved frequently in the past and quoted figures showing its rapid growth. The postmaster's remarks dealt largely in praise of Wichita Falls citizenship and he closed with a rosy prediction of this city's future. Mayor Britain, who attended a Rotary dinner for the first time today, spoke briefly.

An ordinance authorizing an election to be held in the city of Wichita Falls, Texas on the 20th day of November, 1915, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of the electric light plant and physical property now belonging to and operated by the Citizens Light and Power Company of Wichita Falls to the Wichita Falls Electric Company shall be authorized, and providing who shall vote at such election and how the same shall be conducted and how the vote shall be canvassed, and the returns of such election shall be made, and how notice of such election shall be given, and providing for ballots to be used at such election, and what said ballots shall contain, and providing for declaring the result of such election.

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas: Section 1. That an election is hereby ordered to be held in the city of Wichita Falls on the 20th day of November, 1915 for the following purposes to-wit: To determine whether or not the sale of the electric light plant and physical properties now belonging to and operated by the Citizens Light and Power Company to the Wichita Falls Electric Company shall be authorized.

Section 2. Except as otherwise provided herein the qualifications of persons entitled to vote at such election, the manner of voting at, and of conducting such election, keeping poll lists, canvassing the votes, and certifying the returns, shall be such as provided by the laws of the State of Texas and by the charter of Wichita Falls of similar elections.

Section 3. Notice of such election shall be given by posting three written or printed notices thereof, one at each of three public places in said city of Wichita Falls, Texas, at least 20 days before the day of such election and by publishing such notice in some newspaper published in said city three times during the ten days next before the date of such election, such notice to be under the official signature of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, and provided that a copy of said order, signed by the mayor of said city, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

Section 4. For use at such election the mayor of the city of Wichita Falls shall have ballots prepared and provided, which shall have written or printed thereon the following: OFFICIAL BALLOT.

For the sale of the electric light plant and physical properties belonging to the Citizens Light and Power Company to the Wichita Falls Electric Company.

Against the sale of the electric light plant and physical properties belonging to the Citizens Light and Power Company to the Wichita Falls Electric Company.

Section 5. Said election shall be held at the city hall and at the Wichita county court house, in the city of Wichita Falls, Texas and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election: At the city hall voting box, J. B. Pitts, presiding judge; T. J. Weidman, assistant judge; E. M. Morris, J. J. Manley and Jerome Stone, clerks; at the Wichita county court house voting box, George Simmons, presiding judge; T. A. Abbrinton, assistant judge; I. D. Browder, G. R. Walker and J. J. Bartie, clerks.

Section 6. The returns of such election shall be made to the board of aldermen of the city of Wichita Falls and said board of aldermen at a regular meeting shall examine such returns and shall declare, and the result of such election upon the minutes of such meeting.

SAVING BABIES IS WORK OF SOCIETY MEETING IN ANNUAL CONVENTION



WANT to SAVE BABIES' LIVES

The conservation of the lives of the babies of the nation is the purpose of the American Society For the Study and Prevention of Infant Mortality, meeting in Philadelphia No. 10-12. This year's meeting is the sixth annual convention of the society. The movement to save the lives and guard the health of the babies is a national one in which both physicians and laymen are interested. The outgoing president of the society is Homer Folks of New York, the prominent sociologist. The president for the coming term is Dr. S. McC. Hamill of Philadelphia. The secretary of the society is Dr. Philip Van Ingen of New York city.

INSIDE DETAILS OF DUMA'S PROPOGATION

REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT GIVEN SEVERE TEST IN RUSSIA.

TOO MUCH AMBITION IS CAUSE

Members Heal Differences But Lack of Tact and Judgment Leads to Undoing.

By Associated Press.

London, November.—The prorogation of the Russian Duma, according to accounts that have reached London from members of the Octobrist and Progressive parties, was one of the severest tests which representative government in Russia has met since it came into being. Only the sheer patriotism of the men who guided the majority in that body prevented the prorogation from becoming a disaster of the most far-reaching import. At one time it threatened to precipitate a general strike in all the factories supplying the army, a strike which would have left the army practically helpless.

The following account of the crisis after the most far-reaching importive group:
"First of all, it is necessary to realize exactly what this Duma meant to the Russian people. That people was enduring the heavy mental strain of a long period of retreat, a retreat on a scale so gigantic that its effects were obvious even to those many hundred miles from the front. Wounded soldiers returning to the heart of the country brought to town and village stories that made the lack of ammunition more than an intellectual problem. The result was that the common people were clamorous for

open criticism and some sort of control of the bureaucracy which it felt was responsible, and the Duma seemed to all classes the only hope of such criticism and control. For a time it was refused in them. Then, under the stress of the fall of Warsaw, the government decided to yield and summon the Duma.

"The Duma, conscious that the nation for once was united behind it, astonished everyone by the thoroughness and eagerness with which it attacked in a hundred speeches the problems that had been in the minds of all. It soon became evident that this was to be a different sort of a Duma from those which has preceded it. It was to be a parliament in fact as well as name, for the membership, always heretofore broken up into tiny political groups which made anything like concentrated action well nigh impossible, began to weld itself into two or three parties and a real majority party began to appear for the first time in history.

"There are fourteen so-called parties represented in the Russian Duma, as follows:

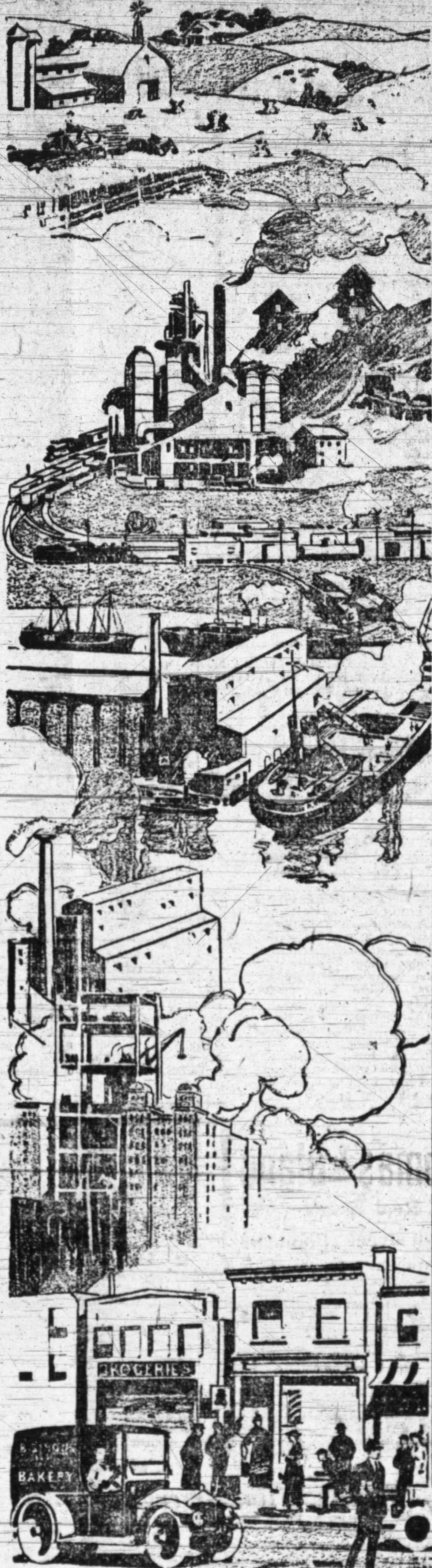

- "While thus disunited, the Duma was weak. But things began to assume a very different aspect when Miliukov, leader of the Cadets, and Guchkov, leader of the Progressives, joined together, succeeded in forming what was called the progressive bloc. They combined all the parties in the preceding list except the first three and the last two. Then for the first time the government was faced by a Duma which the power of making itself felt. The majority enjoyed by the Progressive bloc was absolutely overwhelming.

"The next stage of the story was the result of the peculiar character of the Russian politician. No sooner do any two Russians agree on anything, than they sit down to draw up a platform or program, dealing not only with the matter in hand, but extending far afield to all the subjects upon which they are able to agree. So with this Progressive bloc. No sooner had the constituent parties agreed to unite for their work in the Duma than, in spite of the fact that every man was solely concentrated on doing what should be done for the winning of the war, they met to elaborate a serious program which should show all the subjects on which they were agreed. They produced a program embodying about a dozen points, including such untimely matters as the reform of the Zemstvos or municipal councils, a broadening of a ministry franchise, recognition of trade unions, and the establishment of a ministry not recruited from the ranks of officialdom.

"It is obvious that the few points noted are enough to constitute the widest possible reformation in the Russian system of government. Leaders of the bloc have since declared that they did not mean this program anything but a statement of 'ultimate hopes,' and that for the moment they were content to concentrate their attention on matters of war legislation. But the publication of the program gave the conservative governing classes a tremendous shock, and officials took the opportunity to say 'Look what these people are determined to do under cover of the national emergency.'

"Premier Goremykin, who was one of those greatly aroused by the reply to what he believed to be a threat

COUNTRY CLUB CASE BEFORE SUPREME COURT

Austin, Nov. 3.—The Austin Country Club case, on which hangs the right of bona fide social clubs to dispense liquor without securing a license, was set for submission to the supreme court today.

Attorney General Looney was to argue the case for the state in person. The lower courts held that the clubs might dispense liquor on Sundays and after hours, but not on election days. The third court of civil ap-

peals held, however, that clubs must have state liquor licenses, and that it was impracticable for clubs to have licenses, because they should be under the statutes, issued to individuals.

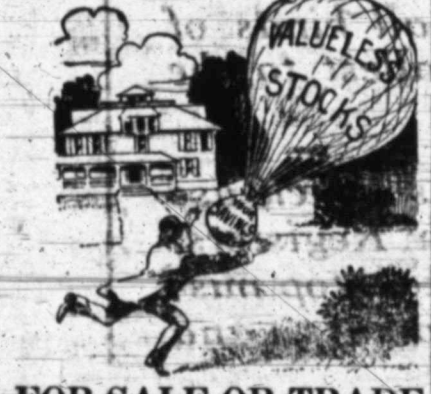
