MAY TEST CITY'S RIGHT TO ESTABLISH SALOON LIMITS

Charter Provision Will Be Invoked in Cases Arising From Recent Liquor Sales

A test of a recently enacted law, punning it a penal offense to sell liquor outside of prescribed limits, is incorporated today operating under special charters, will probably follow the filing of complaints yesterday in the cases of the bootleggers arrested Saturday. The sales of liquor were made in what is known as the flat district which is beyond the limits prescribed for the sale of liquor in the city charter. Ordinary bootlegging is treated here merely as a misdemeanor but local officers have determined to give the new law a test. If it is held valid they believe there will be no further trouble in stopping the sale of intoxicants in the flat district as there would be few who would risk a term in the penitentiary for the profit that they might derive from the illegal sale of liquor. The new law has never been tested and there is some doubt among local attorneys as to its constitutionality.

Under the present city charter as adopted by the legislature the limits within which liquor may be sold were defined in the charter as it passed the legislature. A provision of the charter, however, gives the voters the right to amend the charter including the saloon limits, which in effect would permit the citizens of Wichita Falls to amend the laws of the state relative to the sale of liquor.

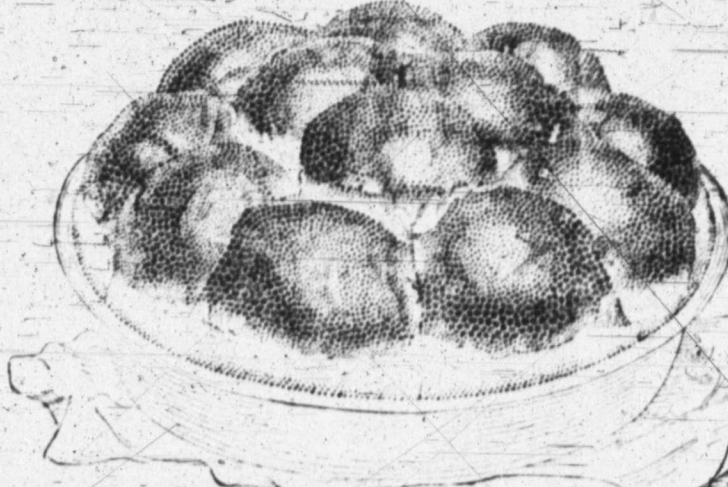

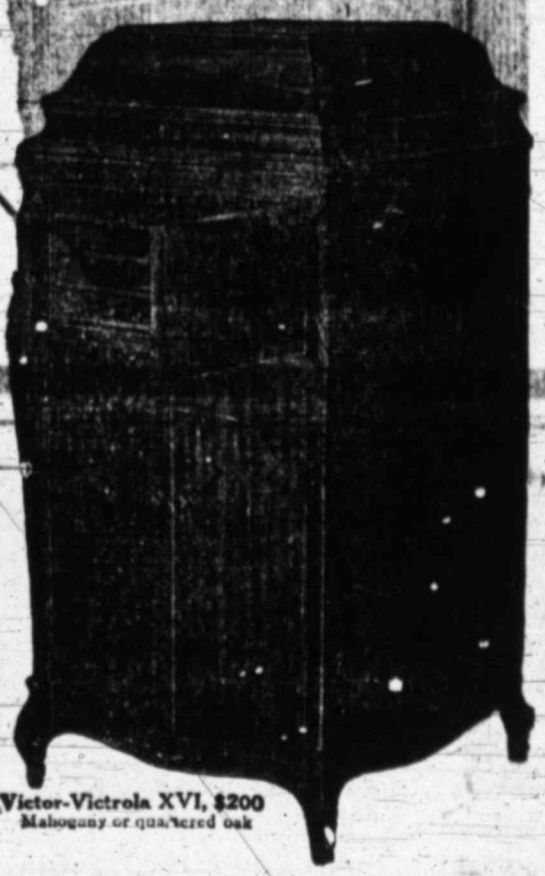
