

Hon, James C. Wilson Speaks Eloquently Upon Duty of Man to His Brother

In an inspiring address at the Elks emorial services at the Wealta Theater Sunday afternoon, Hon. James Wilson United States district at orney for the North Texas district, leclared that the principle, "Lam my prother's keeper' was no longer confined to the minds and hearts of in fi iduals but was extending to the hought underlying governments and o commercial organizations and corporations.

"The old time commercialism and greed for gold that characterized our corporations and business organizations are passing," he said. "Many corporations are breaking away from the idea and practice of taking all the substance out of human workers and casting the empty hulk by the road side, and we see them on every hand accumulating their benefit, and by pen sion funds and by many other acts and practices showing that they are indeed their brother's keepers.

Beginning his address Mr. Wilson re ferred to the custom of the Elks in holding an annual memorial service in which the good deeds of their depart ed brothers are recalled. This, he said brought the members to a realization that at the next memorial service their names might be called among those who had departed.

"It is a good occasion" he said "to take a retrospective view and to impress ourselves that we have very little to do with the thing that we call death. It is a time that we may take an invoice of ourselves and fist those acts, refusals or failures to act that go to make up those credits and debits in the book of our lives. It is calculated to cause us to square our lives

Such reflection, he said, would bring before individuals the great precept that underlies all fraternal societies, am my brother's keeper." He cited examples from the lives of many faous men to show that the practice of this precept was that which caused them to be loved and made their greatness. Wannamaker, Ford, Truatt. Meanwhile the Prince of Wales is in his twenty-second year, his prother Albert will be twenty on Deember 14th, and the Princess Victoia passed her eighteenth birthday in April last. The three younger brothers range from fifteen to ten years of age so their brides need not cause heir royal parents any concern yet

The choice of the next Queen o Freat Britain is of such importance that even this great war can not obcure the popular interest in the selection of a wife for the Prince of Wales and it is recalled that while he is 22 now, his father was married to the Princess of Teck when he was 28 years old and his grandfather married Queen Alexandra when he was not as old as the Prince is now. The exceptionally late age at which King George was married may in part have been due to the fact that the heir to the throne, the Duke of Clarence, did not die till 1892, and his brother, the present king was married the next year.

SAXONY TOWN LEVYING TAX UPON BACHELORS

By Associated Press.

Berlin, (by mail).—The city of Os chatz in Saxony is the first German municipality to impose an extra tax upon the unmarried. Two or three ther German towns have a tax on bachelors, but the new Oschatz law ap plies slike to male and female. Only Catholic priests are exempt. Other unmarried persons above 21 must pay bove their regular municipal tax: On nes from 1,800 to 2,400 marks yearly, five per cent; 2,400 to 4,900 marks, ten per cent; 4,000 to 3,300 marks, fifteen per cent; 6,300 to 10,-000 marks, twenty per cent and above 1.000 carks, twenty-five per cent.


