



To the Voters of Wichita County!

On next Saturday, November 20th, you will have an opportunity to vote upon a proposed bond issue for a new court house, and we trust to see every loyal property owning citizen come forward with that same degree of loyalty to our county that has characterized their action in the past in dealing with the question of public improvements.

It is useless to argue the demand for such an improvement, the need for a new building being at once apparent to every citizen who has had occasion to visit or view the present inadequate structure. Not only is this fact impressed upon our own citizens, but our deficiency in this respect is so glaring that it attracts the attention of strangers, very much to our discredit. The present building, as is generally known, was constructed about thirty years ago, and does not begin to meet the requirements of the county, either in preserving the records, or in providing a suitable place for sessions of the respective courts. This being the case it is clearly the duty of the citizenship of the county to provide a relief, and no better opportunity will ever be provided than that contained in the forthcoming election. There is no hope of securing such an improvement other than through the issuance and sale of bonds, and in fact this is the only logical manner in which to provide the required funds.

A bond issue, such as is proposed, will provide a building that will meet the requirements of the county for many years to come, and that, too, at the very nominal cost of less than nine cents on the hundred dollar valuation each year. It would be false economy to attempt to improve or add to the present structure, which has served its usefulness, and as the matter thus presents itself it devolves upon the property tax paying

voters of the county to again demonstrate their loyalty on next-Saturday. We believe you will do it. We know you will do it! The citizenship of this county has rever failed in such an emergency. This matter has been neglected from time to time, in the press of other matters, and now, with an additional district court, rendering the necessity the more urgent, we do not believe that this people will discredit their county, their courts and themselves, by a failure to endorse the measure.

In this connection we want to urge every friend of the movement, who is a qualified voter, to go to the polls on Saturday and register your ballot in favor of this much needed improvement, a building for which there is a greater demand than for any other that could be named. Do not content yourself with the thought that others will take care of the proposition, but assume that responsibility that rests upon you, as a progressive citizen, to encourage every enterprise that is of a commendable nature. Let us make the vote as near unanimous as possible, thus again exemplifying that spirit of "pull together" for which our people are noted. While the friends of the movement are very much gratified to know that but little opposition has developed, still we should be active, even until the polls close on Saturday.

Some objection, or rumor of an objection, has been advanced, having for its foundation the theory that some change might be made in the location of the court house. Such a rumor, however, is entirely without foundation and the writer has the assurance of the commissioners court that no change in location will be considered, and that the building, if constructed during the term of office of the present court, will be placed on the present site. This assurance should be sufficient to satisfy anyone who may have been the least in doubt regarding the matter, and there is no occasion for the injection of such an issue at this time.

The only issue involved in connection with the proposed improvement is that of the need for a new court house. If such a building is needed, and this all admit, the opportunity is provided and it is our duty to take advantage of it, and go to the polls Saturday and vote for the bonds.

Let us urge every citizen to do his full duty and this done we shall soon see a creditable building in the place of the one to which we now refer with apologies when explaining to a stranger within our gates. Let us provide a court house for Wichita County that will be in keeping with other public institutions. We take pride in our magnificent school buildings, but refrain from making reference to our temple of justice. We praise our splendid church edifices, but never once point to the county's own home. In fact, it is here that we illustrate the greatest deficiency in public spiritedness, and about the only instance wherein this people can be charged with extreme neglect. Let us awake to a knowledge of our negligence and redeem ourselves on Saturday by keeping step with the march of progress manifested in dealing with other matters.

Surely the people of Wichita County will not permit the report to go out that they are unmindful of the requirements for the safe-keeping of the county records and for the proper accomodation of the courts of the county. We do not believe that you will, but rather expect a manifestation of that same spirit of progress that has made our county site the most talked of city of the entire state.




