

Blowing Up Of E-2 Discloses

Foreigners Use Edison Battery



Naval and state authorities began searching investigations of the explosion on the United States submarine E2 fatally her fourteen year old daugh-In the Brooklyn navy yard, in which four men were killed and ten were injured. The E-2 was the only submarine in the navy equipped with Edison batteries, for which the chief merit claimed is that they do not give off chlorine to the removal of Williams from the gas. Also the E-2 had no gasoline aboard, as her power is generated by a Diesel oil burning engine. There was no explosive powder aboard. If an accumulation of hydrogen caused the explosion, which was one explanation offered, it was gas which had accumulated between the top of the steel battery jars and the electrolite. Thomas A. Edison's personal representative and chief engineer Dr. Miller Reese Hutchison, defended the Edison battery and declared that the Edison submarine safety battery was in use in war by one power. It had been supposed that the United States had an option on the exclusive use of the device if the tests to which it was to be subjected proved satisfactory.
