NEW POLITICAL SHAKEUP TAKES PLACE IN ATHENS; WILL FORM NEW MINISTRY

INSULTING REMARK BY WAR MINISTER PROVOKES ACTION

IS RESENTED BY FORMER PREMIER VENIZELOS AND GOVERNMENT BACKS UP CABINET OFFICER

RESIGNATION FOLLOWS DEFEAT IN OFFICE LESS THAN MONTH

Chamber of Deputies Asked to Suspend its Work Until New Cabinet Can Be Organized and Installed in Office

By Associated Press. Athens, Nov. 4.—Following its defeat in Parliament today, the cabinet resigned. The immediate cause of the defeat was a remark made by War Minister Yanakissas, which was considered by former Premier Venizelos as insulting to the national assembly. Venizelos demanded an immediate apology. Premier Zaimis thereupon declared the government stood behind the war minister and demanded a vote of confidence.

MEANS NEW CRISIS, SAYS GREEK MINISTER TO LONDON

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 4.—The Greek minister at London this afternoon said he had received no official information of the reported defeat of the Zaimis government.

NEW MINISTRY TO BE FORMED WITHOUT DELAY

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 4.—After today's vote put the Zaimis government in the minority, the premier asked the Chamber of Deputies to suspend its work until a new cabinet was formed, according to an Athens dispatch.

PUNISHMENT FOR BANDITS IS PROMISED BY CARRANZA

Tells State Department He Will Do All in His Power to Stop Raids

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—Assurances reached the state department today from General Carranza that raiding by Mexican bandits along the American border would be stopped as quickly as possible and that those found guilty of bandit operations would be punished. General Carranza made his statement personally to John W. Belmont, the American representative with the de facto government, with the request that it be conveyed officially to the state department. He said he would make a personal investigation of the border situation.

"In this connection," the state department announced today, "it is stated that experienced and reliable troops will be stationed on the Mexican side of the border and that the Mexican secret service will be utilized in cooperation with the military authorities of the de facto government in locating and punishing offenders."

REVOLT BY ALBANIANS IN SERBIA

By Associated Press. Rome, Nov. 4.—Albanians living in the Subagora and Krusevo districts of Serbia have revolted, according to a Durazzo dispatch. A desperate battle between Serbian troops and the rebels has been fought north of Tirano. The anti-Serbian movement has spread into northern Albania.

GERMAN ARMY CONTINUES MAKING PROGRESS IN SERBIA

Advances North of Kralivo, Taking 650 Prisoners—Bulgars Storm Town Near Nish

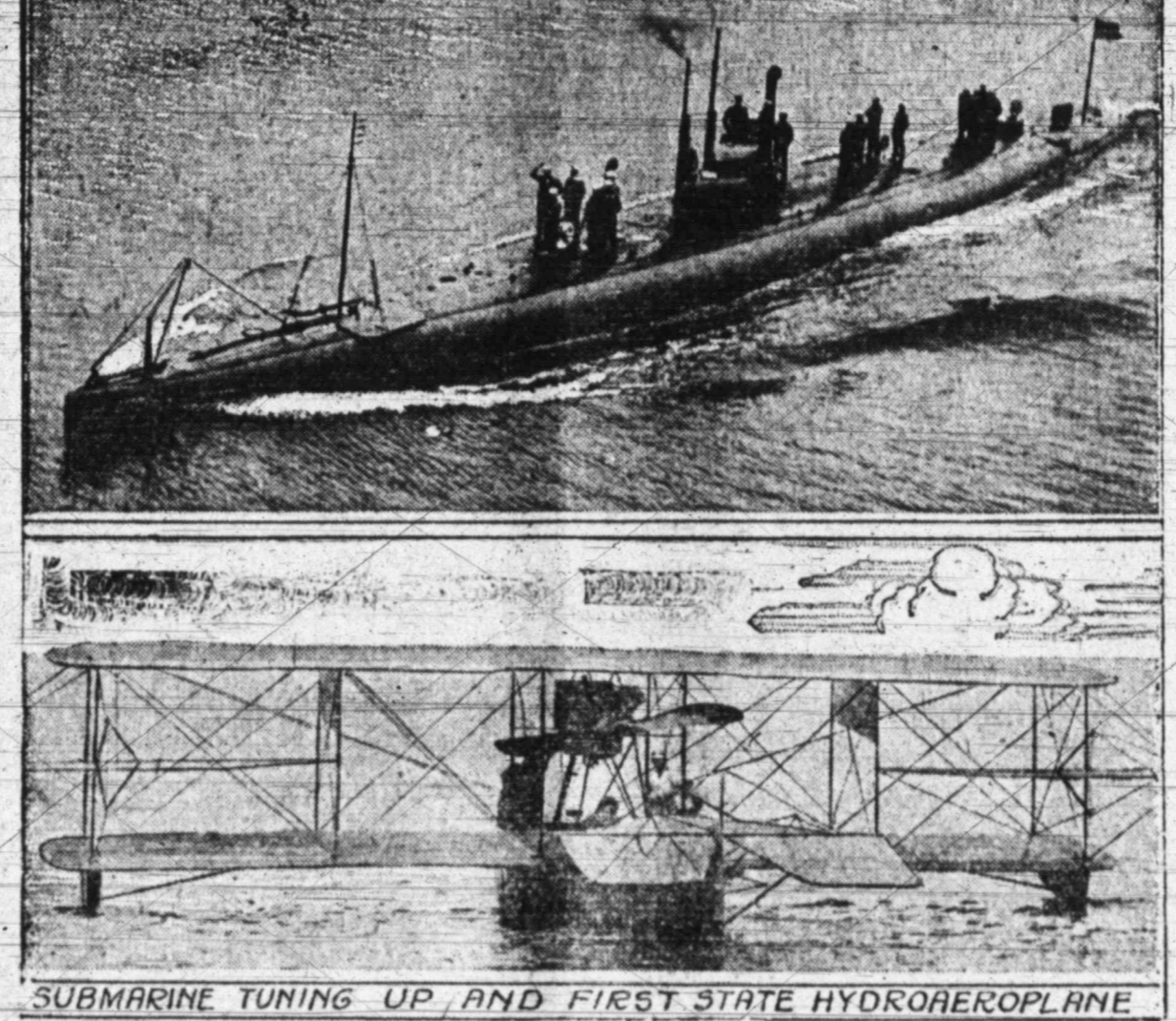
By Associated Press. Berlin, November 4.—German troops have advanced in the region north of Kralivo in Serbia, taking 650 prisoners according to an official statement at the German war office today. The announcement added that the Bulgarians had stormed the town of Kalajat, six miles northwest of Nish.

SUBMARINE TUNING UP AND FIRST STATE HYDROAEROPLANE

Two of the latest developments of the plans for national preparedness, urged by President Wilson and others, are shown in the accompanying pictures. The upper shows a submarine in a practice run off New London, Conn. (New London is the latest submarine base of the United States navy, having been put in commission only a few weeks ago.) The plan contemplates dividing the submarines into two divisions, those purely for coast defense, which will be concentrated at various bases, and those which will accompany the fleet. The other picture shows the hydroaeroplane (aeroplane fitted with boat body for floating in water, skimming along the water, etc.) just presented to the naval militia of the state of New York for practice work.

TROOPS ENTERING NACO TODAY

Schools Reopen at Douglas After Being Closed All Week on Account of Battle

By Associated Press. Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 4.—Although falling in his attempt to take Agua Prieta, General Francisco Villa was said today to have Carranza officials guessing what his next move would be. Whether his plans were concealed from choice or by force of circumstances remained a mystery. Villa soldiers surrendering to Calles' forces declared that since his defeat at Agua Prieta, their former commander was planning to spread his forces into small bands to harass the Carranza forces. So urgent is the need for food supplies any movement would be designed with that end in view.

WHITLOCK'S RETURN DUE TO ILL HEALTH

REPORT RECALL WAS ASKED BY GERMANY IS NOT CREDITED

FIRST BRITISH CONTINGENT ARRIVES IN SERBIA FRIDAY

Will Act With French Forces as Separate Unit—Hard Fighting Near Zales

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 4.—The first British contingent arrived Friday at Gudduill in Serbia, according to a dispatch filed Saturday at Saloniki. The British force will act as a separate unit with the French troops. The French forces advancing northwest from the Greek frontier have not yet effected a junction with the hard-pressed Serbians near Zales. The fighting in this district has been desperate and the Serbians once recaptured Zales only to lose it again on October 31.

NO PEACE PROPOSAL MADE BY GERMANY

VON BUELOW NOT GOING TO SEE EITHER WILSON OR ALFONSO

WHITLOCK'S RETURN DUE TO ILL HEALTH

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By Associated Press. Lucerne, Switzerland, Nov. 4.—Prince Von Buelow, former German chancellor, informed the Associated Press today that he had not come to Switzerland on a peace mission. He declared Germany was resolved to continue the war to its conclusion by arms. The prince made it clear that he was not going to Washington to see President Wilson, or to Madrid to see King Alfonso, in relation to terms on which Germany might be willing to discuss peace, nor is he engaged in such discussion with anyone. In addition to disposing of these reports the prince said to the correspondents today: "The war must be fought out. Germany is united and possesses every resource in material, unity and resolution to continue the war to its conclusion. I am here as a private person and will not talk politics."

ARMENIAN WOMAN TELLS OF ATROCITIES BY TURKS

Says Babies Were Thrown Into Baths to Drown When Soldiers Began Massacre

By Associated Press. Chicago, Nov. 4.—Babies were cast into baths to drown when the Turks began the massacre in Armenia, Mrs. Samuel Byloz, wife of a Chicago tailor, said today on her return from Marsovan, Armenia, where she was visiting when the war began. She was more than a year in returning to America. Mrs. Byloz said: "Conditions in our country are worse today than they have been in the history of our nation. The murders began last August. I was at Marsovan a city of 12,000 and the headquarters of the largest Armenian educational institution early last August when the general massacre of all Armenians was started. For three days Turkish soldiers stabbed and burned. The streets were littered with dead. Then orders came to deport those still living. The word deport is a farce. With nothing to eat or wear my countrymen were taken into the mountains and killed."

SERBIANS STILL RETIRING TOWARD CENTRAL DEFENSES

ROUMANIA'S POLICY MAY PERMIT RUSSIA TO SEND LARGE FORCES DOWN DANUBE RIVER TO LANDING IN BULGARIA

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 4.—While the Serbians are fighting doggedly to keep the way open for their retreat into Montenegro, their Franco-British allies are beginning to make their presence felt in Macedonia, where according to unofficial reports they have gained a success on the Ispit front. The Serbian army is retreating steadily toward its central defenses, but its fighting qualities apparently have not been seriously impaired by the tremendous battering it has received from the invaders.

The speech which marks the first public utterance of the president since the scope of the nation's defense program became known, was awaited today with keen interest. The president will be the guest in New York of his friend, Col. E. M. House.

DALLAS COTTON OIL MILL IS DAMAGED BY FIRE TODAY

Loss Is Estimated at \$60,000—Tanks With 40,000 Gallons of Oil Are Destroyed

By Associated Press. Dallas, Texas, Nov. 4.—Fire early today destroyed the refining plant of the Dallas Oil & Refining Company with nine tanks containing 40,000 gallons of cotton seed oil. The loss is estimated at \$60,000. The origin of the fire is not known. The plant will be badly crippled as a result of the fire in the height of the refining season.

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SERBS RULER WOULD DIE IF NATION FELL

By Associated Press. Amsterdam, Nov. 4.—An official Bulgarian statement received here today from Sofia says King Peter of Serbia has gone to the front to encourage his soldiers and take them the news that French and British forces are hurrying to their assistance.

DECISION IN CHINA EXPECTED SHORTLY

QUESTION OF MONARCHY MAY BE SETTLED BEFORE END OF THE YEAR.

PRESS OPPOSES ACTION NOW

Believes it Would Be Dangerous in View of Present International Situation.

By Associated Press. Peking, Nov. 4.—The question of whether China is to be a monarchy or a republic should be settled before the end of the year, according to the State Council, which has recommended that, in accordance with the terms of the provisional consti-

titution, President Yuan Shi Kai should call a citizens convention to decide the question, but if it is not possible to call such a convention at this time, the State Council recommends that the president waive the provision and devise other proper and adequate means to consult the will of the people.

It is rumored that this is designed to permit the president to convert the council of state into a convention and have it adopt a new constitution embracing the monarchical provision according to his wishes.

The memorandum sent by the State Council, sitting as a legislature or parliament under the president's direction, says that in all eighty-two petitions favoring a monarchy have been received from different bodies.

The memorandum is taken as a general indication that the monarchy may be established much sooner than has been predicted. President Yuan Shi Kai, however, has not taken any action.

Many of the papers printed in English in various foreign concessions continue to vigorously assail the proposed monarchy on the ground that it is specially dangerous for China to make any change while world politics is at such white heat.

Other papers printed in English accept the monarchical movement as inevitable, and are urging that wholesale reforms be carried on by the government regardless of whether it be called a republic or a monarchy.

Members of the society for the preservation of peace, the organization that originally fathered the monarchical movement, are still working actively in Peking without opposition from the government. They recently held a luncheon at the most prominent foreign hotel in Peking in honor of delegates from the provinces who have come to the capital to confer about the monarchical proposition.



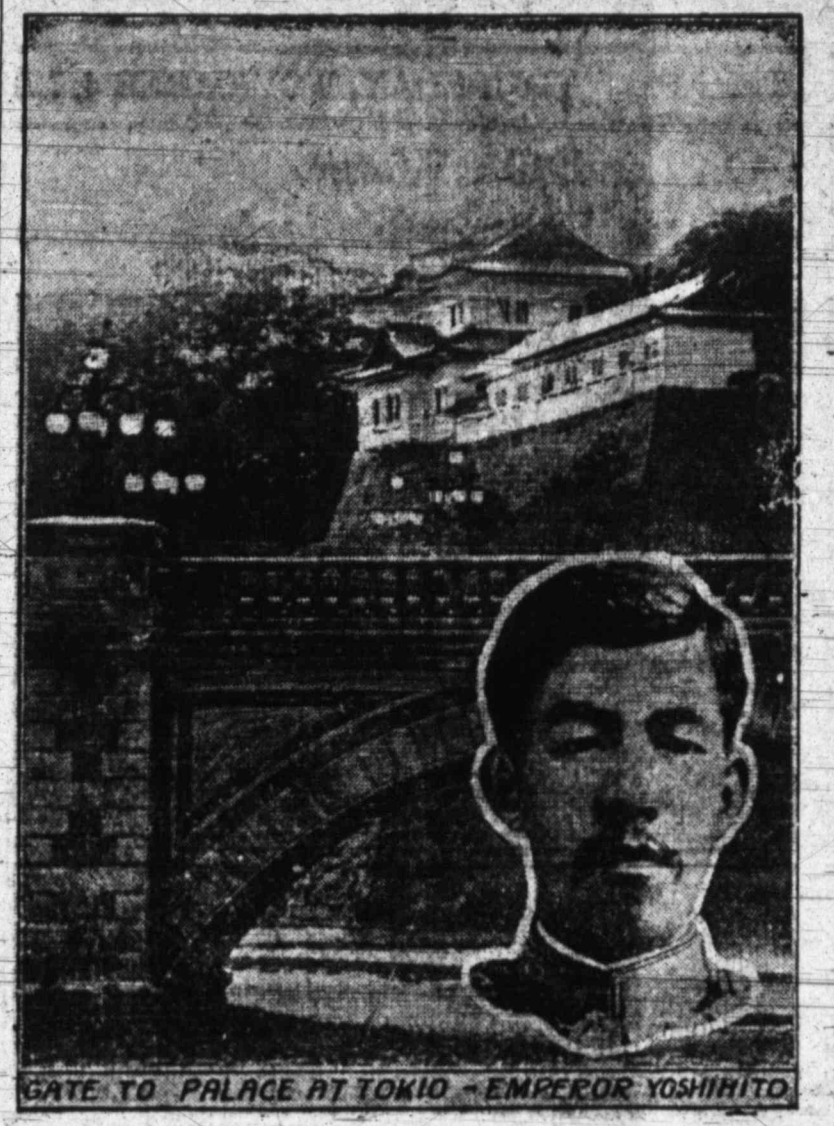

QUEER BARGAINS OFFERED BY GERMANS IN BELGIUM

Sale of War Booty By Invaders is Under Way, Judging From Advertisements

The inhabitants of Loos, who had lived a year under German rule in sight of the British lines before the town was recaptured September 26th, have been transported to the Pyrenees to be sheltered there until their town, now under the continual fire of German batteries, becomes habitable again. They brought with them piles of papers published by the German authorities in the French language in Belgium and circulated in northern France in which there appear numerous advertisements that are occupying the attention of the French authorities on the supposition that they refer to war booty taken in France and Belgium and put on sale by the Germans.

One advertisement runs: "A thousand and second hand electric motors and dynamos for sale." Among the others are the following: "Sensational offering of 3500 machines, new or nearly new, at half their value, including crushers, rolling mills, mixers and hydraulic presses, pumps, steam boilers and locomotives."

"Selling out at factory prices 500 pianos, first makes." "One hundred and fifty thousand bottles of Champagne for sale at prices that defy competition." "The houses inserting these advertisements are said to be German firms that have established themselves in Brussels since the occupation."

MORGAN'S ILLNESS AND OPERATION SHOCKED WORLD OF FINANCE

Mr. Morgan has figured frequently of late in the news, especially when he was shot by Erich Mueunter (alias Hoff) in July and when he helped in the recent negotiations for the Anglo-French credit of \$500,000,000 made in the United States.

NEW FOOD REGULATIONS IN GERMANY FOUND NECESSARY

Supply of Meat, Butter and Other Things For Each Family is Restricted

Berlin, Nov. 4.—"Germany will be using meat and butter cards before the end of the winter and maximum prices will be placed on practically all food necessities to prevent extortionate demands by retailers," Mayor Von Wermuth of Greater Berlin declared today.

Tuesday was the first meatless day in Berlin, in accordance with the government's new food regulations requiring abstinence from meat two days each week. Meat could not be bought anywhere in the restaurants or the shops. The hotels served vegetables, cheese and eggs as substitutes.

Friday Berliners will go without meat again. Monday will be the first fatless day, when butter and other fats will be unobtainable. Every Wednesday and every Friday will be fatless days.

The government is in earnest about its new food regulations and intends to enforce them strictly.

A big Cologne packer was sentenced to four months and another packer got fifteen months for violating the provisions.

Piles of food in the shop windows indicate there is no lack of supplies, but it is officially pointed out that some regulative steps are necessary to insure reasonable food prices throughout the winter.

"It is not a question of food shortage at all," said Mayor Von Wermuth. "It is a question of price. The prevailing high prices have caused the food supplies might not last, because we know exactly what we need, and we have it. But it is utterly to see that everyone gets what he needs and the government intends to do just that."

Beginning Monday, the price of butter will be reduced 40%. Next week the mayor expects to regulate the price of pork, he said. Just now pork is very high, and only the wealthiest classes can buy it. By extending the zone of government regulation, Germany is thus developing into a socialistic state. The government now controls the supplies of grain and potatoes and has begun regulation of other food supplies. The railways and 60 per cent of the factories are under government control. The government provides employment for the unemployed and sets food prices.

REORGANIZATION OF ORIENT RAILROAD NOW PLANNED

By Associated Press. Nov. 4.—Plans to reorganize the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad Company were revealed here in an application filed with the Kansas Public Utilities Company asking permission to issue stock and bonds in the amount of \$51,238,000. Immediate construction of the road from Wichita to Kansas City is promised if the application is granted. The stock and bond issue as outlined by the company will include, if granted, the immediate issuance of \$15,000,000 in 50 year five per cent gold bonds in the form of first mortgage notes or deeds of trust covering all the properties of the company. The commission announced that a hearing on the application will be held November 9.

WORD "MOTHER" RESTORES FRENCH SOLDIER'S REASON

Proves to Be Key to His Memory After Strain of War Had Made His Insane

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 4.—The word "mother" which saves lives and spares the honor of innocents in the melodrama, has actually restored reason to a soldier in France, whose mind had been left a blank by shell shock.

A concert party had gone over from England to cheer up the sick, and one of their number a well known tenor, sang the old favorite, "Mother or Macher." Among the audience was a nerve shattered soldier who came out of a bombardment not only blind but almost an idiot. He could understand nothing, babbled meaningless and had to be treated like an infant. He was still blind when taken to the concert. The word mother recurred in the song and the soldier caught at it. When the song was finished, he was still muttering the word to himself. But it proved the key to his memory. He began to recall detached incidents about himself and later recovered both his mind and his sight.

AUSTRALIANS PAY TRIBUTE TO TURKS AS GOOD SOLDIERS

"Fights Like a Christian Gentleman" They Say—Instances of Behavior Related

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 4.—An enthusiastic tribute to the Turk as an honorable fighter comes in a letter from an Australian officer to a relative in London.

"The Australians will hear nothing said against the Turk," he writes. "I want to warn you against the tales of Turkish atrocities in Gallipoli or elsewhere. We know all about the Turk. Haven't we fought against him for months? He may be a colored infidel, but he fights like a Christian gentleman. One of our fellows went out to get a Turk sniper. Something went wrong and the Turk got him. But he put up a good fight against numbers, and the Turks were so pleased with him that they dressed his wounds and gave him a bottle of wine and water, and sent him back to us." The same officer remarks that at first the English Indian troops regarded the Australian troops with contempt and considered it almost undignified to be asked to fight alongside them.

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Considering that it was Mr. Root's scheme or proposition to revise the constitution of New York state and that it met defeat in the "battle of ballots" on Tuesday by a majority of something like 450,000 votes it would seem that the Republicans new hope for the presidency in 1916 has lost some of its popularity.

The American people are still in the dark as to where Great Britain gets her authority to seize our ships and turn them into her prize-courts. Such high handed procedure should be stopped, and there is a way by which Great Britain can be made to feel the great injustice being done by her to American shipping interests.

November 7, 1916, another presidential election will take place. The Democratic party has virtually already named the head of its ticket—Woodrow Wilson—and it will be difficult to name a man who will prove a better or more fitted running mate than Thomas Marshall. As for the Republicans, that party has a half dozen or more aspirants for the honor, and Ellihu Root seems to have more backing than all others.

A. S. Welles, collector of internal revenue, has ruled that all powers of attorney given by parties authorizing a person as their agent to pay poll tax for them must bear a 25-cent revenue stamp. This ruling, perhaps will have a tendency to put a stop to many poll tax receipts being issued in authority of powers of attorney, many of which are given by parties who are not under the law entitled to a vote, and take this method of obtaining a poll tax receipt.

Professional baseball is losing its popularity according to Mayor Lindsay of Dallas. This is shown by the fact that amateurs draw larger crowds than do the professionals. For instance, the attendance at professional games at Cleveland, O., was only about 2,000 to 3,000 daily, while the attendance at some amateur games ran as high as 15,000. Of late years, professional baseball has become a business rather than a sport. Men who have their millions are large investors of professional baseball stock, and some of them—perhaps the most of them—know nothing about the sport, and could not tell to save their lives which team was winning were they to witness a game, and they rarely do this. They are simply interested in professional baseball for the money it brings them on their investments and that is all the interest they have in it. The public generally has come to understand this, and that is why interest in professional baseball is dropping off at so rapid a rate, and more interest is being taken in amateur games—baseball that is played purely for the sport the game affords. In a few more years professional baseball will be a thing of the past.

In the matter of the election to determine whether or not the Citizens Light and Power Company shall be permitted to sell its physical properties to the Wichita Falls Electric Company (better known as the old company) which election has been ordered for November 29th, it is the Times' understanding the owners of the Citizens Electric Light Company (the new company), want to make the deal for the reason that after a trial the owners find they cannot operate it at a profit to themselves. As to whether that is the real reason or not, the Times, of course, cannot say. In Tuesday's issue the Times stated that the franchise granted the old company fixed the maximum prices that it was allowed to charge patrons for light and power. In this statement it now appears the Times was in error. The franchise under which the old company is operating, and which does not expire until 1923, does not fix the rates that it can charge for electric service. The franchise under which the new company is operating does limit the charge for electric service, and for that very reason there are a considerable number of our citizens who do not favor the proposition of the old company absorbing the physical properties of the new company unless they can be shown some substantial evidence that it is not the intention of the old company to advance its rates for light and power above the rates it

is now charging. The Times also notes that under the new charter adopted by the city in 1913; the right to regulate the rates of electric light, water and gas companies is reserved, but the city council, as the Times understands the situation, is powerless to fix the rates of the old company until after its franchise, granted seventeen years ago, expires. The Times is assured, however, by Mr. Lawton, superintendent of the old company that it is not the intention of his company to advance rates over what they now are, and on this matter his company will probably have something to say through the columns of this paper in the next day or so, in which substantial assurances will be given the general public that, whether the proposition carries or not, the rates for light and power will not be increased over what they now are.

"SAFE FARMING" PROGRAM IS ADVOCATED IN SOUTH

Department of Agriculture Warns Farmers Against Depending Too Much on Cotton

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—A program of "Safe Farming" for the South is outlined in a circular which the United States Department of Agriculture has sent to bankers, business men and farmers in the cotton States. The history of agriculture in the South has been said, has been one of lean years and fat years. Short crops and high prices have almost invariably been followed by big crops and low prices, and in consequence, the farmer has experienced much distress. The increased attention which has recently been given to supporting the people upon the land has already resulted in much good, but there is some danger, it is pointed out, that, with the price of cotton rising, there will be a tendency for farmers to return to the old system of gambling on cotton. If the people of the South produced their own living, the circular points out, it would be steady, the whole system would keep the boat from rocking. The safe measures recommended are as follows:

- First—Produce a home garden for every family on the farm, the year round, bearing special attention to a plot of Irish or sweet potatoes sufficient to supply the family with food of this character. Where feasible have a patch of sorghum or other cane to produce syrup for the family.
Second—Produce the corn necessary to support all of the people on the farm and live stock, with absolute safety.
Third—Produce the necessary oats and other small grains to supplement the corn as food. Pay attention to the winter grazing.
Fourth—Produce hay and forage from some forage crop, sufficient to supply all of the live stock on the farm. Use legumes such as clover, cowpeas, velvet beans, soy beans and alfalfa for the production of hay and to enrich the soil with nitrogen and humus.
Fifth—Produce the meat necessary to supply the people, through increased attention to poultry and hogs, especially. Plan to increase gradually, the number of cattle and other live stock so as to have a sufficient number to consume the waste products of the farm and make the waste lands productive.
Sixth—After all of these things have been amply provided for, produce cotton for the market.

Flagler and Rockefeller were at that time directors of the Standard Oil company. The outcome was that the Joy line was prevented from getting the boat.

SECRETARY OF REPUBLICANS IS PLEASED WITH RESULTS

Says Outcome of Tuesday's Elections Shows Lack of Confidence in Administration

New York, Nov. 4.—Charles D. Hills, chairman of the Republican national committee last night issued the following statement on the results of yesterday's election:
"The result of yesterday's election must be anything but gratifying to the national administration. The contest in the Democratic state of Maryland is so very close that the result will be in doubt until decided by the official canvass. In the Democratic state of Kentucky, where national questions were lugged in by the Democrats to avoid a drubbing, the Republicans have shown their old time form. We have carried Cincinnati by the largest plurality ever given a candidate in that city.
"The Republicans have retained control of the legislatures in New York and New Jersey; have elected local officers in upstate New York and all officers in Philadelphia. They have swept Massachusetts by pluralities ranging from 10,000 to 30,000, electing all state officers and 160 Republican members of the legislature against 79 Democrats.
"We have carried the one congressional district in Pennsylvania and three in New York, one of which the Twenty-third New York, has been held by a Democrat.
"It is significant that the issues discussed in Massachusetts and the Twenty-third New York by men of national note, were wholly those arising out of the domestic policies of the national administration. William S. Bennett, elected in the Twenty-third New York, made the protective tariff his keynote and he ran 11,000 ahead of the Republican assemblymen who were candidates in the same territory.

The Boston Post contended that the national administration was on trial and that the election of McCall would be a vote of lack of confidence in the policies of President Wilson.

Scoreless Tie Resulted When Clubs First Met and Close Contest is Assured

The Lawton football team, which played a scoreless tie game with the Wichita Falls independent team on October 21 at Lawton, will again meet the locals at the city park next Sunday. These two teams are very evenly matched and the result of the game at Lawton makes it certain that the coming contest will be worth seeing.
The management of the independent is going to considerable expense to bring the Lawton team here and it is hoped that a large crowd will be in attendance. The expenses of the visitors will be about \$70, which amount must be made from the gate receipts. Promise is given of other good games later if the support next Sunday is encouraging. The team is practicing regularly and will be in good trim for the game.

PREMIER BRIAND TALKS OF FRANCE PROGRAM

Paris, Nov. 4.—Premier Briand in the Chamber of Deputies and Senate yesterday said:

"We are at war. The essential task of the government is the utilization of all the vital forces of the nation with a view to war. Only by close and incessant co-operation will there be victory. Once all responsibilities are established, every fault, every failure, will be punished. That is the program of the new government. France never had an army more worthy of victory. A country as great as to the outcome of the war will follow its development calmly."

WORK HAS STARTED ON REFINERY HERE

LARGE FORCE OF MEN IS BUSY AT SITE OF NEW INDUSTRIAL PLANT.

WILL BEGIN LAYING PIPE LINE

Builders Say Present Plans Are for Eventually Making Big Concern Here.

A large force of men is at work clearing the ground, digging the excavations and laying the foundations for the buildings, tanks and stills for the Panhandle Refinery Company's plant northwest of the Northwestern Railway Company's shops. The railroad company also has a gang of men at work laying a track across the refinery company's site.

Among the buildings for which the foundations are being laid are the stills, of which there will be four with a capacity of 2,000 barrels of crude oil daily, a boiler house, pump house and agitators. Fourteen tanks ranging from 10,000 barrels down are to be built at once. Other buildings and tanks are to be erected as needed.

O. B. Manross of Tulsa, one of the men interested in the company, is superintending the construction of the plant. He said this morning that he could not say with any degree of certainty when the plant would be in operation, that every effort would be exerted to have the plant going as soon as possible. The company is under contract to begin taking oil from the producers in the Burnett field before January 1 and as its pipe line to the field will not be laid by that time it will be necessary to build storage tanks in the field.
Pipe for a four-inch main to the oil field is now en route and the work of laying it will be started as of the plant here.

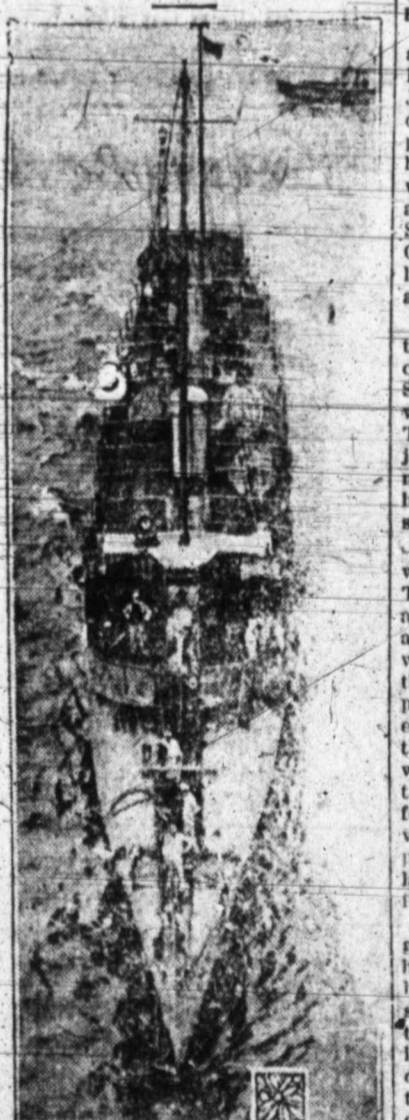
"If our plans carry out," said Mr. Manross this morning, "the work we are doing now will be only a start. We are hoping to make a big thing of the plant here."
Those interested in the plant are Roy E. Jones of Oklahoma City, C. B. Farquharson of Tulsa, Frank Brown of Independence, Kansas and O. B. Manross. Mr. Jones will be secretary and general manager of the company and has already moved his family here. Mr. Manross who will be superintendent of the plant also has moved his family here. Both Mr. Manross and Mr. Jones are practical refinery men of many years experience. Mr. Farquharson owns the Tulsa Boiler and Sheet Metal Works at Tulsa and has been prominent in Oklahoma oil fields for a number of years.

Frank Brown is the owner of the Kansas City Oil Refinery Company at Kansas City, Kansas and is one of the biggest operators in the Cushing, Oklahoma field. Both he and Mr. Farquharson are men of considerable wealth.

NUMEROUS SURGICAL FEATS ARE CREDITED TO RUSSIANS

Men's Faces Made Over—Hospitals Are Operated in Very Up-to-Date Manner.

By Associated Press
Tokio, Nov. 4.—Marvels in surgery are almost everyday occurrences in Russian hospitals according to Dr. John Mann of Virginia, who has come to Japan after nine months of experience in the American Red Cross hospital at Kiof.

Dr. Mann served with a staff of American nurses who are soon returning to the United States on account of lack of Red Cross funds. He held the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Russian army.

"In many instances," said Dr. Mann to the correspondent, "it was really a case of making faces while you wait. Some Russian soldiers came to us with their faces literally blown off. They were supplied with artificial jaws and were sent away looking almost entirely new. They were the best classes of operation I have ever seen."

The American hospital at Kiof was practically devoted to surgery. There were eight American doctors and one Russian and also American and Russian nurses. At first there was accommodation for 400 beds but this was soon increased to 700. The patients as they came in were treated to a bath and clean clothes and then were allotted to the different wards. Some said they had not had their clothes off or had taken a bath for six months. These were the men who had been all through the campaign in the Carpathian mountains last winter. Most of them were suffering from frost bite.

"There was absolutely no kind of gunshot wound which we did not have," went on the doctor, "and it may be mentioned that the Russians had splendid facilities for sending on their wounded. The railway station itself had been converted into a receiving hospital. All patients arriving there were given a dressing and then distributed to the different hospitals. A first aid dressing of course, had previously been given on the field. Occasionally, however, there was no time for any dressing at the station. This occurred for instance, when one night 1,000 patients arrived and had to be distributed to the hospitals at once."

Almost every public building in Kiof, the physician continued, was used as hospital and there was even

one of 100 beds in the catacombs of the city. Operations were performed on every part of the human anatomy. He found the spirit of the Russian people excellent and that of the women wonderful. Everybody was confident of the success of the Russian arms and ready to sacrifice everything to that end.
The people got on very well without drinking intoxicants. The law against the sale of alcoholic beverages was strictly enforced. One Russian leader was sent to Siberia for selling a bottle of champagne. When the day's work was done there was opportunity for recreation and rest in the theatres where good vaudeville shows were given.

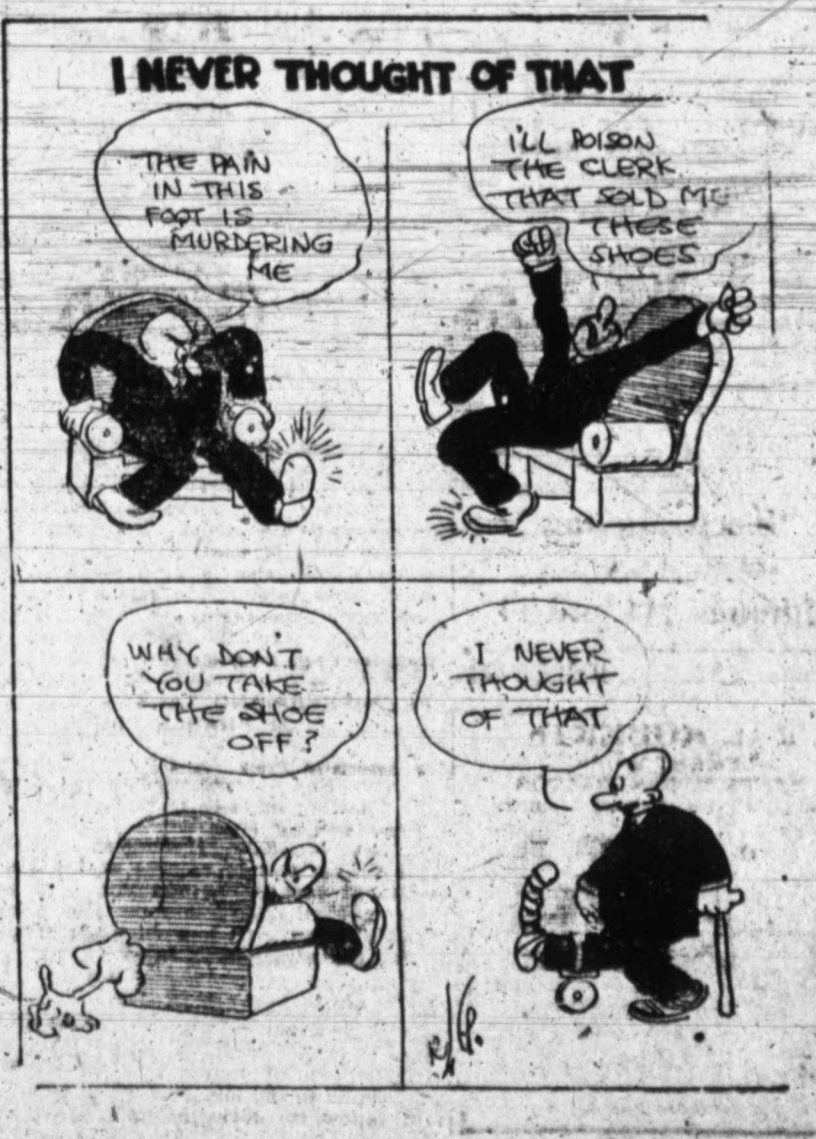
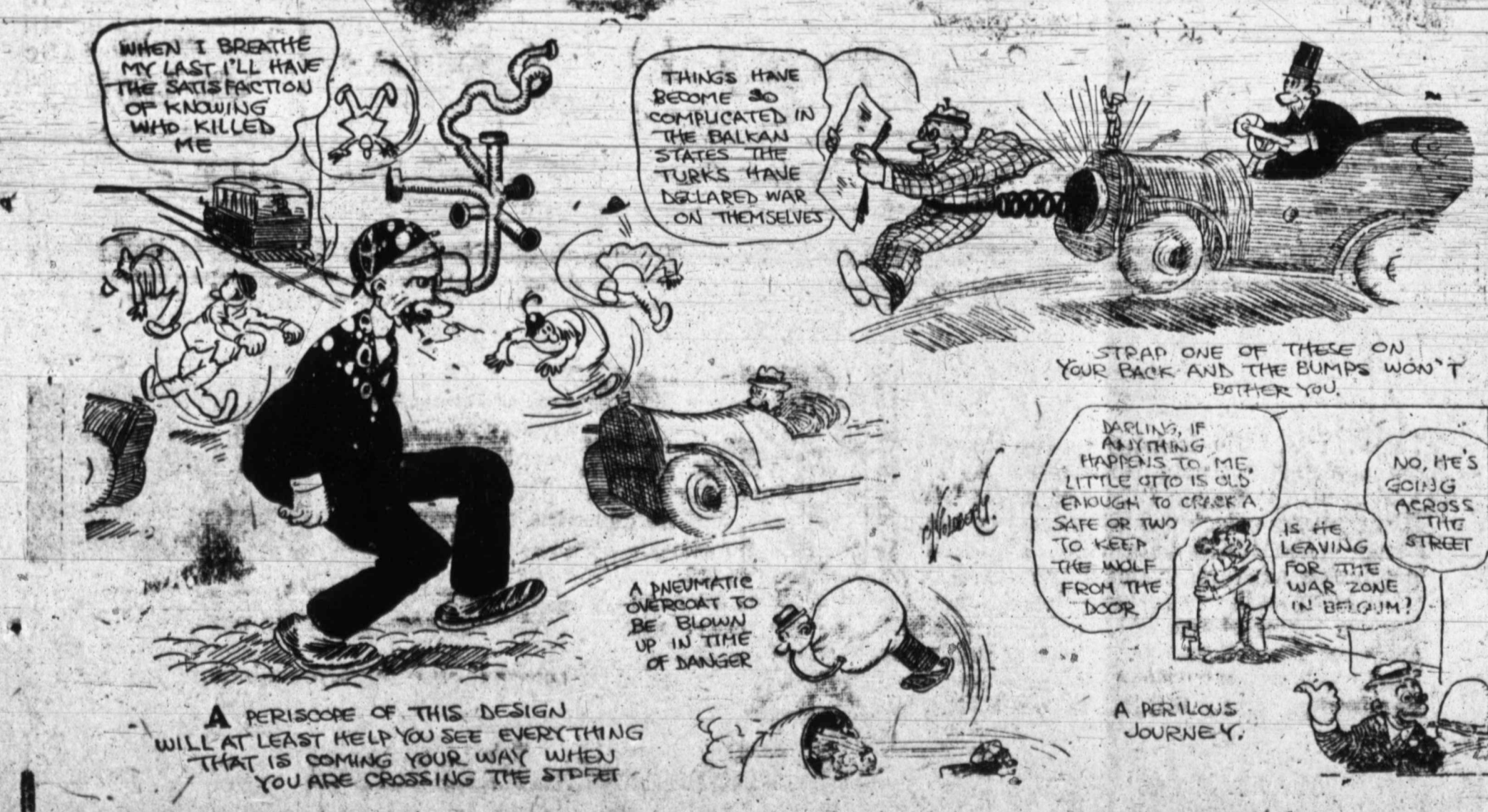
