WHEAT PRICE SOARS ON CANADIAN ACTION

SEIZURE OF 20,000,000 BUSHELS CAUSES ADVANCE AT OPENING TODAY

REACTION FOLLOWS, HOWEVER

Early Advance of Over Two Cents Is Not Held and Nervousness Prevails Market

DENIES SEIZURE WAS REQUESTED IN LONDON

London, Nov. 29.—The official press bureau today made the following announcement: "With reference to the announcement from Canada on November 28 that the Canadian government had commandeered 16,000,000 bushels of wheat at the request of the British government, the board of agriculture states that the British government has made no such request and that at present they have no information on the subject."

BEIEVED CANADA'S ACTION WILL HAVE BULLISH EFFECT

The following dispatch was received by a prominent Wichita Falls grain man from one of the big grain men of Chicago this afternoon: "Chicago, Nov. 29.—From 12 to 14 million bushels of wheat in Fort Williams, Canada, elevators belonging to farmers of Western Canada who do not care to sell, apparently the Canadian government has commandeered. Their orders affect wheat going into elevators prior to November 25 and not after that date. This means the government will establish a price instead of making its orders through Atlantic seaboard exporters. Government competition will cause British importers to be free sellers so as not to compete with English government."

KATY AND DENVER ENGINES IN HEADON COLLISION HERE

Five Persons Are Slightly Injured Early Sunday and Equipment Is Damaged

Five persons were injured, none seriously, and a locomotive engine sustained slight damage, early Sunday morning when northbound engine No. 7 was struck by a string of Katy-coupled. The collision took place at the corner of Seventh and Michigan, shortly before No. 7 left for the north. The injured: J. P. Ray of Fort Worth, mail clerk, right hip slightly bruised; A. E. Golden of St. Jo on route to Amarillo, right eye, slightly bruised; W. K. Hamilton of Electra, hip slightly bruised; A. B. Benson, negro of Childron, Texas, cheek slightly bruised; Lorain Weaver, aged ten years of Denver, eye slightly injured by glass. The Denver train was standing on track 4, the engine being at the corner of Seventh street. A string of five Katy and northwestern engines from the north yard was coming south in charge of a hostler, and the seventh street switch was thrown by someone on the Katy engine, but the Katy engines proceeded the first one striking the Denver engine head on. The pilot and pilot beam of the Denver engine were torn off and it was damaged to the extent of about \$500. A freight engine was derailed and continued on its run without delay.

INTERURBAN SUBSTATION IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Sherman, Texas, Nov. 29.—The Texas Traction Company's substation, one mile south of Sherman, was burned early today with a loss of \$2,000. Traffic on the Dallas interurban line will be temporarily stopped.

NO OPTION MARKET FOR WHEAT IN WINNIPEG TODAY

Winnipeg, Nov. 29.—There will be no option market here today except for coarse grains. It was not yet decided as to whether there would be a cash market for wheat.

FRENCH STEAMSHIP SUNK; FATE OF CREW UNKNOWN

Marseilles, France, Nov. 29.—The French steamship Omara has been sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine. No word has been received of the 20 members of the crew and it is feared they have perished.

FRENCH GUN FIRING DOWN INTO PASS

AMENDMENT TO OIL LEASE ON WAGGONER LAND

An amendment to the oil lease held by the Producers Oil Company on block 19, Waggoner Colony lands owned by E. McBurney and located near Electra, has been filed in the county clerk's office. The lease is amended to permit the attaching to oil wells of apparatus to save casing head gas. McBurney is to be paid for this gas at the rate of four cents a thousand feet for one-eighth of the gas so produced. The Producers Company has recently installed a large compressor in the field at Electra for the making of gasoline.

EARLY FALL OF MONASTIR IS EXPECTED

Paris, Nov. 29.—A further advance by Bulgarian troops toward Monastir is reported in a dispatch filed yesterday at Saloniki. It is said the Bulgarians on Saturday captured the river Carosou north of Monastir which city is being covered by Serb positions extending four miles toward Prilep. The entry of the Bulgarians into Monastir is considered possible, the dispatch says.

502 CANNON TAKEN BY GERMANS IN SERBIA

SAYS TIME TO FIX PEACE TERMS HERE

LONDON PAPER BELIEVES ALLIES SHOULD DEFINE DEMANDS AT ONCE

DECLARES SUCCESS ASSURED

Naval Blockade Bound to Secure Victory in the End—Opposes Treaty With Denmark.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 29.—Belief that the time has arrived for the allies to begin to define clear and definite terms of peace is expressed by the news paper Post in an editorial on the ground that there will soon be less chance of losing in negotiations what has been gained on the sea and field. The Post contends that without "selling the skin before killing the bear" it may be assumed victory for the allies is assured if only because, with out undue strain, Great Britain could maintain a naval blockade indefinitely and history has shown that such pressure alone would in the end secure victory.

The newspaper also protests strongly against the treaty of commerce which has been negotiated between Great Britain and Denmark permitting commodities to be reexported from Denmark to neutral or belligerent countries, as shipments are not contraband.

BULGARIANS PREPARE FOR ATTACKS ON OTHER FRONTS

Send Troops to Meet Any Action By Roumanians or Russians—Serbs Hold Monastir.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 29.—The Bulgarians are withdrawing troops from the Turkish frontier and are sending them to other fronts in anticipation of an attack from the side of Roumania or by way of the Black Sea, says a Reuters dispatch from Saloniki, while some of the German forces in Serbia are proceeding to the support of the Bulgarians against a prospective Russian invasion. That a section of the Agra plains in Bulgaria is still opposed to the war is illustrated by the fact that a squad of 26 voluntarily surrendered Saturday to a British outpost on the Strumitsa front. South of Prilep the Serbians are maintaining their position and Colonel Vaselich, who is holding Monastir, declares his intention to defend it to the last.

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GERMANY CLAIMS COMPLETE SUCCESS IN SERBIAN DRIVE

ALLIES ARE STILL HOPEFUL, HOWEVER, OF BEING ABLE TO TAKE OFFENSIVE WITH SUFFICIENT FORCES SHORTLY.

MONASTIR'S FATE NOT KNOWN

Contradictory Claims as to Action There—Lull on Eastern Front Prevalent—Greece Answers Second Note of the Allies.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 29.—The British public is not inclined to grant the German contention that the Serbian campaign of the central powers has been brought to a successful conclusion. The hope is expressed here that the winter weather will give time for reorganizing the Anglo-French forces until they are strong enough to assume the offensive before the invaders have consolidated their positions in Serbia. Russia also is counted on to play a part in these operations.

In the meantime the only active military operations seem to be centering around Monastir, the fate of which is obscure. The many contradictory reports on this subject vary from the assertion that the city is still in the hands of the Serbians, to the claim that the Bulgarians, accompanied by detachments of Austrians and Germans, have occupied the city. Further to the north, it is reported, the Serbian armies, divided into two sections are retreating to Albania and Montenegro.

It is not yet apparent whether Austro-German forces are to be sent against the Anglo-French lines, or those at Saloniki but at the other extreme of the Balkan front the Roumanians are expecting a heavy attack from the Austrians.

The entente ministers at Athens are said to have received the reply of Greece to their second note; Greece is reported to have promised to meet all demands which do not threaten to compromise her neutrality.

An unmitigated lull prevails along the eastern front. From the west come official reports of a lively air and sea skirmish off the Belgian coast.

WILSON RESUMES WORK ON MESSAGE TO CONGRESS

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—President Wilson returned from New York early today and immediately resumed work on his next annual address to Congress. He expects to get it in final shape for the public printer today. The president took the address with him to New York and discussed it with Col. E. M. House, his personal friend and political adviser. While in New York Mr. Wilson is understood to have discussed the outlook for peace in Europe with Col. House, who went abroad several months ago to investigate the situation for the president.

DINWIDDIE JUDGMENT IS AFFIRMED AT FORT WORTH

The court of civil appeals at Fort Worth Saturday affirmed the verdict in the case of T. B. Dinwiddie vs. J. M. Guffey Petroleum Company. Dinwiddie was injured several years ago at Electra when he fell from a derrick of the Guffey Company and received a judgment which was reversed and remanded. On the second trial he received a judgment for \$100,000 which was affirmed by the higher court Saturday. The case is now expected to go to the supreme court.

GREEK NOTE FAVORABLE TO ENTENTE

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 29.—The Greek government is ready to discuss proposition made by the entente powers and satisfy all demands which will not compromise its neutrality, says an Athens dispatch.

REPLY TO ALLIES NOTE WAS DELIVERED SUNDAY

Paris, Nov. 29.—The Greek government's reply to the latest note of the entente powers was delivered Sunday, says a Havas dispatch from Athens.

The ministers representing the quadruple entente presented to the Greek government Friday a collective note outlining certain measures the powers desired Greece to take in conformity with the preliminary agreement recently reached. The note was in response to the Greek government's request for precise information as to what was wanted.

STATE W. C. T. U. PRESIDENT SPEAKS SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Mrs. Curtis of Waco Blames Saloon For Many Evils—Political Side Question

The right of the saloon to exist, from either a political, economic or religious standpoint was denied Sunday afternoon by Mrs. Nanette Curtis of Waco, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Texas, in an address at the M. E. Church, South. The address was heard by about 200 people.

Mrs. Curtis was introduced by Mrs. Ida C. Arnold, president of the local chapter of the W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Curtis placed the blame for most of the poverty and disease of the present day at the door of the saloon, and declared that practically all the ills of the present day, physical and otherwise, had their roots in the saloon.

An interesting feature of her talk was her consideration of the prohibition question, from the political standpoint. She said that if a man was a democrat he believed in equal rights for all, and special privileges for none.

If a dairyman were found to be selling diseased milk, she said, under a democratic form of government he could be forced to quit business until the trouble was remedied.

There would be no "regulation" of the sale of poisoned milk, she noted, the words of Abraham Lincoln, founder of the republican party, in which he said the next great problem of this country, after slavery was the liquor traffic which he described as a "cancer on the body politic."

Discussing prohibition from a church standpoint she quoted that verse of scripture which deals with knowing a

COTTON DOWN TODAY, WHILE WHEAT SOARS

NEW ORLEANS CROP ESTIMATE HAS BEARISH EFFECT ON COTTON.

GRAIN SAGS AFTER ADVANCE

Gains as Result of Canadian Seizures Are Small and Are Not Maintained.

New York, Nov. 29.—The report of a New Orleans authority placing the crop at 11,500,000 bales, excluding linters was followed by heavy realizing or liquidation in the cotton market early today. The advance of last week, local traders had been making of a crop of 11,500,000 bales or under and this morning's figures seem to have unsettled sentiment with the market opening at a decline of 10 to 15 points. December and 14 to 15 points on near-months. Selling was extremely active with January closing off to 12.24, March to 12.24 and May to 12.25, right after the call. Live cotton was relatively steady, while early reports of a good demand from Liverpool and London sources which had raised the price for six months to the lowest level in years.

with December at 105 to 106 and May at 107 to 108 1/2 were succeeded by a lowering tendency, December sagging to 104 7/8. Corn was bullishly affected by the advance in wheat. The gains, however, were only temporary. After opening a shade off to 3 1/2 to 1 1/4 up the market rose to more than a cent above Saturday's finish, but gradually receded. Oats developed firmness with corn and wheat. Fluctuations though were relatively narrow and the market eased off when corn underwent a setback. Grain strengthened and a rise in the hog market carried provisions up grade. Transactions were not on a large scale.

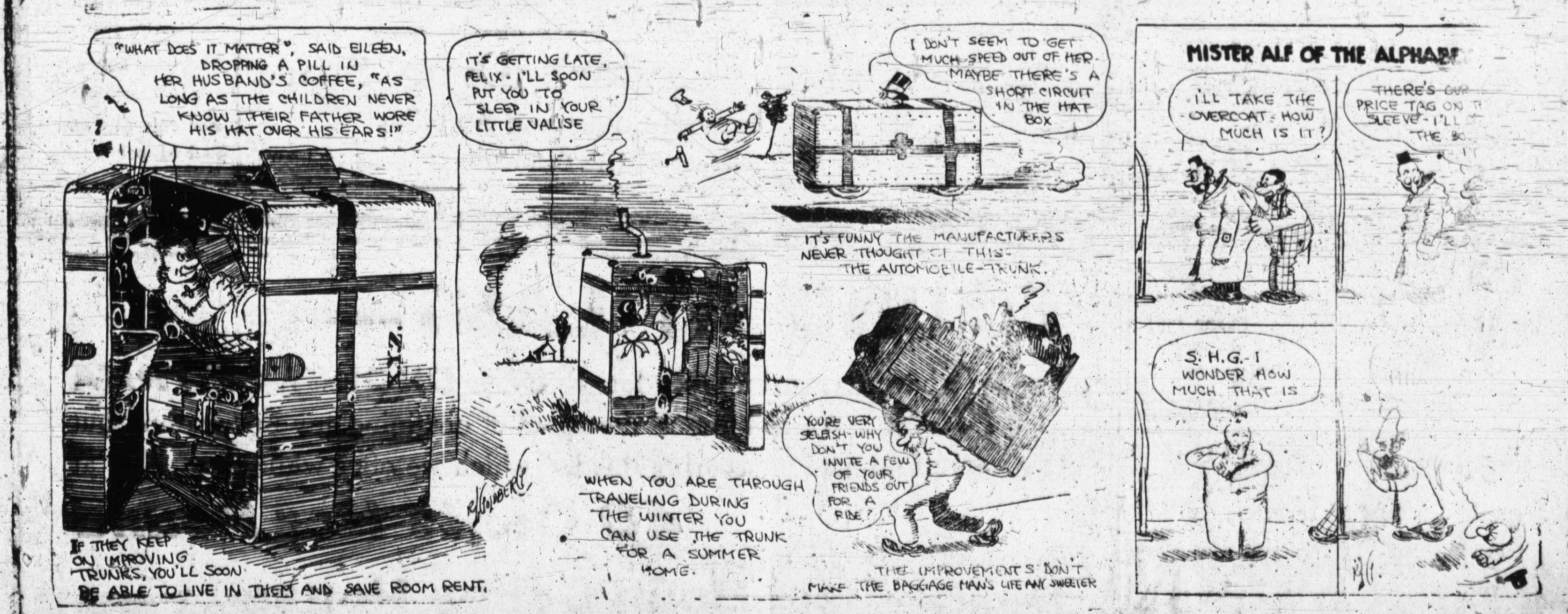
