

Six indictments were, returned by the grand jury in the 30th district court, Judge Bonner presiding, just before noon today. Three of the indictments charged murder, the defend-





A statement from Washington by the Geological Survey says that pre-liminary estimates of the total yield of petroleum for 1915 indicate a slight crease over the record breaking yield in 1914. This condition does not agree with the currently reported reason for the exceptionally high prices now prevailing for motor fuel.

As a result of the over-load put on the transporting and refining phases of the petroleum industry by the ex-cess output of crude petroleum in 1914, the year 1915 may be characterized as a period of readjustment in ly retarded as far as practicable. at the end of 1914. small increase therefore is more significant than the simple figures sug-
