CLAY COUNTY SLAYER ESCAPES FROM COUNTY JAIL AT HENRIETTA

DIGS THROUGH WALL

Under Sentence of 25 Years for Killing Miss Beulah Lee-Case Now on Appeal

Special to The Times, Henrietta, Texas, Jan. 27.—Sterling White, convicted of the murder of Miss Beulah Lee in Clay county and given a penalty of 25 years in the penitentiary at his last trial at this place in October and whose case is now on appeal has escaped from the jail here.

He escaped from his cell into the run around and dug through the brick wall. Near the pile of brick which had been drawn from the wall from inside there lay this morning a four piece of 3-4 inch gas piping and the handle from off a cell door the same being a piece of iron some three or four feet in length and of such a weight aas to make an ideal battering ram for such a purpose.

There is little doubt that White had outside assistance in effecting his escape, his foot prints leading to buggy tracks outside the court house yard. The foot prints of another man, the occupant of the buggy, were also discernible. The buggy tracks led into the business section of Henrietta and could not of course be followed. White is, believed to have gone in the direction of Wichita Falls or towards Oklahoma,

The sheriff's department has offered \$50 reward for his capture, and diligent search is being made, White's escape has the effect of dismissing the appeal which was taken from the verdict in district court However, as his plea was insanity, it is possible that should he be recaptured, the appeal might be is insane, he is not responsible for his act in escaping. The jury found that White was sane, and it is a question whether the higher court might not still consider the appeal. Ordinarily the escape of a prisoner whose case is on appeal means dis missal of the appeal.

REFUSES AGAIN TO SUPPORT FEDERAL SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

HAS BUSY PROGRAM

Tells Clergymen He Can ind N Basis for Peace Except Jus. tice-Discusses Stand

New York, Jan. 27 .- President Wilson refused today to support the movement for an amendment to the federal constitution for women's suffrage. He spoke briefly to 200 members of the Congressional Union for Women's Suffrage, telling them he thought the que tion should be dealt with by individual

The president received the suffragettes after they had sent him a series of notes and had waited for him over an hour. The president delivered the first of his three addresses at noon before the clerical conference of the New York Federation of Churches representing all denominations. Rev. Nebe miah Boynton, in an address of welcome, said:-

"We simply desire to put ourselves by your side as you enter upon work being the spokesman for permanent peace for America and the world.' Must "Keep Balance Even."

SOLDIERS LURED TO MEXICAN SIDE ARE FREED TODAY

FOUR OTHERS DROWNED AND FOUR ARRESTED AS RESULT OF ATTEMPTS TO RESCUE

WENT AFTER DRINK

Mexican's Invitation To Partake of Mescal is Cause of Four Deaths and Much Trouble on Border

Brownsville, Texas, Jan. 27,—Two
American soldiers who said they were lured to the Mexican side of the Rio Grande, and there made prisoners by a band of Mexicans, were brought to Matamoras today

and then returned to the post.

The capture of the two soldiers led to the drowning of four others. who were in a party that sought to rescue them. The rescue party, four-teen in number, started to swim across the river late yesterday, four-members meeting death in the attempt,

Three lieutenants and fourteen privates invaded Mexican soil in a further effort to resque the two They were arrested last night. The two privates were William C Wheeler and Viggo Peterson, Although earlier reports declared that the two crossed the river when ordered to do so by Mexicans who had them covered with rifles, the men themselves state that they went over following an invitation from a Mexican to take a drink of mescal with

The two soldiers were taken to Rio Bravo, after being lured across the river, and were later ordered released by Carranza officials, Col. Quintilla, acting commander at Matamoras took charge of the case or the Mexican side and secured the

release of the men. Wheeler and Peterson said they were decoyed to the Mexican side of the river by promise of a drink of mescal by a Mexican, who appeared on the bank of the river while they and Musketeer Chunn and Private fleuger of the artillery were swim-Wheeler in a statement said the Mexican did not appear to be a soldier, but when surrounded by eight Mexicans later some distance from the bank he found his captors were all soldiers,

Expert Declares Dallas and Fort Worth Must Begin

The supply of gas in the Petrolia field has reached that stage where it behooves Fort Worth and Dallas engineer for the bureau of mines, in low report recently furnished to W. P. Gage, general manager of the Lone Star Gas Company which supplies Fort Worth, Dallas and a number of North Texas towns with gas from

the Petrolia field,
Welch finds that the Southern Oklahoma fields are the only ones which would be feasible to tap, and those only as supplementary to the Petrolia field. He recommends the ion of a pipe line north fron line recently built south from Gainesville to near Dallas, with branches to the Loco and Healdton

A line from the present compressor station in the Petrolia field to the Oklahoma fields also is suggested as a possibility, but it is stated that it would be much more expen-sive and less practical than the line from Gainesville.
