So many have accepted Henry Ford's invitation to accompany him to Europe on his mission of peace that it has been neccessary for him to charter a second passenger ship to acconimodate the crowd. Before bringing about peace in Europe Mr. Ford consulted with President Wilson, and the President has given his consent and approv al of the scheme.






