

TEXAS SHIPPERS ORGANIZE TODAY

MEETING HELD AT AUSTIN ON SHREVEPORT RATE SITUATION.

CONTEST PROPOSED

Steps Will be Taken to Protect Interests of Shippers in Case.

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Jan. 20.—Organization of the Shippers and Consumers Traffic Association of Texas for the immediate purpose of contesting the complaint of Louisiana shippers in the Shreveport rate case and the further purpose of protecting the interests of producers, consumers, receivers and shippers of Texas in all traffic matters was perfected today at a meeting of 75 representatives of shippers, jobbers and corporations interested in traffic from all portions of the state.

The feature of the meeting was an address by Railroad Commissioner Earle B. Mayfield in which the history of the Shreveport rate case was reviewed and the decision of the supreme court of the United States in that case was called a vital blow against the rights of states to regulate their own affairs.

The basis of the action, it is pointed out, is the last ruling of the commission in which Texas jobbers are placed at a disadvantage with those of Louisiana and Arkansas. During this conference the attitude of the Texas railroad commission will be outlined in an address by Commissioner Earle B. Mayfield. Strong resolutions are likely to be adopted by those attending the conference.

FALLING ICE CAUSES INJURY TO TWO PERSONS.

The ice which encrusted overhead wires as a result of the weather yesterday morning began to fall late yesterday when the temperature rose, and narrow strips of ice, great in number, as they walked along. In most places the wires were not directly over the sidewalks and the falling ice did no damage, but a negro woman and a little white boy were struck by the falling ice, each sustaining a cut on the head. The injuries, which were not serious, were given medical attention. The pieces of ice were not heavy enough to inflict serious injury. Tumbles were frequent among pedestrians who did not watch their step, but no serious injuries were reported.

SAYS JAMAICA GINGER IS BEING SOLD AT TEMPLE

It was not expected that the advance would be announced here before tomorrow or Saturday. This is the first advance in about a month.

TELLS OF FIGHT WITH MEXICANS

BANDITS FLEE ACROSS BORDER AFTER RAID IN NEW MEXICO.

SIX MEN ROB MINE

Three Soldiers Pursue Them and Skirmish Follows—Tracks Lead to Mexico.

By Associated Press. Washington, Jan. 20.—Major General Funston reported today as follows on the fight between U. S. cavalrymen and Mexican bandits near Doyle's Wells, New Mexico, Tuesday: Mexican bandits estimated six men robbed a Conaves mine and a half mile from Doyle's Wells after midnight on Jan. 18th. Three men from detachment at Doyle's Wells and Arthur Lee, mining man, followed bandits' trail south towards Lone Cabin; about two miles from Lone Cabin they dismounted to reconnoiter were fired on and one horse killed. Lieut. King left here 1:30 a. m., with detachment of 30 men. Lieut. Nicholson with detachment in automobile reconnoitered in vicinity Lone Cabin, found bandits' tracks going southwest into Mexico.

24 CONVICTS GET AWAY IN ARKANSAS

Made Saw Out of Knife and Cut Through Boards.—Some are "Lifers."

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 20.—Using a saw made from a knife and cutting through boards eight inches thick, 24 white convicts whose terms ranged from one year to life sentences, escaped from the state convict farm at Cummins, Ark., 65 miles from here between 9 o'clock last night and one o'clock this morning. A prisoner named Thomas discovered that a board had been cut out of the side of a stockade and notified a night watchman. They were no prisoners in the stockade. One of the convicts had stolen a steel knife used in the dining room and made a saw out of it. In order not to attract the men first sawed through one by one. As each went through he reloaded the plank. None of the 24 had been apprehended up to noon today.

HEAVY LOSS IN EXPLOSION OF AMMUNITION DEPOT

London, Jan. 20.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger who witnessed the recent explosion of the large German ammunition depot in Liege, Northern France describes the damage done as enormous. Not only was the depot entirely destroyed but in the surrounding area houses and factories were razed. The German landstrum troops guarding the depot were killed.

WROTE WILSON FOR MONEY IS PLACED UNDER ARREST

San Francisco, Jan. 20.—John Paul Winn, said by the police to have written to President Wilson for the past two or three months demanding money was under arrest today and is to be examined by a sanity commission. Winn, according to the police declared it was the right of every American to write to the president for money. He told the detectives he was the son of a minister of Petersburg, Virginia.

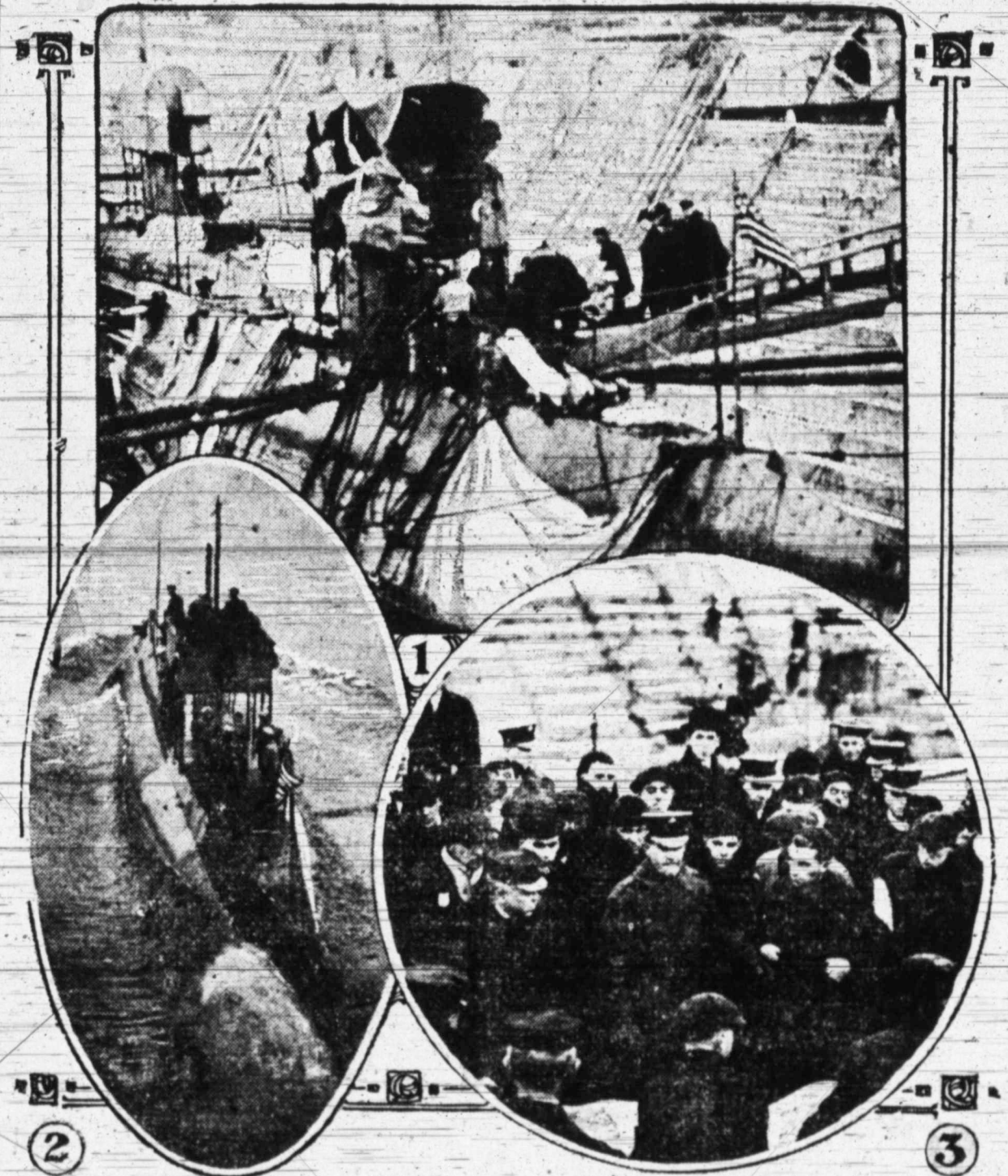
COLLIN COUNTY TEXTILE SHOW NOW BEING HELD

Blowing Up Of E-2 Discloses Foreigners Use Edison Battery



Naval and state authorities began searching investigations of the explosion on the United States submarine E-2 in the Brooklyn navy yard, in which four men were killed and ten were injured. The E-2 was the only submarine in the navy equipped with Edison batteries, for which the chief merit claimed is that they do not give off chlorine gas. Also the E-2 had no gasoline aboard, as her power is generated by a Diesel oil burning engine. There was no explosive powder aboard. If an accumulation of hydrogen caused the explosion, which was one explanation offered, it was gas which had accumulated between the top of the steel battery jars and the electrolyte. Thomas A. Edison's personal representative and chief engineer, Miller Lewis Hutcheson, defended the Edison battery and declared that the Edison submarine safety battery was in use in war by one power. It had been supposed that the United States had an option on the exclusive use of the device if the tests to which it was to be subjected proved satisfactory. GROCER IS KNOCKED UNCONSCIOUS AND ROBBED

By Associated Press. Dallas, Jan. 20.—C. R. Bowers, an aged grocer, was knocked unconscious and robbed of \$50 and a pistol in a grocery store on the East Ford road six miles west of Dallas early today by a negro who fled into the Trinity bottoms immediately after the robbery. A large posse of officers and citizens is pursuing the negro. Bowers' wound is serious but not fatal.

IMPORTANT RULING ON SHIPMENTS OF LIQUOR

By Associated Press. Memphis, Jan. 20.—Federal Judge J. S. McCall today handed down an opinion of widespread interest when he decided that intoxicating liquors shipped into Tennessee are subject to the laws of the state from the time they reach their destination in Tennessee until they leave the borders of the state, or are placed in the hands of an interstate carrier for transportation out of the state. Under the ruling "selling in transit" by reconignment from local jobbers is effectively barred as being unlawful. There are about 30 wholesale liquor firms in this city operating in Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas.

The annual meetings of the Chamber of Commerce on the night of Tuesday, January 23rd will be held at a banquet at the St. James Hotel. The committee appointed at a previous meeting to arrange the details for the meeting and the banquet submitted its report this morning and action was taken as above. The committee reported that it had received a proposal from the ladies of the Christian, First Presbyterian, and M. E. "SKIP STOP" SYSTEM FOR DALLAS CARS PROPOSED

By Associated Press. Dallas, Jan. 20.—Dallas street cars may only stop at every other corner, employing what is known as the "skip stop" system. This has been proposed to the city government by E. W. Beemis, a traffic expert, who has been seeking to find a means to alleviate congested traffic in the business section. In which a stopped street car has an important part. In his report, Beemis said much trouble could be eliminated if the cars stopped at every other corner—stops to be designated—instead of picking up passengers at each corner. The local street car company is said to be willing to adopt this form if the people of Dallas want it; on which question the people may be asked to express themselves.

TRAFFIC TO CALIFORNIA IS HINDERED BY SNOW

NATIONAL SECURITY LEAGUE SPEAKERS SCORE DANIELS' PLANS

AFFAIRS IN MEXICO

"No More Consideration For Americans Than For Buzzards" is Ex-pression Used

Washington, Jan. 20.—Secretary Daniels' naval program was assailed as weak and inefficient and country's foreign policy was attacked as having created a situation where an American citizen's life of late had "scarcely enjoyed the consideration accorded that of a turkey buzzard in the land to the south of us" by speakers at today's session of the National Security League convention. "This is not a time to mince words," declared President Stanswood Menken, in his opening address, "but to state cold facts so as to let the country know who are for country first, as distinguished from those who are for themselves and their own selfish advancement. Secretary Daniels' recommendation, he said, did not go sufficiently far. "His program is weak and insufficient for the needs of the country, and it must be borne in mind that the navy he recommends will not be built under his plan until the expiration of ten years," said the speaker.

FEAR LYNNING OF NEGRO CHAUFFEUR

Woman Killed and Girl Probably Fatally Injured By Car at Little Rock

By Associated Press. Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 20.—Fears that Oscar Williams, negro chauffeur whom police say confessed that he drove the automobile which killed Mrs. E. W. Bumpass of this city Tuesday night and injured perhaps fatally her fourteen year old daughter, Louise, might be lynched, led to the removal of Williams from the county jail to the state penitentiary for safe keeping; early today. The two women were struck down by a car whose driver sped on after the accident. L. B. King, owner of the car, Williams is said to have been driving, was held by the police also. Williams has been arrested previously for reckless driving. Feeling against him here is intense and threats induced the sheriff to take the negro to a place of safety to prevent a lynching.

WOMEN MAY TAKE LIQUOR PRIVILEGE

Dallas Mothers' Council Plans This Means Obtaining Booze. Issue Fair.

Special to The Times. Dallas, Tex., Jan. 20.—No liquor will be sold at the next state fair here, if the plans of the Dallas Council of Mothers are carried out. They intend to purchase the liquor privilege at the fair, but of course will not use it; with the liquor privilege in their possession, no one else could sell drinks within the fair park. The women at first appealed to directors of the fair to stop the sale of liquor at the grounds, but this was refused. They then decided to take the more effective step, and when the privileges and concessions are awarded it is probable that they will make an effort to purchase it. If they do they will probably have a bazaar in the quarters under the grandstand where strong drink has been dispensed ever since the fair was started, and fancy work will be sold there instead of beer and whiskey. The liquor concession has been a source of considerable revenue to the fair in former years.

SAYS COLD BENEFICIAL TO RAISING OF FRUIT

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Jan. 20.—Farmers and fruit growers of Texas were fortunate in having a cold spell last week, according to Prof. E. E. Scholl, state entomologist of the Department of agriculture. In some sections conditions were favorable to altogether too rapid bud development in fruit trees, but this condition was checked to an appreciable degree by the cold weather. Due to warm weather before this cold period insects and other pests had become destructive, especially to garden stuff, all of which was stopped to some extent by the sudden temperature change.

FOUR ARRESTS FOR ATTACK ON OKUMA

Young Political Agitator Confesses He Threw Bomb at Japanese Premier

On January 12 two bombs were thrown at Count Okuma's automobile. The premier was not injured.

MONTENEGRO ACTIVE

Army Being Reorganized to Continue Fight—King of Greece, in Interview Criticizes Course of Entente Powers

By Associated Press. London, Jan. 20.—Gen. Aylmer's force of British troops was yesterday in close touch with the Turkish position at Essen and consequently was seven miles from Kut el Amara in Mesopotamia, where a British force has been surrounded by the Turks. From Rome comes the definite announcement that hostilities between Montenegro and Austria have been resumed. Montenegro having officially notified Italy to this effect, the dispatch stated.

A note presented to the Italian foreign office by the Montenegro premier declared that Montenegro had rejected the terms offered by Austria and that hostilities had been resumed all along the front, King Nicholas remaining with his army to organize his country's defense.

Greece again is a point of eternal interest on the war map although that territory has not been the scene of hostilities. King Constantine on January 13 gave the Associated Press correspondent at Athens an interview in which he voiced strong protest against the attitude of the entente powers toward his country. This interview, transmitted by way of Paris did not reach the United States until today and in the interim an unnamed high French authority prepared and gave out a reply to the accusations of the king.

There has been a paucity of direct news from Athens and other points in Greece in the past few days but there have been numerous reports from German sources of further aggressive action on the part of the entente allies toward the Greek government.

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MONTENEGRINS RESUME FIGHT WITH AUSTRIA

By Associated Press. Rome, Jan. 20.—Fighting between Austria and Montenegro has been resumed. Montenegro has notified Italy officially of the fact today. Montenegro's decision was communicated to the Italian foreign office. The note is to the effect that King Nicholas and the Montenegro government have rejected all the terms offered by Austria and that fighting has already been resumed along the whole front. King Nicholas remained with his army to organize the defensive of the country.

ENGINEER KILLED IN ROCK ISLAND DERAILMENT

CATHOLICS HOLD DEDICATION RITE; BISHOP ATTENDS

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY OPENS NEW EDIFICE THIS MORNING IN PRESENCE OF LARGE GATHERING OF PEOPLE.

SERVICE IS SOLEMN

Brilliant Scene Presented—Many Visiting Priests Take Part in Exercises—Dedictory Sermon by Oak Cliff Father.

With the solemn splendor of the Catholic ritual and in the presence of the chief Catholic prelate of the State, the new church of the local Catholics to be known as the Church of the Sacred Heart, was dedicated this morning, in the presence of a large crowd, Bishop Lynch of Dallas was in attendance and by the sprinkling of holy water upon the interior and exterior of the edifice, sanctified and dedicated it to the uses of the church.

The ceremony was a brilliant one, according to the sacred usages of the church, its luster being only partly dimmed by the unpleasant weather of the morning. It was more solemn than brilliant, and the reverent crowd which filled the building was awed more by the significance of the ceremony than by the splendor of it. The dedicatory sermon by Rev. Father Louis Harrington of Oak Cliff dealt with the significance of the occasion and with the necessities for properly putting the church to the sacred uses for which it was built.

A score or more of visiting priests and prelates attended the ceremony, coming here from various parts of the State.

The ceremony began at 10 o'clock when the priests, headed by Father Vermon of Denton, began their march from the old church, half a block to the westward. Father Vermon, as master of ceremonies, wore the white and gold vestments with the emblematic initials I. H. S. embroidered thereon. Following came Bishop Lynch in vestments of white, with gold fringe, the pelican, a eucharistic symbol, embroidered upon the cape, and the mitre upon his head. Then came the visiting priests, each in his cassock with white surplice and the acolytes and choir boys.

Pausing at the door of the church, those in the procession repeated the psalms and prayers customary on such occasions, while Bishop Lynch, proceeding around the building to the right, sprinkled the walls with holy water from a chalice, repeating the words of blessing as he did so. Then the church was entered and the ceremony was repeated on the interior of the building, the walls being sprinkled with the holy water and blessed. The party then knelt before the brilliant altar and prayers were said.

Solemn high mass, with Father Vermon of Denton as the celebrant, was next said, Father O'Grady of Childress and Father Webber of Electra, respectively deacon and sub-deacon, also officiated, assisted in white and gold vestments, the Very Rev. E. Kelly of Waco and the Very Rev. B. Zelle of Lindsay were deacons of honor to the bishop. The dedicatory sermon by Rev. Father Louis Harrington of Oak Cliff followed, Marz's Mass in E flat was sung by the choir during the service, the music being a beautiful and impressive feature of the ceremony.

The verse, "This house was prepared not for man, but for God" was the keynote of Father Harrington's address. He spoke of the utility of erecting structures that do not conform to the will of the Almighty.

After the dedication, the priests attended dinner at St. Mary's Academy, most of them departing for their homes on this afternoon's train.

Work of Father Campbell.

The church, which was completed at a cost of about \$22,000, is of the Romanesque style of architecture. It is located at the corner of Ninth and Holliday streets, where for so many years there stood the wooden building used as a house of worship by the Catholics of this vicinity. When it was decided to build a new church, the wooden structure was moved half a block westward. The decision to put up a new church was reached by the parish several years ago, but definite action was not taken until Rev. Father J. J. Campbell the present pastor, was called here. It is not yet two years since he took charge, but during that time he has been instrumental in raising a large part of the money for the building, and it is very largely through his untiring efforts that the building has become a reality.

The building has a seating capacity of about 500, the pews being ranged on each side of a wide central aisle, as is customary in Catholic churches. The walls are finished in green with art glass windows showing sacred scenes and likenesses of the saints. Above these are smaller windows of stained glass. The lighting has been installed on a system, save around the altar where exposed lights are used; the building is also equipped with gas lights.

The interior is set off with tiled Venetian columns, extending up to the exposed rafters, giving an air of substantiality. The Corinthian capitals on the columns are embossed with the emblems of the church.

Has Beautiful Altar.

The altar, presented anonymously by a member of the congregation whose good works are innumerable, presents a beautiful picture. It is practically of white, surmounted by

the cross and a tall figure of the Christ of the Sacred Heart; this figure has the appearance of the heart being exposed. Near the base of the altar is a panel in colors, depicting the Last Supper. Above this is the receptacle known as the tabernacle where the sacrament is kept. This tabernacle is of steel over cedar, and lined with white silk into which the local sisters worked the emblems of the church. The door is of solid bronze, figured to show the chalice and the host, with the wheat and the vine representing the elements of the sacrament. The altar is surrounded by the altar and there are six tall candlesticks; later there will be 24.

On each side of the altar are figures of adoring angels. There are two other altars, the one on the right being that of the Blessed Virgin, that on the left of St. Joseph. The main altar is flanked by figures of St. Boniface and St. Patrick.

At the western end of the building is a rose window, given by the Altar Society, with an appropriate design, in Gothic style.

The art glass windows of the church were given by various members of the congregation as follows: Blessed Virgin, Young Ladies Sodality; St. Patrick, Michael and Kate Emmert; St. Aloysius, St. Aloysius Sodality; Sacred Family, Knights of Columbus; St. Peter, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Delaney; St. John, given in memory of John and Theresa Prager; St. James, Mr. James and Mrs. McGrath; St. James Minor, in memory of James Rothron, by his children; St. Simon, Mrs. Hatton; St. Thomas, James Hateson; St. Cecilia, Corinne Riley; Apparition of the Sacred Heart, Mrs. Voronka; Mrs. Tunnally; St. Matthew, J. L. McMahon; St. Bartholomew, given in memory of Wenzel and Henry; St. Thaddeus, Fred and Francis Little; St. Philip, in memory of Dan O'Reilly; St. Andrew, Frank and Mrs. Cullinan; St. Paul, given in memory of Edward and Bernadina Delterman; scenes of oration on Mt. Olivet, given in memory of Mrs. E. Ruddy; St. John Nepomucene, by St. John Nep. No. 13, Bohemian Catholic Society; St. Boniface, given in memory of Joseph and Elizabeth Hurd; St. Joseph, St. Joseph's Sodality.

Vestments Significant.

The vestments worn by the clergy during the ceremonies all had their significance, different attires being provided for the various occasions. White, the color of the vestments worn by the bishop and assisting clergy today, is emblematic of peace and joy; the Catholics consider green symbolic of hope; red of faith and blue of penance.

The pelican embroidered upon the white cape worn by the bishop also has a deep significance, being a eucharistic emblem, which has its origin in the ancient belief that the pelican fed its young from its own breast; this idea of sacrifice was deemed typical of the Savior whose blood was shed for mankind and thus the pelican found its way into the symbols of the church. The initials I. H. S. which appear so often in the decorative finishing of the church and on the vestments worn at this morning's ceremony, stand for Latin words meaning "Jesus, the Savior of Mankind."

The first regular services in the new church will be held next Sunday, according to the usual schedule.

Building By Churches.

The completion of the building finds every large congregation in Wichita Falls housed in a brick building. The Baptist congregation which was the first to erect a brick structure, has outgrown its present quarters and may start work on a new church this year; for several years the Baptists had the only brick building here. In 1909 the First M. E. Church, which had been holding services in the court room, built the handsome structure it now occupies at the corner of Seventh and Lamar. The following year work began on the building of the M. E. Church South; this congregation had been holding services in a frame structure at Tenth and Scott; in 1912 the Central Presbyterian members, who had no building at that time, erected their present substantial building at Kiewit and bluff. The year 1914 saw the completion of two more churches on Tenth street, that of the First Christian congregation at the corner of Travis and that of the First Presbyterians at the corner of Bluff.

Both of these congregations had formerly held services in frame buildings. Last year, the Episcopal congregation, which had worshipped for so many years in a small frame building at Lamar and Eighth, built the beautiful structure at Tenth and Burnett.

TRAVELING AFOOT ON LONG JOURNEY

Kansas Cityan, With Pack Saddle on Burro, Arrives in This City.

His worldly goods packed on a burro, himself on foot, a young man giving his name as J. S. Hobbs, reached Wichita Falls late Wednesday on an overland hike from Kansas City to California. He expects to remain here several weeks, as he is making the trip by easy stages, spending his nights in the open except when it is too wet, and subsisting on such food as he can carry with him, supplemented by game.

The sight of a man leading a pack-saddled burro attracted considerable attention on the streets here as Hobbs passed through the business section on his way to the wagon yard where he spent the night. Just why he selected this mode of travel, Hobbs would not explain, merely saying he wished to keep in the open as much as possible. The burro is equipped with a genuine pack saddle, an unusual sight here, but a common spectacle in mining camps. In the pack, Hobbs carries his cooking utensils, bedding, and food.
