RUSSIAN ASSISTANCE COMING?

Petrograd reports a slight advance along the Styre river, with sharp checks for the Germans and Austrians in both the northern and the southern portions of the eastern front.

HENDERSON FLOORS OSBORNE AT DALLAS TUESDAY NIGHT

"Red" Knocks Californian Out in the Fourth Round—15 Round Bout Here Tomorrow

"Chick" Osborne dropped to the mat in the fourth round at Dallas Tuesday night and the referee's arm had marked off ten seconds before he arose. That tells the story of the return to Dallas of Red Henderson who will again meet "Sailor" Davis tomorrow night at the Business Men's Athletic Club. A message to The Times about the fight says: "Red Henderson, the Dallas demon knocked out Chick Osborne in the fourth round. Henderson was master of the situation from start to finish, and it was readily seen that the Californian could not stand Red's snappy blows. Osborne did not land a blow."

The Dallas fight fans demanded that Red be brought back there for a match, no other boxer, apparently being able to furnish the sort of entertainment they wanted. That he could justify his popularity there is seen from the result of his fight Tuesday night. Osborne is a Californian boxer of considerable note. Henderson's bout with Davis will go fifteen rounds tomorrow night, the longest he ever staged here. His excellent showing against the sailor last Friday night in the bout which is generally considered a draw, causes his supporters here to predict that in fifteen rounds he will be able to make the navy representative. Whether either is able to set a new decided advantage or not if the boxing is as fast and as clever as it was last Friday the fans will have plenty of entertainment. The semi windup will be a five round go between Willard Bell, a factory district youth who can box and write poetry with equal proficiency and Hefner, the young fellow who has figured creditably in a number of preliminary bouts on Athletic club programs. There will be other preliminary events, but on account of the unusual length of the main bout the preliminaries will be few.

The Dallas fight fans demanded that Red be brought back there for a match, so other boxer, apparently being able to furnish the sort of entertainment they wanted. St. Louis is out after both the Democratic and Republican national conventions and a fund of \$200,000 is being raised for that purpose.

According to Senator Sheppard, a pool has been formed to bear down the price of cotton, and the matter has been laid before the Department of Justice, where it will in all probability remain until the pool accomplishes its purpose.

Governor Ferguson and General Carranza met at Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, yesterday and held a conference of more than an hour, when Governor Ferguson with his staff returned to the American side. At first it was stated the meeting between the governor and Carranza would take place at about the center of the international bridge, and that arrangement would have been better. Now, the Mexicans, no doubt, will say it was beyond the dignity of their chief to meet on equal terms and on neutral ground with no greater a personage than the governor of Texas. The press dispatches giving an account of the meeting quotes Governor Ferguson as having been greatly impressed with Carranza.

The Serbians, history tells us, have always been fighters, and as a rule flingers die with their boots on. Serbians has about reached the end, but his is not far distant.

The Irish are sympathetic to America in all loads, say the areas dispatches, which is another evidence that the Irish are not bursting any blood vessels in their efforts to enlist on the side of Great Britain.

After the bonds for the new court house are issued, it will bring the total bonded debt of Wichita county up to about \$300,000, and that is not much for a county that has \$20,000,000 of taxable value. The taxpayers could well afford to vote upon themselves a half million dollars worth of bonds, which would build good roads, and the movement should start with the people outside of Wichita Falls.

And this is the way the Denison Herald, a strong anti newspaper and supporter of Governor Ferguson for the office which he now holds, sizes him up:

"While exclaiming, 'Let us have peace,' the Governor has been walking around with a chip on his shoulder ever since he was inaugurated. He strode into Bell county—his home—with it, as he thought, firmly fastened to his chapeau. He dared his eyes to knock it off, whereupon they proceeded to do so in good old-fashioned style. And now, if the truth were known, the Governor is sorry that he spoke. He intruded himself into the mess when there was no occasion for it and in addition to lowering the dignity of the Governor's office, he has by his acts weakened himself politically. And while the circumstance may not be the cause of his having opposition in the primary next year, the effect will be felt in an opposition Legislature, concerning which his immediate predecessor can furnish him abundant information."

A BIT OF HISTORY.

John T. Poe, living at Longview, sends up a copy of the Huntsville item dated July 31, 1884. It carries at its masthead the names of Grover Cleveland and Thomas A. Hendricks, the Democratic nominees for President and Vice President respectively. G. Robinson and Son were the editors and owners of the paper, and the senior member of the firm thus recounts: "The best thing we have read for some time is a history of Houston newspaperism, as published in the American Journalist of St. Louis. As we have not kept any run of 'Houstons' papers—their births, lives and deaths—the entire sketch is history to us, and we feel it is in the main correct, though not a word is said of 1844, when Willard Richardson conquered the old Telegraph for the year, receiving his board as compensation and a bonus of \$50 when the one-armed ecologist, Francis Moore, returned from a visit to his native state, New York. It was then the young surveyor went to Galveston, and devoted himself to the News, and from within the News of today was evolved. At all other points, so far as our memory goes, the history of the newspaper in Houston is correct, and was perused by us with greedy interest. Alas, what leaps of things would escape our defaulting memories, but for the typeset 'Thank God for the production of the inventor, albeit to the poor mortals, it would seem He delayed the job many centuries!' There we have the statement that

Willard Richardson, the man who made a success of the Galveston News, was a young surveyor when he took hold of the property. And not what a magnificent reward was young Richardson's for a year's work in Houston, his board and a bonus of \$50, which was probably thrown in for good measure. The Galveston News passed to the ownership of a nephew of Willard Richardson's and later it was purchased by A. H. Belo and associates. It was Belo who carried out the idea of a duplicate of the Galveston News in Dallas, and that arrangement stands to this day—not a satisfactory arrangement, we would think, to the people of Galveston, for the youngster is now the dominating influence. The Dallas Journal is printed by the same concern. So that we have three considerable newspapers that were made possible by a man who worked a whole year for his board.—Waco Times-Herald.

Officers here and at Electra believe they know the identity of the man who drove the car. It is believed that he intended to drive the car back to Electra last night.

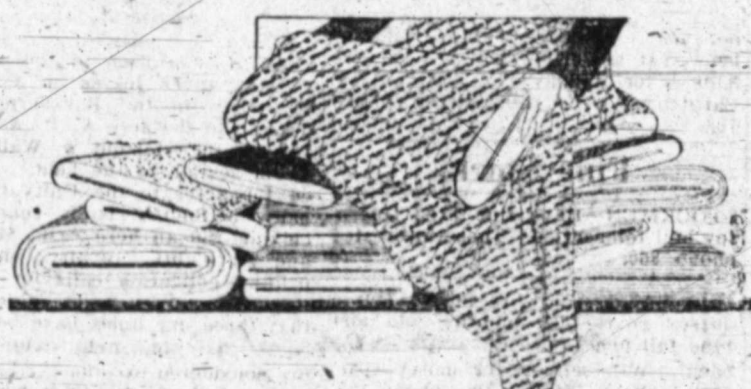

81 OIL RIGS IN OPERATION NOW IN NORTHWEST TEXAS

Work Still Increasing—New Wilbarger Location—Good Price Paid For Burkburnett Leases
 Work in the Northwest Texas oil fields is more active now than for nearly two years past, as a result of the recent advance in price. There are now 81 rigs and drilling wells at Electra, Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Petrolia and there is every reason to believe that this number will be increased to 100 within a few weeks. With the exception of the well being drilled by Urban and associates north of Burkburnett, practically all of the new work is on inside locations. When it is remembered that five months ago there were less than a dozen rigs going in the entire Northwest Texas field, the extent of the present operations may be understood.

NEW WILBARGER LOCATION IS MADE BY PRODUCERS

With a certain degree of mystery still enveloping the results of the Producers Oil Company's test in Wilbarger county on the Waggoner tract where a well was put down well past the 2000 foot mark, color is lent to the numerous rumors that have been afloat regarding this well, by the fact that the company has made a new location 1000 feet west of No. 87, the new location being No. 97. The rig is now being built. No. 87 is generally understood to have had some showings that were promising and the belief prevails that a small well has been found there. The finding of oil in any considerable quantity there would mean a decided extension of the field to the westward.

FIFTY DOLLARS AN ACRE FOR BURKBURNETT LEASES

W. R. Ferguson of this city has recently given leases on a total of 140 acres in the Burkburnett field out of the 200 acre A. B. & M. survey in the Morton & Walker and Thom section of the field. He leased 100 acres to the Unity Oil Company, a South Texas concern, receiving \$30 an acre cash, \$20 in oil and an eighth royalty, while the drilling obligation calls for the putting down of ten wells. Considering that three dry holes have been drilled in that immediate vicinity, these are considered excellent terms. Forty acres of the same tract was leased by Mr. Ferguson to G. C. Wood and Bert Broday for \$50 an acre drilling to start in the near future. The Unity Oil Company, which has its headquarters at Beaumont, is expected to do considerable development work in Northwest Texas. Joe Myers of Beaumont, representing the company was here recently.

MOST OF NEW LOCATIONS IS IN ELECTRA DISTRICT

Most of the new work now going on in Northwest Texas, is in the Electra vicinity, which has 44 of the 81 rigs now going. The Producers Company is operating most of these. Burkburnett has 31 rigs in operation, the remainder being at Petrolia and Iowa Park.

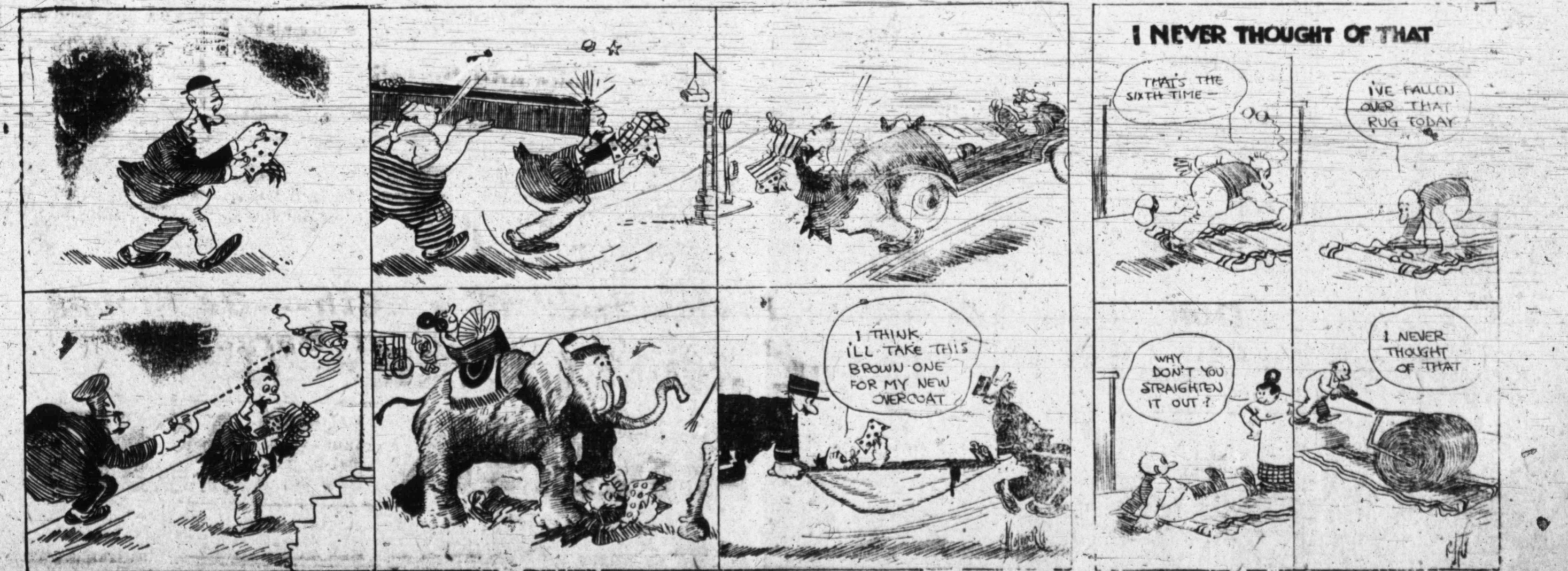
