London, Nov. 25.—Although the full text of the Greek government's reply to the collective note present ed by the entente powers has not yt been made public in England, there is every indication that the British government is satisfied with the position taken at Athens. The asssurances given by Greece differ in marked degree from the previous expressions of benevolent neutrality. They are neither vague nor evasive but promise explicitly that no milimeasures will be taken against Serbians, French or British troops in case they retire to Greek territory. Whether this guaranty of safety to the allied troops will carry Greece to the extent of opposing with her armies any German forces which might attempt to pursue the allies across the Greek border, probably will not be ascertained until full details are received in regard to the assurances given by Greece.

From the optimistic tone of the Athens dispatches to London, however, it may be inferred that Greece has yielded on every essential point raised by the allies. The Greek siting been cleared finally.

The collective note was presented to the Greek government Tuesday As outlined in unofficial dispatches it contained no request for Greek intervention in the war with the allies, but asked Greece to give assurance that she would preserve her friendly attitude in case the allied troops in Macedonia should be compelled to retreat across the frontier to Greek territory.



General Nogi's later life was sad dened by the loss of his two sons in the war with Russia. He was con stantly requested by relatives and ment of Japanese custom and thus to continue the succession of his Nogi, however, refused, de claring that to his mind the practice of adoption had worked very badly and often had resulted in bringing discredit to the family. He prefer red that his own house, which had been given the rank of nobility by the Emperor should become extinct

This desire was contained very explicitly in his last testament in which he declared "the tombs of the family ancestors should be cared for by blood relations so long as any of them survive and not by others.' 

SNOW IMPORTANT FACTOR IN AUSTRO-ITALIAN FIGHTING

riously Affcest Operations at This Year and Little Can

By Associated Press. Geneva.—(By mail) In the semiircle from Trent to Trieste where Austro-Germans and Italians are fighting for supremacy, military op-erations will be seriously affected by now. Neither side dares to advance large guns which may be lost in a night owing to a heavy snowfall. On the Austro-Italian frontier

where fighting is taking place at ten thousand feet above sea level over several miles of mountains where every little pass means a small batweather conditions and snow are important factors. On these mountains ordinary regiments, howand only Alpine troops on both sides

the beginning of October several feet of snow has fallen in he Swiss Tyrolese and Italian Alps paye 9,000 feet and there is besides always the danger of an avalanche. Under these conditions Alpine war-fare will be impossible even for a trong force. The men and mountain settliery are practically buried in deep snew in the higher Alps and the attack must be postponed until spring. Thus Italy feels secure from an invasion of Lombardy and Venetia during the winter and can employ her reserve forces for other

On the Isongo, however, it is another matter for the country around that the Italian army will attempt to force its way to Trieste and Fiume via Tolmino and Goritza this winter. Daily the attacks on these towns on the main railway are coming flercer. The Italians con tinue to bring up more heavy artillery which now is in a semi circle around both cities.
