

WARNING GIVEN BY SUBMARINE BEFORE TORPEDO IS FIRED

LINER IS SHELLED, HOWEVER, BEFORE BEING ORDERED TO STOP—GIVEN SHORT TIME TO ABANDON VESSEL.

PASSENGERS PANIC STRICKEN

Most of Those on Board Women and Children—Details of Attack By Submarine Are Given in Dispatches to London Today.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 11.—The Italian steamer Ancona, sunk by a submarine in the Mediterranean with the loss of a number of American lives reported, was not sent to the bottom without warning, according to accounts of some survivors who have reached Malta.

The Austrian submarine which had been pursuing the liner gave a brief time for the removal of passengers, the Malta advices state.

A news agency dispatch from Fiume, on the other hand, declares the commander of the Ancona ascertains that the submarine gave the liner no signal to stop. He insists the vessel was shelled first from a distance of five miles and that she stopped.

Other accounts from Tunis declare two submarines took part in this attack on the Ancona and that she made no attempt to escape.

Fewer than 150 lives were lost in the sinking of the Ancona, consular advices received indicate. Figures received by the American consul at Naples show that 347 were saved out of 496 on board leaving 149 to be accounted for.

The Boston dispatch from Malta says in part: "We left Naples with a fairly large number of passengers intending to sail direct to New York, but soon after leaving port received a wireless message directing us to stop at Messina for more passengers and cargo. The people aboard were mostly Greeks and Italians with large families on their way to the United States to settle there. The majority, therefore, were women and children."

"At exactly 1 o'clock Monday afternoon we sighted an enemy submarine at a great distance. She came to the surface and made a speed in our direction, firing as she did so, a shot which went wide across our bow. We took this to be a warning to halt. Immediately there was the wildest panic aboard not only among the women and children, but among the men. Women screamed and children clung desperately to their mothers. Meanwhile the submarine continued to shell us, gaining rapidly. The fifth shot carried away the chart house.

"The engines then were stopped and the Ancona slowly came to a standstill. The submarine which we could see now plainly was an Austrian one, came along side. We heard the commander talking to our captain. In a somewhat curt manner we were told the Austrians had given us a few minutes to abandon the ship. Meanwhile the submarine withdrew a little distance.

"We turned to the boats, which began to be lowered, without loss of time, but the passengers were in a pandemonium. Men, women and children seemed to lose their heads completely. The submarine, presumably to accelerate our departure, continued to fire around the vessel. There was a rush for the first boat lowered, and in the confusion these were overturned before they were free from the ship, the occupants falling into the water. Many were drowned before our eyes.

"About eight boats got away clear, some with a fair complement aboard, others half empty. All drifted away from each other."

RUSSIANS ATTACK ALONG EAST FRONT; PROGRESS CLAIMED

LITTLE CHANGE IN SITUATION IN BALKAN THEATER IS REPORTED—ALLIED RESISTANCE APPEARS MORE EFFECTIVE.

REVIVAL OF SUBMARINE ISSUE

New Incident Receives Attention—Serbian Forces Reported to Have Effected Junction With Those of Allies in South.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 11.—An acute revival of the submarine issue, chiefly in the Mediterranean, accompanied by a general offensive by the Russians on the eastern front makes the war news read today like a repetition of history six months old.

Along the southern extremity of the Russian line west of Czartorysk where desperate battles have been under way for several weeks, the Russians claim to have broken the Austro-German lines and to have forced a retreat during which numbers of fleeing soldiers were drowned and 2,000 captured. In the Riga area the Russians maintain they are more than holding their own. West of Riga, the Russians have consolidated the positions they recently won.

Less change is reported from the Balkan front than at any time since the campaign began. It is now definitely established that the French are not in possession of the Serbian town of Vales. A cavalry raid which apparently reached the environs of the place was responsible for the report that the town had been taken from the Bulgarians.

It is reported that both wings of the Bulgarian forces invading Macedonia are retreating by the Anglo-French advance while the Serbians are said to have resumed the offensive in the region of Dubuna Pass, where they recently won an important success. The Serbians are making a stand there and it is also reported that they have established complete communication with the French. This report, if true, implies a temporary safety of Monastir, where a condition approaching panic has been prevailing. Monastir has a large Bulgarian population and it was feared some of the inhabitants might join the bands of Bulgarian irregulars which on several occasions lately have threatened the city.

The Bulgarian troops commanded by General Boyadzieff have crossed the Morava river in Serbia at several places, according to the official statement issued today at Berlin. In the mountains south of the western Morava, the statement adds, 4,000 Serbians have been made prisoners.

ANTI-BOND MEETING 'NOT WELL ATTENDED'

C. H. Van Horn, Who Called Meeting Is Only Opponent to Answer Call

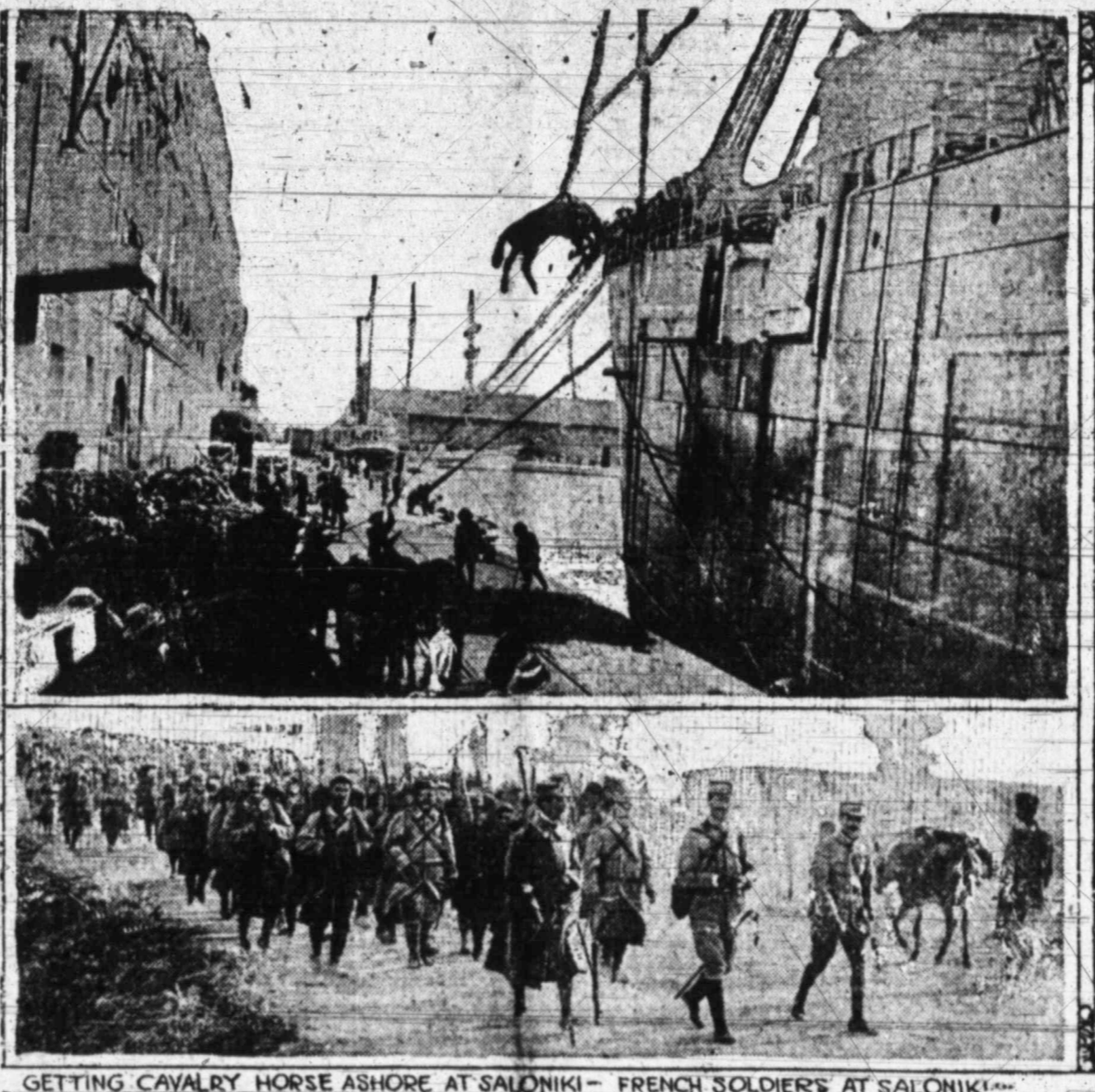
Only one opponent of the court house bond issue answered the call for the mass meeting at the court house Wednesday night. The man who answered the call was the one who called the meeting, C. H. Van Horn. Others in attendance included two newspaper men, two applicants for the postoffice and two members of the committee in charge of the campaign to vote the bonds.

Mr. Van Horn said that he had been informed that there was more opposition to the bond issue in Wichita Falls than the attendance at the meeting indicated, and this had led him to call the meeting. He said that he was not opposed to building a new court house or to the improvement of the present structure as much as he was to a bond issue, and that he was not so much opposed to a short term bond issue as he was to one extending forty years. This, he said, was the feeling of many in his community. He said he was prepared to admit the need of better provision for the protection of the county records, more court room and better accommodations for the jurymen.

M. Skouloudis, the new premier of Greece, having announced his intention of maintaining an attitude of "very benevolent neutrality" toward the entente powers, it is expected that the sending of allied troops to and from the Greek port of Saloniki will proceed without interruption by the Greeks. A dispatch from Athens to Paris says that by agreement with the local authorities the entente allies will construct a jetty and make a new road at Saloniki to facilitate communication between the wharves and the railroad terminals. The authorities also have given the entente allies permission to use part of the wharves to land troops when the wharves are not required for Greek transports. DALLAS CHANCES GOOD, SAYS SELLS

TEXAS COMMITTEEMAN SAYS NATIONAL CONVENTION FIGHT IS WON

By Associated Press. Hillsboro, Tex., Nov. 11.—The candidacy of Dallas for the democratic national convention of 1916 is strongly supported by C. G. Sells, national committeeman of Texas, in a letter to A. L. Blanchard, secretary of the Young Men's Business League of this city. Mr. Sells writes:

My Dear Mr. Blanchard: Your letter calling my attention to the resolution of the Hillsboro Y. M. B. L., favoring the location of the democratic national convention at Dallas, reached me some time since and would have been answered sooner but for a recent absence from Washington.

You may be sure that I am greatly interested in the success of Dallas, and that as the Texas member of the democratic national committee I am continually exerting myself in this behalf, not only because of my interest in the candidacy of Dallas per se but for the further reason that I regard the location of the national convention here as of great advantage to our state and its citizens as a whole. I firmly believe the holding of this convention in Texas would do more to widely distribute dependable information concerning our wealth production and business opportunities than through any other means within our reach for many years.

It would be a rare opportunity for the "folks back home" in the old south to come to Texas for a visit with their friends and relatives who have migrated to our state and would certainly bring a vast number of them to Texas who only know of its incomparable agricultural and business possibilities as they get it from the letters and conversations of those who have participated in our accomplishments but which no one can portray as satisfactorily as first-hand information would insure.

There are thousands of people throughout the north and east who do not fully appreciate Texas or Texas. If they should come among us, see for themselves the actual conditions as they exist, come in contact with our splendid people and enjoy their chivalrous hospitality, I am certain it would be largely in the interest of the entire state and result not only in a better understanding and a closer relationship but induce investment in Texas loans and property much more extensive than ever before. Cheap money always follows security of investment and confidence. A low rate of interest is the most dependable barometer of general prosperity. The chief thing needed for rapid and substantial growth of Texas is more money and a lower rate of interest. Truly we are immensely rich in resources and capacity for development. We are doing more than any other state to increase values but we have not enough available money to satisfactorily provide for the needs of those who are producing our wealth. The interest of farmers, laborers, skilled or unskilled, and business men are identical in this respect but it is especially true of those who till the soil. More money with reduced interest rates is not only our greatest need but it is the thing we must have if we are to advance in generally distributed prosperity as conditions otherwise justify.

There are numerous reasons why the national committee should select Dallas and I know of no good argument to the contrary. The democratic national convention has not been in the southland since 1860 and never in the great southwest, although it has been on wheels for a half century; there is absolutely no party advantage to be gained by holding a national convention in a doubtful state and the records of election returns prove this literally true.

ENGLAND EXPLAINS SEIZURE OF HOCKING

The Hocking is one of the ships owned by the American Trans-Atlantic Company of New York. It has been charged and denied that some of the stock of the company is German owned. The Hocking awaits action in a prize court.

But for the action of Texas democrats in the preliminary campaign emphatically declaring for Woodrow Wilson at the time when the tide was strongly for another he could not have continued in the contest. It would have been "all over." The announcement that the Texas delegation, fort strong would certainly be sold for his so strengthened his candidacy from that time on that the nomination of Wilson was not only probable but practically assured. This condition together with the fact that the Texas delegation stood like "the Rock of Gibraltar" at Baltimore, made Texas the determining factor in overcoming for the first time in our political history the powerful influence of a majority candidate who did not possess the "winning vote" required under the rule and precedent followed in democratic national conventions.

The re-election of President Wilson is generally conceded to be as certain as anything in the future of politics can be. This being true, and particularly since there is nothing to be gained by locating the convention elsewhere, I am sure I reflect the feelings of true and tried Democrats from all sections of the country when I say that "if the convention is to be a love feast it should be held around the hearthstone of rock-ribbed democracy and that we should not write our platform by the light of the enemy's campfire."

I am constantly talking with and writing to leading democrats and aggressively seeking through interviews and correspondence the support of my associate members of the national committee. There is now every indication that Dallas will be successful

In fact, there are but two seriously considered candidates, Dallas, and Chicago. St. Louis is more active recently but for many reasons cannot win. Omaha and St. Paul have practically dropped out. It is generally believed that the republicans will select Chicago. If this is apparent when the members of the democratic committee meet they will undoubtedly choose Dallas. This is particularly true for the reason that the two great parties have never held their national conventions in the same city during the year previous to a pending presidential campaign and they will not do so this time if for no other reason than it would be seriously confusing and bad politics to have two platforms named after the same city. The declaration of principles of more than one party cannot satisfactorily be known as the "Chicago platform." As it now looks the republicans will call their "Chicago platform" and the democrats will stand upon the "Dallas platform."

After all, the important factor in his convention contest will be the money donation. It is generally understood that both political parties will be greatly in need of funds for the 1916 campaign and I am sure the \$10,000 contribution proposed by Texas to be given to the democratic national committee is of first importance. The national committee is called to meet in Washington on December 7th and while our folks have made a splendid preliminary campaign it is absolutely necessary, if we are to succeed, that during the remaining several weeks before the location of the convention is determined an even better organized and more aggressive effort shall be made to insure the raising of \$10,000 for the committee and \$30,000 for the entertainment, and that the candidacy of Texas and Dallas shall from every point of view be most forcefully presented to the committee.

The Young Men's Business League of Hillsboro and its associate leagues throughout the state can do nothing more effective and certain to advance the material interest of Texas than to vigorously press the candidacy of Dallas and to do everything in their power to accomplish the purpose of the resolution about which you have written me. ### GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF COUNTY PLANNED

COMMISSIONERS COURT IS ASKED TO MAKE NEEDED APPROPRIATION

### GOVERNMENT WILL COOPERATE

C. W. Bean, in Presenting Matter to Commissioners, Explains Why it is Advisable

A proposal for a geological survey of Wichita county by United States government engineers was laid before the county commissioners Wednesday afternoon by C. W. Bean. No action was taken, but the proposal may be acted upon later. The cost to the county of such a survey was estimated not to exceed \$2,000. The matter of a survey of the county was taken up with the government engineers who were here several weeks ago. At that time a number of oil men and local citizens with a view of bearing the cost of the survey among themselves asked one of the engineers to write headquarters at Washington to learn whether the government engineers could be employed, their expenses to be defrayed by citizens here. The reply from headquarters was that the government could undertake the survey only through county, state or municipal auspices; that the county or city would be required to pay the expenses of the engineers in the field, the government defraying their salaries and other expenses. A leave of absence to the engineers to take employment from local citizens for the survey was denied.

Mr. Bean in urging an appropriation for the survey pointed out that the oil industry was the most important single industry in the county; mentioning the tax income derived directly from oil property and from the increase in the assessed valuation of other property resulting from the oil industry. He said that whereas the large oil companies employed competent engineers and geologists to make surveys and advise them in their operations, the farmers who owned the land and the small operators were without this information. A survey by the government engineers, he said, would make all this information available to all alike and would be of immense benefit in developing the oil industry of the county, which he believed was just in its beginning.

He said there was hardly an oil field in the country in which the government had not made such a survey at the expense of the counties or state governments and he believed nothing would be of greater value to the county. Among counties in which such surveys had been made and the results made public in the form of bulletins and maps he cited Stephens county, Oklahoma and Palo Pinto county, Texas. Government engineers have indicated that a survey might be started here in the near future if an appropriation was made by the county for that purpose.

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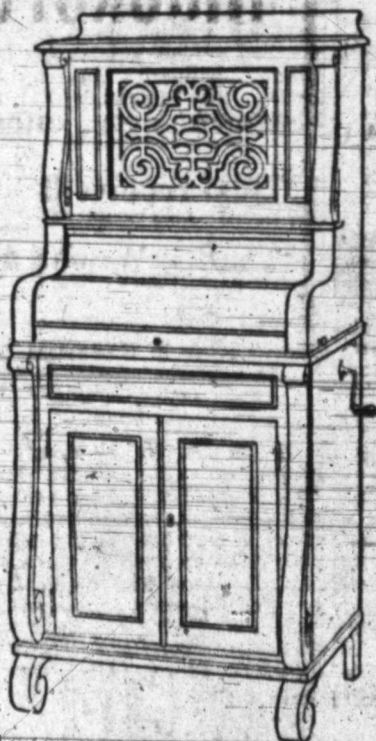

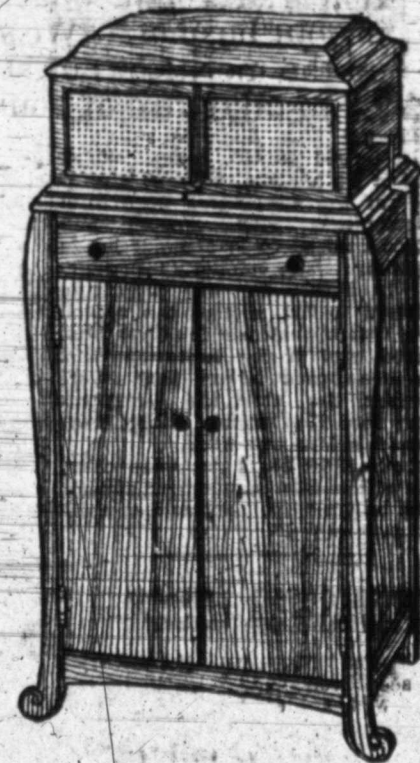

The merchants and Farmers National Bank at Cisco, with a capital stock of \$50,000 and deposits to the amount of \$90,000 at the last call, has closed its doors. Reason—disappearance of the cashier who had been asked by the comptroller of the currency to make good his personal excessive loans to the bank.

If there is any considerable opposition to voting bonds for a new court house in and around Wichita Falls, it failed to show up at the court house last night. All told, there were not more than a dozen who attended the meeting, and if more than one of the number were opposed to issuing bonds for the building and equipping of a new court house they failed to make it known.

National Democratic Committeeman C. Sells writes the Times he is doing all in his power to land the next Democratic National Convention for Dallas, and is hopeful of success. Dallas has offered \$100,000 for this attraction and is expecting financial aid from the balance of the state. Already about one-half the amount is pledged. Ex-Governor Tom Campbell says he will give \$100,000 himself.

Cotton is selling below 12 cents now, and that is lower than it ought to sell for. That is, if the farmers get it as they ought to. The cotton farmers will store their cotton and hold until spring they will get a 12 cents for it, and possibly 15 cents. There is a big shortage in the cotton and there is a demand for every bale of cotton that will be ginned in 1916. Usually there is a surplus of 2,000,000 to 5,000,000 bales. This year there will be no left over or surplus cotton. The National government has made it easy for cotton farmers to hold their cotton by borrowing money on it at 6 per cent, and less interest, and if the farmers do not take advantage of this and sell their product for less than it is worth, the fault will be their own.

Next Saturday, November 13th, the people of Bell county will vote on local option. At present the county is wet. Bell is the home county of Governor Ferguson, and the governor is taking a very active part in the campaign on the side of the wet, and a very hot campaign is being waged. In fact, if we can judge by the page ads appearing almost daily in the Temple Telegram, which newspaper seems to be taking neither side of the question, the campaign has reached that stage where the lie is being exchanged quite frequently. The governor justifies his action in taking an active part in the campaign by saying that the election was brought about in his home county to reflect on him, and through C. C. McDonald, made a proposition that if the leading pros would sign papers pledging to him their support for re-election, he would cancel speaking dates and take no part in the campaign other than vote his sentiments. The pros, however, thought it would be entirely improper for them to accept such a proposition, even though not to do so meant defeat, and therefore have decided to make it just as warm for the governor as they possibly can. It's a nasty fight, and at this distance it is difficult to make even a guess as to what the result will be on Saturday.

If a man can be greater than his maker, then Woodrow Wilson may be a greater man than W. J. Bryan. Had there been no Bryan, Mr. Wilson would have been an even greater man than W. J. Bryan. Bryan would doubtless not make the president Mr. Wilson is making, any more than could Wilson go before the public and educate that public to civic righteousness and political purity as Mr. Bryan is doing. He who propagates an idea is truly great, not he who merely carries out a principle formulated by others. Victor Hugo says an invasion of armies can be resisted, but an invasion of ideas is irresistible. The influence of Bryan's teachings will be felt long after the means for his criticism have been forgotten. Those who speak of W. J. Bryan as a "back number" are giving voice to their wishes and not to their beliefs.—Big Sandy Times.

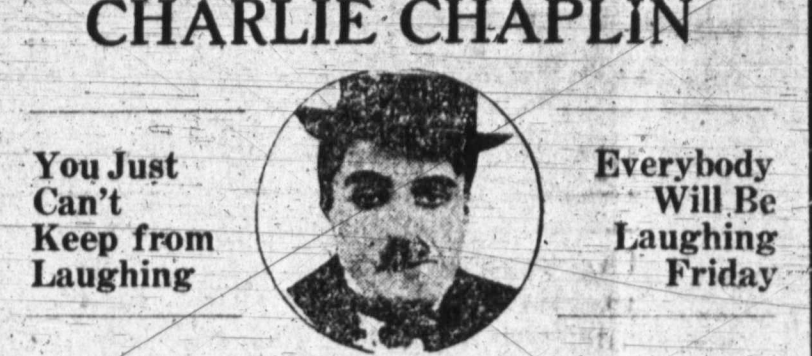

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 11.—"No strong drinks for anyone before noon and no strong drinks at any hour for women and young people of both sexes under sixteen years of age." Such is the government order that has finally opened the eyes of wine merchants to the earnestness of the anti-alcohol campaign in France. By strong drinks are meant all beverages testing over 18 degrees of alcohol. They include most of the

ZEALANDIA INCIDENT BEING INVESTIGATED BY BRITISH Believe That Boat Was Over Three Miles off Shore When Entered and Searched.

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 11.—British authorities here investigating the reported forcible search of the American steamer Zealandia at Progreso, Mexico, by a party from a British cruiser, have information which leads them to believe the Zealandia was lying more than three miles off shore and was therefore not in a neutral port but on the high seas. They are investigating further and the state department is making inquiries. Later information from the British suggests that the Zealandia was suspected of being engaged in smuggling operations was intending to pass from the Mexican port to Sweden. She carried opium, which is used in the manufacture of sharpshooters or appetizers and all brandies and liquors. In the opinion of most wine merchants the measure kills the nodus appetizer, and the prospect of the loss of a considerable portion of their receipts has brought about an aggressive attitude on the part of the liquor trade. If we can't pursue our business, they say, we can no longer pay our heavy-rents. As the wine merchants are among the few who have paid their rents regularly their menace has involved protestations from real estate owners. Any attempt to suppress the sale of alcohol in wine shops before noon will simply result in a greater consumption—exactly the contrary of what is desired. The workman who takes a small liquor glass of brandy in his coffee at the wine shop will take his coffee at home and pour into it without measuring the alcohol that he buys by the quart at any grocery store; consequence more drunkenness instead of less. Druggists who have foreseen such restrictions in the sale of alcohol have anticipated them to a certain extent. One brand of wine which produces a beverage which largely replaced abstemious reduced the strength of his product from 40 degrees alcohol to 23 degrees. The temperance advocates and government authorities contend that if the strength of such drinks may be reduced from 40 to 23 degrees, without appreciable loss of their medicinal value, it is deemed to be in the interests of the public. Many wine merchants who philosophically conclude that the man who drinks strong liquors will content himself with milder ones. The attitude of the drinker himself seems to bear out this theory; for the most part he takes it all as a sort of a good joke with no thought of resistance. PAVING ON TENTH GETS INTO COURTS

CITY FILES SUIT TODAY ASKING COMPANY FOR \$7,000.00 DAMAGES.

RESULT OF LONG CONTROVERSY

Petition Alleges That Pavement is Unsatisfactory and Unsafe From Lamar to Brook.

The tenth street paving put down by R. D. Moxley & Company, has after several months of controversy between the city and the contractors landed in the district court. City Attorney Horace Nutt, acting for the city, today filed suit against R. D. Moxley, T. J. O'Donnell and the Southwestern Surety Company on contract demanding \$7,000 damages.

The petition in describing the condition of the street drops down into the hollows, mounts the ridges and generally rough rides the pavement from Lamar street to Brook avenue as follows: "The said street is in bad repair over a very considerable portion of the whole surface of the same; that that part of the said street has become very rough and uneven and full of ruts; that there are numerous holes in the surface of the same; that certain parts of the surface of said street appears to have sunken below the level of the grade of the said street while at others the appearance is that the surface has been forced upward and above the grade of the said street; the wearing surface has worn away and is gone, leaving exposed the base or body of said paving; that at other places the wearing surface and the body of said paving seems to have become mixed and run together; that said street is in such bad condition and in need of repair that travel over the same is unsatisfactory, and is in some places unsafe; that said street is in such condition by reason of the above alleged conditions and that it needs thorough and immediate repair, etc."

The R. D. Moxley Company is a partnership comprising R. D. Moxley and T. J. O'Donnell. The Southwestern Surety Company is on the bond of the company. The pavement was warranted for five years.

Houses with continental connections were moderate sellers, however, while the advance also seemed to attract considerable realizing and the early fluctuations were somewhat irregular.

CONCRETE SPILLWAY BIDS ARE ALL REJECTED TODAY

County Commissioner Jackson is Given Authority to Take Needed Action in Matter.

The county commissioners today passed an order giving County Commissioner J. P. Jackson plenary powers for handling the situation resulting from the overflow at Lake Wichita Spillway. This action was taken after the bids for a concrete roadway across the spillway had been rejected. 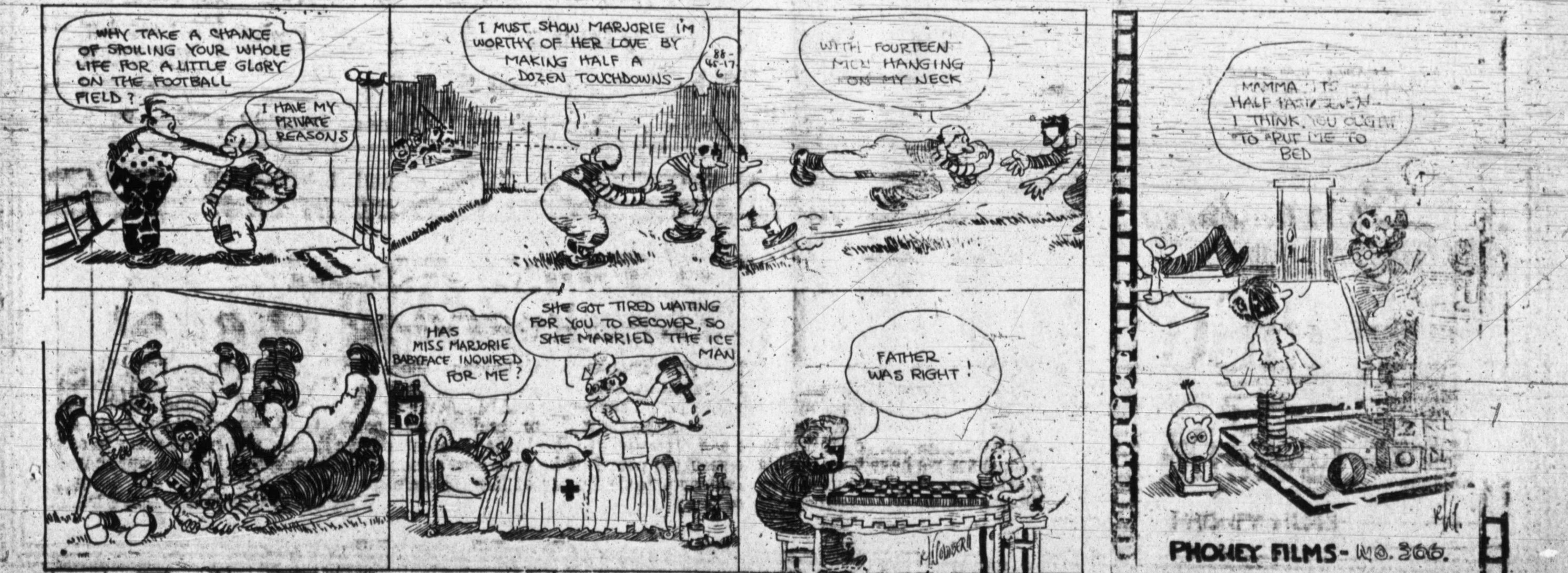

This reverses a former ruling in this respect and means, Mr. Walker states, that an abstract of judgment is invalid unless a revenue stamp has been affixed. The amount of the internal tax, of course, depends upon the amount of the judgment.
