Paris, Nov. 4.—The Zaimis govern-ment in Athena was defeated in a discussion of foreign policies in parliament today and is expected to resign says a Havas dispatch from Athens. A discussion of proposed military laws, the report says, raised a ques-tion between the minister of war, General Yanakiesas and the majority par ty of former Premier Zenizelos. this issue, Premier Zaimis decided to ask for a vote of confidence. The discussion then turned to the foreign policy of the government.

Venizelos declared it was impossible for his party longer to sustain the government, whose policy he considered harmful to the interests of the country. All the party leaders engaged in the discussion.

Premier Zaimis has been in office less than one month, having been ask-ed by King Constantine to form a cab-inet after the resignation of Premier Venizelos on October 6th.



Says Babies Were Thrown Into Baths to Drown When Soldiers Began Massacre

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Babies were cast into baths to drown when the Turks began the massacre in Armenia, Mrs. Samuel Byloz, wife of a Chicago tailor, said today on her return from Marsoban, Armenia, where she was visiting when the war began. She was more than a year in returning to America. Mrs. Byloz said:

"Conditions in our country are worse today than they have been in the history of our nation. The mur-ders began last August. I' was at Marsoban a city of 12,000 and the headquarters of the largest Armenian educational institution early last August when the general massacre of all Armenians was started. to permit the president to convert the council of state into a convention and have it adopt a new con-stitution embracing the monarchial provision according to his wishes.

The memorandum sent by the State Council, sitting as a legisla-

ture or parliament under the president's direction, says that in all eighty-two petitions favoring a mon archy have been received from different bodies.

The memorandum is taken as a general indication that the monarchy may be established much sooner than has been predicted. President Yuan Shi Kai however has not taken any action.

Many of the papers printed in English in various foreign concessions continue to vigorously assail the proposed monarchy on the ground that it is specially dangerous for China to make any change while world politics is at such white heat. Other papers printed in English accept the monarchial, movement as inevitable, and are urging that wholesale reforms be carried on by the government regardless of whether it be called a republic or a monarchy.

Members of the society for the preservation of peace, the organization that originally fathered the monarchial movement, are still working actively in Peking without opposition from the government. They recentheld a luncheon at the most prominent foreign hotel in Peking in hon-or of delegates from the provinces who have come to the capital to confer about the monarchial proposition. This luncheon was attended by one hundred and fifty men. No member of the cabinet was present, neither did any other government officials of high rank attend. The delegates formed a sort of union for the discussion of governmental questions, and engaged in speech making for several hours.

Foreign criticism of the movement and the general belief that several foreign powers would withhold their recognition of the monarchy have nettled the leaders.

The opponents of the monarchial system estimate one hundred million dollars, or about forty million dollars in gold, as the probable expense of restoring a monarchy but the pro-ponents say that this big figure is based on the cost of enthronement.

### NUMEROUS SURGICAL FEATS ARE CREDITED TO RUSSIANS

Men's Faces Made Over-Hospitals Are Operated in Very Up-to-Date Manner.

Tokio, Nov. 1.—Marvels in surgery are almost everyday occurrences in Russian hospitals according to Dr. John Mann of Virginia, who has come to Japan after nine months experience in the American Red Cross hospital at Kieff. Dr. Mann served with a staff of American nurses who are soon returning to the United States on account of lack of Red Cross funds. He held the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Russian steamer Congritude of the Congress of the Congress

"In many instances," said Dr. Mann to the correspondent, "it was really a Some Russian soldiers came to us with their faces literally blown off. They were supplied with artificial jaws and were sent away looking almost entirely new. They were the hest classes of operation I have ever

The American Hospital at Kieff was practically devoted to surgery. There were eight American doctors and one Russian and also American and Russian nurses. At first there was accommodation for 400 beds but this was soon increased to 700. The patients as they came in were treated to a bath and clean clothes and then were allotted to the different wards. Some said they had not had their clothes off or had taken a bath for six months. These were the men who had been all through the cam-pairn in the Carpathian mountains ast winter. Most of them were suffering from frost bite.

"There was absolutely no kind of gunshot wound which we did hot have," went on the doctor, "and it may be mentioned that the Russians had splendid facilities for sending on their wounded. The railway station itself had been converted into a receiving hospital, All patients arriving there were given a dressing and then distributed to the different hospitals. A first aid dressing of course, had previously been given on the field. Occasionally, however, there was no time for any dressing at the station This occurred for instance, when one night 1,000 patients arrived and had to be distributed to the hospitals




