

PRICE OF OIL AGAIN HITS DOLLAR MARK; NEW ADVANCE TODAY

MAGNOLIA PETROLEUM COMPANY TAKES INITIATIVE AND ADDS TEN CENTS TO NEW PRICE POSTED SATURDAY

MUCH NEW WORK EXPECTED

New Quotation Is Only Five Cents Lower Than Maximum for Northwest Texas—Gain of 55 Cents in Price in Four Months

Following swiftly on the heels of Saturday's advance, the price of oil in Northwest Texas reached the dollar mark this morning, when that figure was posted by the Magnolia Petroleum company.

In poker parlance, the ten-cent advance posted by the Texas company Saturday afternoon was "seen" and raised by the Magnolia company, and there is little doubt that the "raise" will be "seen" by the Texas company before today is over.

It was announced this afternoon that the Texas company had met the new advance.

The new price is only five cents less than the maximum figure in this field \$1.05 being the highest price ever paid here.

It is expected that the new price will cause still greater increases in work in this field, and the starting of a number of new rigs in the near future is confidently expected.

TWENTY CENT ADVANCE IN MID-CENTRAL, ALSO

Tulsa, Okla., Nov. 15.—The price of Oklahoma crude oil advanced to one dollar this morning, when the Prairie Oil and Gas company announced an increase of ten cents.

PENNSYLVANIA PRICES GO HIGHER TODAY, ALSO

Pittsburgh, Nov. 15.—The tenth successive advance in the price of the principal grades of crude oil since August 13th was announced today by the South Penn Oil company as follows: Pennsylvania Crude, \$1.00; Cabell, \$1.45; Newcastle, Corning and Mercer black, \$1.40; Somerset, \$1.35; Ragland, 70 cents.

SOUTHEASTERN OHIO OIL NEAR TWO DOLLAR MARK

Lima, Ohio, Nov. 15.—All grades of eastern crude oil advanced five cents a barrel today, sending Southeastern Ohio to within ten cents of the two dollar mark.

CRITICISED WILSON; FIRED, REINSTATED

PRESIDENT INTERFERES IN CASE OF ASSISTANT POSTMASTER IN ILLINOIS.

REFERENCE TO ENGAGEMENT

Wilson Holds That Expression of Views Is Not Sufficient Cause For Discharge.

Washington, Nov. 15.—President Wilson today instructed Postmaster General Burleson to reinstate George Burkitt, recently removed as assistant postmaster at Winnetka, Illinois because he criticized the president for his engagement to be married.

The president qualified his instructions by telling the postmaster general that Burkitt should be restored to his position if there were no other charges against him.

It was stated at the White House that Postmaster General Burleson had no knowledge of the case before it was called to his attention by publication in the newspapers.

SERBS' DEFENSE OF BABUNA PASS IS NOTABLE EXPLOIT

Milan, Italy, Nov. 15.—An account of the recent fighting before Babuna Pass in southern Serbia is forwarded by a war correspondent of the Corriere della Sera.

He says, were 20,000 strong and the Serbians only 6,000. No serious resistance being possible for the Serbians on open ground they set up a defense where the road narrows near Abdi Pass, at an elevation of 2,000 feet.

On the following day the Bulgarians attempted to recapture the lost positions but the Serbians drove them back.

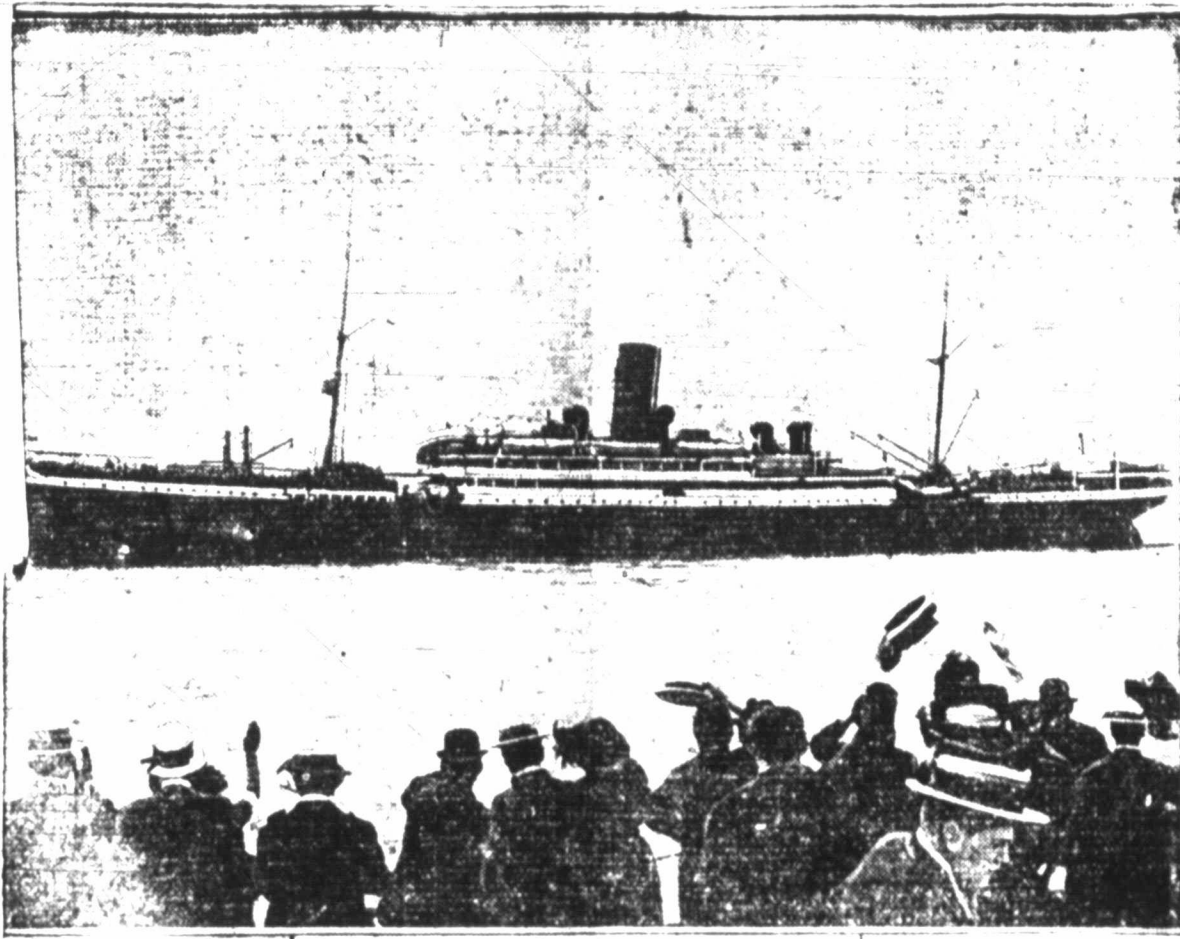
ANTI-SUBMARINE MEASURES ARE DEMANDED BY ITALIANS

The sinking of the steamer Bosnia, following closely the destruction of the Ancona and the Firenze, has resulted in a determined agitation for the adoption in the Mediterranean of measures similar to those which have checked submarine activities in the North Sea.

Careful search is being made for the missing boats of the Firenze and Bosnia, but there is no longer hope of finding additional survivors of the Ancona.

The Italian steamer Ancona sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine flying the Austrian colors, was built in Belfast in 1908. She was a twin screw steamer of 8,214 gross tonnage, 482 feet long and with a beam of 58 feet.

BOOKER WASHINGTON, NOTED NEGRO EDUCATOR, IS DEAD

Succumbs to Nervous Breakdown Sunday—Attained Prominence Though Born in Slavery

Tuskegee, Ala., Nov. 15.—Booker T. Washington, the noted negro educator and founder of Tuskegee institute, died of a nervous breakdown early Sunday at his home here, four hours after his arrival from New York.

After a short time Mr. Washington bought an old plantation for \$500, having done \$250 which he had borrowed from Gen. J. F. H. Marshall, one of his old teachers at Hampton Institute.

The funeral will be held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. The body will lie in state all day to-morrow.

Booker Washington was born a slave at Hale's Ford Va. in 1872 or '83. His mother's name was John Burroughs. His mother was the plantation cook and had several children, all born in slavery.

After working in the mines and furnaces for some time, he obtained employment at the house of Mrs. Paris Ruffner, a lady of New England birth and training, who, though very exacting regarding all matters of work, gave him opportunity to continue his studies.

THREE MILLION BUSHELS ARE IN STORAGE NOW AT PHILADELPHIA

LARGE FLEET WILL BE LOADED

More Than 5,000,000 Bushels Destined for Immediate Shipment to European Ports

Philadelphia, Nov. 15.—What is probably the greatest movement of grain in the country ever has set on foot in progress in Philadelphia all the elevators are filled and there are more than a thousand cars, of grain on the railroad tracks waiting to discharge as soon as the fleet of steamers arriving in ballast from Europe relieves them of the 3,000,000 bushels now stored in them.

In all the westward bound fleet headed for Philadelphia has a carrying capacity of more than 5,000,000 bushels. Ocean freight rates continue to advance daily.

FREEZING TEMPERATURES PREVAILING IN SOUTHWEST

Texas and Oklahoma Points Visited By Cold Wave, Following Recent Warm Weather

Washington, Nov. 15.—High temperatures have turned into freezing weather in Oklahoma, West Texas and Northern Arkansas. It will be much colder in the South Atlantic States with temperatures close to freezing tonight in the East Gulf States and the higher latitudes of the South Atlantic States.

STEAMER NAMED ADRIATIC REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN SUNK

Not Believed, However, That It Is Big Passenger Steamer of White Star Line

New York, Nov. 15.—There was a report this morning that the steamship Adriatic had been sunk, but the report did not state whether the steamship was the big passenger ship of the White Star line or was the British steamship Adriatic which left Kinnass, Greece on October 13 for Philadelphia and passed Paris on October 19.

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TEUTONIC GAINS IN RUSSIA AND SERBIA ARE REPORTED TODAY

RUSSIANS BEGIN NEW OFFENSIVE MOVEMENT EAST OF VILNA ITALIANS REPORT PROGRESS AGAINST AUSTRIANS

GREEK POLITICAL SITUATION

Party Headed By Venizelos May Decide that it is Useless to Enter Elections Which Will Be Held Soon—French Lose Trench

London, Nov. 15.—The capture of 8,500 Serbians is reported by German headquarters today. The Bulgarians took 7,000 of these together with seven cannon. The Serbians continue to be driven back all along the line, it is announced.

In the latest official reports by the Italian general staff progress for the Italians in the fighting on the Isonzo front is claimed.

Saloniki hears that German submarines are using the Bulgarian harbor of Varna on the Black Sea as a base of operations.

On the front in northern France the Germans announce the capture of a projecting French trench, 300 yards long northeast of Etourie, the new position being consolidated with the German line at that point.

The Venizelos party in Greece which favors the allied cause, may not take part in the coming elections, according to a dispatch from Athens to Paris as former Premier Venizelos thinks that even should the liberals win they would be unable to carry through their program in the chamber.

In a statement in the House of Commons outlining his reasons for resigning from the British cabinet, Winston Spencer Churchill declared that the British project of sending a force to Antwerp in October, 1914 originated with Earl Kitchener and the French government.

30 KILLED IN VERONA, ITALY IN AIR RAID BY AUSTRIANS

Prompt Reprisals Are Demanded By Allies—Would Confiscate Property of Aliens.

Rome, Nov. 15.—The air raid upon Verona, which resulted in the death of 30 civilians and the wounding of 39 others has intensified the bitterness felt in Italy against Austria.

Henrietta Citizen Century Old Today; Cast First Vote For Andrew Jackson, Hale And Vigorous In Spite Of Years



Today is the 100th birthday of John Alexander Phelps of Henrietta, believed to be the oldest resident of Northwest Texas. In spite of his age, Mr. Phelps is declared to be in good health, giving promise of the ability to celebrate many more anniversaries. The Henrietta Independent, to whom The Times is indebted for the use of the accompanying picture of Mr. Phelps, has the following to say about him:

Mr. Phelps is a native of Virginia, having been born in Washington county in that state on November 15, 1815. He is of Scotch ancestry. His father, a brawny Scot who himself lived to the great age of 112, came to Virginia from his native home in Scotland in the latter half of the 18th century. He died in the city of Nashville, Tenn.

After living to manhood in his native state, John A. Phelps moved to Tennessee in Hawkins county. Here in 1846 he enlisted in Company F of the 5th Tennessee regiment and spent three years in the U. S. army in the war with Mexico. He took part in the spirited campaigns of that war, and at its close returned with his command to Memphis, where he was mustered out in 1849.

The stormy times of '61 found him again ready to go to the front in defense of the rights of the states, so he left his pleasant Tennessee home surroundings and joined the Confederate army, and took part in its victories and defeats until the Confederacy fell in 1865.

At the close of the war he went to Kentucky, where he lived until 1880, when he came to Henrietta, where he resided continuously since. In 1849 directly after the close of the Mexican war, he married Miss Mary Owen, who shared his vicissitudes with him until she passed over in to the great beyond in Henrietta some eight years ago. There were several children, but there are only two living at this date, Mrs. Kate Chesnut, wife of Judge J. C. Chesnut of Henrietta, with whom he has made his home for many years, and Mrs. Marable of Mt. Pleasant.

PARENTS OF CHILD ENGAGE IN TUSSELE FOR POSSESSION

A. T. THREADGILL OF FT. WORTH ATTEMPTS TO SEIZE SON FROM MOTHER, WHO OFFERS SUCCESSFUL RESISTANCE

CHILD'S UNCLE RUSHES HERE

Makes Quick Trip From Archer City and Texas Situation Results. Father Returns Home and Will Institute Legal Proceedings.

The attempt of A. T. Threadgill of Fort Worth to secure possession of his six year old son who was here Sunday morning in company with the boy's mother, Mrs. Paul Threadgill of Archer City, caused considerable excitement and but for the interference of the police might have been successful. Failed in his attempt to get the child Threadgill announced that he would invoke legal proceedings to have the child brought to Tarrant county.

Mrs. Threadgill, who before her marriage was a Miss Dycus and a member of a prominent Archer county family has separated from her husband. She filed suit for divorce some time ago in Tarrant county but later withdrew the suit when she went to Archer City to live with her mother, intending to file a suit for divorce in the Archer county district court. Mrs. Threadgill teaches music at Archer City and has been visiting Wichita Falls each week to take music lessons herself, usually coming up Saturday and remaining over until Sunday.

Comes in Automobile.

Sunday morning Mrs. Threadgill and her little son and Mrs. Long were walking down Tenth street toward the business part of town, when near the First M. E. Church, South, an automobile containing Mr. Threadgill and a Fort Worth attorney, whose name was not learned, stopped at the curb and Threadgill jumped out and seized the child. Mrs. Threadgill pulled the child from his grasp and ran. Attempting to evade Threadgill until she could reach an officer she walked south, but near the Fairview Hotel on Scott avenue Threadgill again drove up and seized the child the second time.

Mrs. Threadgill again attempted to pull the child away and was about to do so when the Fort Worth attorney also seized one of the boy's arms and helped drag him toward the automobile. Mrs. Threadgill and Mrs. Long, who was still with her, attempted to wrench the boy from them. The boy in the meantime was shrieking loudly and the whole neighborhood was aroused. A call was sent into the police station and Policemen Rawls and Humphreys arrived to find the two men and the two women struggling over the child. Mrs. Threadgill, the child and the two men were driven to the police station in the automobile while Mrs. Long went to the nearest telephone and put in a call for Harrold Dycus of Archer City, brother of Mrs. Threadgill. Within an hour and twenty minutes after the phone call Mr. Dycus, accompanied by Sheriff Turbeville of Archer county, were in Wichita Falls.

Woman's Brother Arrives.

When Dycus faced Threadgill in front of the city hall there were a few anxious moments for Policeman Rawls who stood between the two men and by his presence probably averted trouble. Mrs. Threadgill and the boy immediately left with Mr. Dycus and Sheriff Turbeville for Archer City but not before Dycus had fairly warned Threadgill that any attempt on his part to interfere with Mrs. Threadgill or the child there would bring consequences that he would not name. Threadgill and his attorney are reported to have returned to Fort Worth. Threadgill told the officers that he had not intended to take the child away with him, but that he wanted to see him and talk with him. He declared that he would institute legal proceedings to have the child returned to Fort Worth. Threadgill who is well known here was formerly located in Oklahoma. He is now engaged in the real estate business in Fort Worth.

DAUGHTER LIKELY TO FORTUNE OF C. W. POST.

Battle Creek, Mich., Nov. 15.—Starting complications involving the Post estate of \$33,000 developed today when it became known that the entire fortune of the late C. W. Post would go to his daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Close, regardless of the carefully prepared deed of the food king.

In a suit against the Post estate started by the State of Michigan to collect the inheritance tax it was brought out that several years ago Post went through the bankrupt court and in the testimony given at the time Post stated that the Postum Cereal Company was founded and built up from a fund of \$750 which had been saved up by the first Mrs. Post and placed to the credit of their daughter, Marjorie. Mr. Post also stated that the company was the property of Marjorie and that he, C. W. Post, was her agent. This had never being contradicted according to the records and Mrs. Close will become the sole owner of the Postum Cereal Company. It is understood that Mrs. Close will ask for all money due her and aside from a small share which was given outright to the present Mrs. Post during the life of the deceased, the latter will be denied the immense fortune which she was supposed to have inherited. WEATHER FIGURES TO SOME EXTENT IN FIXING-COURSE OF COTTON

CABLES FORCE GRAIN HIGHER

Advance is Not Maintained, However—Great Britain Supply Reported Lower

By Associated Press. New York, Nov. 15.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 4 to 8 points today in response to firm Liverpool cables and reports of killing temperature in the western belt. January contracts sold at 11.95 and March at 12.17 on this advance, but the unfavorable news did not seem to bring in much commission house demand and the market soon eased off under realizing, with January reacting to 11.89 and March to 12.10 during the early trading. The eastern belt forecast for much colder weather encouraged private predictions that the present cold snap would lead to killing temperatures over the entire belt.

At another time, Captain Barron of Electra attempted a field goal from the 40-yard line, the effort being unconvincingly close to success.

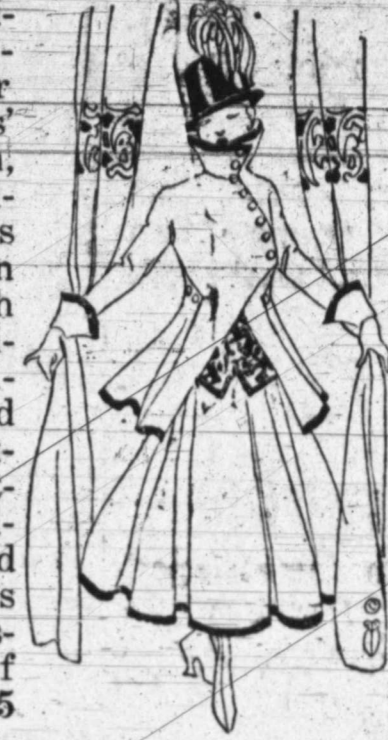

According to his own way of putting it, he and his administration were on trial before the people of his home county, and doubtless he is perfectly satisfied with the verdict rendered.

Booker T. Washington, great negro educator, died at Tuskegee, Okla., yesterday, aged about 57 years. He had done more for his race of people than all the negro politicians that have been elevated to high positions since the war, and his loss will be keenly felt. Once or twice great temptations were held out to him by great men, and he came near accepting some of them, but had the power to resist, saying he preferred to devote his life to establishing an institute that has for its purpose the uplifting of the negro race as a whole.

For making remarks concerning President Wilson's determination to marry again, the assistant postmaster at Winnetka, Ill., was removed by his superior, the postmaster. The assistant appealed his case to the third assistant postmaster general, and it was affirmed. This should be warning sufficient to those holding such position. They may think what they please to think, but if they are particularly stuck on holding their jobs, it is perhaps best to refrain from expressing their thoughts in the hearing of those to whom they are indebted for the positions they hold.

There is little or no opposition to the voting \$225,000 worth of county bonds for a new court house in and around Wichita Falls. What opposition there is to the proposition is at Iowa Park, Burk Burnett and Electra, and even at those places it is believed a large majority of the taxpaying voters are favorable to the proposition and will vote that way on the day of election—next Saturday, November 20th. But it is almost safe to assert that every taxpayer who is opposing will vote, and for that very reason all who favor a new court house should do likewise. The Times feels confident that if all will vote, bonds will carry by a majority considerably more than two to one throughout the county.

Rural mail patrons in Wichita county will probably receive their mail late on November 27th. On this date there is to be an examination here for eligibility for an auto-delivery route at Electra. Those who possess will also be eligible for service here when the automobile delivery is established from this office. The carriers already in the service will be given an opportunity to qualify. There are not enough substitutes to take their places on that day and the carriers will be permitted to take the examination before starting out on their routes.

C. A. Walling, temporary administrator of the estate of A. J. Van Cleave, deceased, has filed application for appointment as permanent administrator. J. C. Pepper of Brownstown, Mo., has also filed application for appointment as permanent administrator. The will of Mr. Van Cleave named Edmund Newell as administrator and, in case of the latter's death or failure to qualify, J. C. Pepper was named for the administrators. It is charged in Walling's application that Pepper failed to qualify, but that when some of the property of the state came into his possession he entered into a conspiracy to dispose of it. The estate is appraised at more than \$100,000. A son who is 17 years of age is the only heir.

Corpus Christi, Texas, Nov. 15.—Great interest was manifested over South Texas today over the sale of the property of the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico Railroad properties, under orders of the federal court, which was to occur at New Orleans, La., today. The road has a mileage of 329 extending from Houston to Brownsville and thence to Sam Fordyce. It was built in 1903-04 by B. F. Yoakum and associates, and the first train to be operated on the line made the trip from Corpus Christi to Brownsville, July 4, 1904. 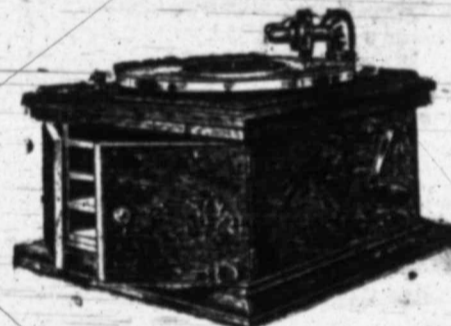
