The Apham was captured January 15 off the Canary Islands by a German raider, four days after she had sailed from Dakar, British West Afri ca, for Plymouth, England. She was captured at sea on Janu-

Nears State of Half Completion

The national Lincoln memorial, now in construction in Washington, is be ing erected in Potomic park on the axis of the United States capitol and the Washington monument in accordance with plans prepared by Henry Bacon of New York city. Work on the construction of the memorial was commenced on Lincoln's birthday, Fébruary 12, 1915. Congress has appropriated \$1,300,000 toward the construction, which is to cost \$2,000,000, the memorial to be completed in four years from the commencement of the work. The foundation, of re-inforced concrete, rises forty-live feet above the present grade and will be surrounded by a mound of earth 1,000 feet in diameter. The exterior of the memorial proper is of white Colorado Yule marble and the interior of limestone. The only sculpture will be a colos sal statue of Lincoln, being designed by Daniel Chester French, flanked by two bronze panels bearing Lincoln's Gettysburg and second inaugural ad




