## FATHER OF GIRL AT PARIS UNDER ARREST

DAUGHTER, WHOSE THROAT WAS CUT

AS A POLITICAL RE. FUGEE

Evidence Against Prisoner Said To Be Circumstantial—Protests Innocence of Charge

By Associated Press. Paris, Texas, Dec. 20.—T. R. Walton, father of Pauline Walton, the seventeen year old girl who was killed in bed in her home here early Saturday, was arrested early today and formally charged with the murder of his daughter. The arrest was made shortly after 1 o'clock, nearly the entire sheriff's, constable's and police force officiating. This was cone, it was said, as a precautionary measure for fear of mob vio-

Walton spent the rest of the night in fail, protesting his innocence of the charge. At daylight he was spirited away by officers on a southbound train to Greenville.

Walton is 46 years old. Mrs. Walton, mother of the girl, would not discuss the arrest, except to say that to the best of her belief her husband was not the slayer. While the evidence thus far made public is mostly circumstantial, it is said that testimony of neighbors, about relations between the father and daughter will play an important part in the examining trial, the date of which has not been set.

He said that the family retired about 9:30 o'clock and after conversing for perhaps half an hour, went to sleen. The daughter was sleeping in the room adjoining her Shortly before 11 o'clock the mother awoke and heard groans from her daughter. The mother called Walton who entered the girl's room after obtaining a lamp. Ho

about 2:30 o'clock. Screens to the windows in the girl's room were nailed down and had not been moved. However, the front door was found unlocked and a screen in the window where the son was sleering had been removed. Fresh dirt was found on the window casing with a man's track

The young woman's funeral was held vesterday That the girl foug hhter assailant was evident from the disheveled condition of her hair and the disorder; in the room. Handfuls of hair were

pulled from her head and many articles were scattered about the floor, Miss Walton was employed at a local crate factory and was said to have carried \$500 industrial insurance on her life.

Washington Dec 20 -- State partment officials have decided that General Villa will receive the asylum accorded a political refugee should be enter the United States This decision was sent last night to Gen. Frederick Funston by the war department for transmission to Villa his representatives.

State department agents had re ported that alleged intermediaries had requested Villa's immunity from arrest saying that if this were given they believed Villa would abandon the fight against Carranza and re tire to private life in the United States.

The state department does not ccnceal its desire to have Villa eliminated. Without him the revolution in the north will certainly fail, it is believed, Intermediaries also said that the plan was for the retirement from the field of the entire Villa

Much interest is displayed by officials here as to whether Villa will accept the promise of immunity as a political refugee. Such immunity would not protect him from prosecution within the United States on charges of an ordinary character. This government has nothing on this as unusual until the fourteen at El Paso have information concerning alleged irregularities in cotton deals in which Villa was involved and that this might be the basis of prosecution. 



Washington, Dec 20.-The seventh cotton ginning report of the season compiled from reports of census bureau correspondents throughout the cotton belt and issued at 10 a, m., today announced that 10,303,253 bales of cotton counting round as half bales of the growth.
of 1915, has been ginned prior to December 13. That compares with 13,972,229 bales or 87,8 per cent of the entire crop ginned prior to December 13 last year, 12,088,412 bales or 92,5 per eent in 1913 and 11,854, 541 bales or 92,2 per cent in 1912. The average quantity of cotton ginred prior to December 13 in the last ten; years was 11,476,189 bales or 89.5 per cent of the crop.

# 10,303,253 BALES OF COTTON SEDEL-BAHR STILL LONDON INDICATES

BELIEVED EXPECTED OFFENSIVE BY GERMANS IN FLANDERS HAS BEGUN: FAILURE OF FIRST ATTACK IS ANNOUNCED.

Result of Sunday's Election Not Ex pected to Change Military Policy-Bulgarian's Next Move Is Awaited With Interest.

Withdrawal of the British troops from the Anzac Cove and Suvla Bay regions of the Gallipoli peninsula is announced in a brief official communication given out here this afternoon. the peninsula, The number of troops removed is said to be 100,000. There are two fields of operations in the near east to which British troops withdrawn from the peninsula, Macedonia and Egype. London looks for an attack on the allied position at Saloniki, The number of French and British troops in Greece has been estimated at about Germany, Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey have at their disposal several times that number of men, aithough Greece is opposed to the fise of Bulgarian or Turkish troops for an advance on Saloniki.

Some indication of the long expectoffensive by the German's in landers where the massing of Teuonic troops is said to have been in rogress for several weeks is contained in official British and French reports which states that under a cloud of gas, Germans attacked British trenches northeast of Ypres, Ac cording to these reports the Germans failed so completely that few of them emerged from their own trenches and those who did so were moved down by artillery fire. Later in the day the Germans displayed unusual activity, directing a heavy hombardment on the British lines near Ypres and on the French positions at Messines. 
