The fans are invited to attend the daily workouts of Fleming and Burns, held at three o'clock each afternoon.

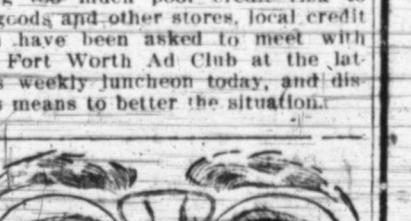

### LOSE ON COTTON BUT GAIN IN DIVERSIFICATION.

By Associated Press.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 12.—As a practical result of benefits of diversification by Texas farmers during the past year Commissioner Fred W. Davis of the agricultural department has pointed out that, while the farmers lost one-third in the cotton crop, they gained more than one-half in price; that the Texas corn crop was increased by 52,000,000 bushels; the yield of wheat by 8,000,000 bushels; and the increase in the production of oats was 20,000,000 bushels. Another fact shown by the commissioner is that there was an increase in the diversified area of the state by 100 per cent. The Texas farmer this year, according to the commissioner, does not have to send to Kansas for his corn,

Four Texans are being urged for the supreme court vacancy caused by the death of Judge Lamar. Texas has already fared pretty well at the hands of the administration, but it is getting to be a sort of habit, when a real big man is wanted for a job to look to Texas for one.

H. W. Blakelee of Dallas, who has been in charge of the southwestern territory of the Associated Press for five years, has been promoted to the Chicago office of that organization. The A. P. has made decided progress in this section since Mr. Blakelee became correspondent at Dallas, and The Times feels that Joel P. Glass, who succeeds him, has a big pair of shoes to fill.

Three examples of the difficulties which are encountered in giving impartial accounts of war happenings have been furnished recently. Both the Germans and French claimed victory in the Champagne district battle; both the Austrians and Russians claimed the advantage in the fighting in Bukovina, and both the English and Turks claimed decisive victories in Mesopotamia. The only fair thing to do was to publish the claims of both sides, and let the sympathies of the reader rule, for the present at least, in determining the victors. Where the war news must come, not from newspaper men who witness what is transpiring, but from the official reports that are usually colored to suit the government that is issuing them, the public must wait until days afterward until the chaff can be sifted from the grain and the true facts ascertained. Being strictly neutral in the handling of war reports is not as easy as it might seem.

William R. Hearst announces that hereafter no liquor or "quack" cure advertisements will be taken by his newspapers. For years Hearst's editors have been thundering against liquor, while the business offices have been raking in the money from distillers and quacks, for advertisements of their wares which, in some of the Hearst papers, have formed an important volume of the advertising. Hearst news service dispatches in announcing Mr. Hearst's decision say that Hearst newspapers will lose a million dollars in revenues annually through the new rule. This is the

Although apparently deserted by its founder, Theodore Roosevelt, the Progressive Party doesn't appear to be as dead as the Republican faction would like to believe. For instance in Indiana former Governor Hanly, a Republican until this year will be a candidate for the Progressive party nomination for governor in that state. Mr. Hanly is responsible for the county local option law and is a strong figure. He will hold thousands of Progressive votes in that state. In several other close states the Progressives are planning to put full tickets in the field, no matter whom the Republicans may nominate. With prosperity throughout the country and its opposition split in close states the future doesn't look as bad for the Democrats as some of them appear to fear.

ROTARIANS FAVOR COURT HOUSE BONDS

Give Issue Their Indorsement at Meeting Today—Several Speakers Heard.

Today's meeting of the Rotary Club was largely in the nature of a rally for the court house bonds, which will be voted upon next Tuesday. There was no regular speaker at the luncheon, but several of the members discussed the need of strong support for the bonds and a standing vote of indorsement was taken, everyone present rising.

Judge R. E. Huff was called upon by President Keith to present the matter again and he said that the issue lay with Wichita Falls alone, as the attitude of the country voters seemed inimical to the bonds. He called attention to the importance of the question, saying that if the news should go over the State that the bonds had been defeated, it would be said that the old Wichita spirit was dead.

J. M. McFall made a new and interesting point, with reference to the opposition from the country, showing that when the Iowa Park bridge across the Wichita river was rebuilt, practically all of the money came from the road funds of the Wichita Falls precinct, and that it would have been impossible to rebuild the bridge without this money. Mr. McFall said that he thought if this were called to the attention of the voters in the country, particularly in Iowa Park, they would realize that there is nothing selfish in the position of Wichita Falls.

It was also brought out that not only those who actually pay taxes, but those who have property upon which taxes may be collected, even though it has not been rendered, may vote in the election. B. J. Bean said that the present court house was built under adverse circumstances; but that the farmers who made up the commissioners court at that time were of a progressive sort who were willing to discount the future. He expressed the hope that the farmers of the present time would be as progressive as were their fathers.

J. A. Kemp also addressed the club, discussing the importance of developing the dairying industry in Wichita county. He said he hoped one of the things every Wichitan would bear in mind this year was the benefit that would result from placing dairy cattle on the farms in this county, and he said this was the purpose of himself in acquiring high grade dairy stock. Two new members were elected today, A. E. Miles and Roy Jones of the Panhandle Refining Company. About 60 members and visitors were present today. J. W. Pond drew this week's prize, a supply of wall paper donated by the W. S. Robertson Paint Company.

A general call will be issued through Mr. Watson to farmers, bankers and commercial secretaries. It is hoped to bring together here more than a hundred Texans interested in diversification of farm products.
