Washington, Dec. 11.—Three navy yards on the Atlantic coast and two first dreadnaughts or battle cruisers included in the administration's plan would be built at the Philadelphia yard where an expenditure of \$1,000, 000 will be necessary for equipment. He hopes to see the Puget Sound and Norfolk yards equipped eventually for building capital ships,

# MAY CITE TRENT CASE IN PROTEST

VIGOROUS PROTEST BEING PRE PARED OVER REMOVAL OF TEU TONIC CITIZENS FROM AMERI-

Removal Citizens of Any Nation From American Ships Held by Government to be Without Slightest Legal Justi-

Washington, Dec. 11.—A vigorous rotest is being prepared by the state department against the removal by the French cruiser Des Cartes of Germans and Austrians from the American steamship Carolina, Coamo and San Juan on the high seas. The note will contend that the removal of citizens of any nation from an American vessel on the high seas is without legal justification.

It will be asserted in the note, as it was a year ago in a protest to France in the case of August Pietenbrink, that the men removed were not embodied "in the armed forces of the enemy" in the sense of that phrase in international law. The communication, it was understood, probably will declare also that there is no justification for the removal of an enemy subject from a neutral vessel on the high seas, bound to a neutral port, even if he should pos sibly be regarded as a military person The Trent case during the Civil war probably will be cited as a precedent,

Automobiles from - Wichita Falls are "keeping the roads hot" carrying liquor into Oklahoma, according to Worley of Duncan, Oklahoma, a United States deputy marshal, in an interview at Fort Worth recent-The automobiles make as high as eight or ten trips a day, Mr. Wor-ley told the Fort Worth reporter, Worley of Duncan, P. O. Peters of McAlester, W. R. Highnight of Ardmore and D. Brazil of Ardmore, were the deputies who engineered the successful raid here last Wednesday resulting in half a dozen arrests and the filing of charges in the federal court at Fort Worth,

"In spite of all that can be done officers," Worley is quoted as saying, "liquor is being run across the boundary line between Texas and Oklahoma in wholesale quantities every day. At some places in the oil feld you can buy almost anything that you can get in Fort Worth, The dealers use a government li-cense, which allows them to sell liquor, so it's up to us to keep them from getting into the territory with it. At Ringling there is a wholesale house where they had to employ a man with a pump gun to keep the bootleggers from stealing their sup-ply. We are making lots of arrests, but they are still as numerous as they can be up there."

# ATTORNEY GENERAL URGES

on Ships or Escape From Internment.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 11.-New laws to protect the United States against neutrality violations such as have marked the progress of the war in Europe and the Mexican revolutions, was asked of Congress today by Attorney General Gregory in his annual report. The Attorney General suggested amendments to the present neutral'ty statutes to make it specificially a crime against the United States, to place bombs or other ex plosives on vessels sailing from Amrican ports and that it should be nade a crime for any person to escape or attempt to escape from an interned warship of a belligerent nation; and in any event authority should be given to some government department to arrest and return any such person to the place of internement. Another suggestion was that authority be given the government to seize arms and ammunitions about to be exported in violation of a Presidential proclamation of an embargo on shipments of that character and to seize arms and ammunitions about to be used in connection with military expeditions which hemselves are now prohibited by law. The Attorney General again, recmmends an amendment to the commodities clause of the Interstate commerce Act to prohibit a railroad rom transporting in interstate com merce articles which it manufactures or produces, or which are manufactur or produced by any corporation con trolled or affiliated with it by flaving the same controlling stockholders, irresiective of whether such railroad or such controlled or affiliated corpor ation has an interest in the articles at the time of transportation.

"it is also necessary," he added in this connection, "if transportation and production are to be completely divorced, that Congress prohibit any railroad owned or controlled by a profrom transporting in interstate commerce articles produced or owned by
