Twenty Men at Work on Boat When Half Dozen Hydrogen Explosions in Explosion Came All Inside Submarine Believed Killed-Second Accident of Kind In Navy's History.

New York, Jan. 15.—Four men were killed and ten others injured, them seriously by an explosion this afternoon in the submarine E-2 while the craft was undergoing repairs in dry dock at the New York navy yards. One of the killed was an enlisted electrician and the other three civilian workers. At least three of the ten now in hospitals are not expected to live, The dead;

Rescuers Overcome.

Soon after the explosion several naval officers led a rescue party into the dry dock but were partly overcome by gas fumes when they attempted to descend into the vessel, Compressed air pipes were then run into the shell and the gas forced out. The number of men inside the submarine at the time of the explosion is not definitely known. TAX PAYERS' DELAY MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

Long Waits in Prospect For Those Who Postpone Until Last

Those who do not pay their city and Wichita Fails independent school district taxes this week are likely to find that they have delayed to their own inconvenience, City Tax Collector H. F. Robertson is not permitted to write out tax receipts and have them waiting for the tax ayers as is the case at the county tax collector's office but must wait until the taxpayer calls at his office before writing out the receipt. It appears from the collections to date that great numbers are waiting until the last few days before paying

their taxes. tor's office will be crowded and that taxpayers will have to stand in line and wait until receipts can be written for those ahead of them. In addition to this annoyance to the taxpayer additional work will be thrown onto the tax collector. If taxes are paid now Mr. Robertson will be able to furnish a receipt with little if any delay. He cannot promise as much if a majority of the property own-ers, walt until the last week or the last few days before the date when a penalty accrues.


