



Panhandle Refining Company is now in active operation, shipping large quantities of gasoline, kerosene and fuel oils, although the plant is not yet complete. 





WRITES ON NEED OF BETTER HIGHWAYS

Reid Says Good Roads Bene. fit Every Class of Citizen-

The Times has received the follow ing letter by Chas. W. Reid, cashier the National Bank of Commerce: In the development of a commun-ity, whether ancient or modern there is no stronger influence for progress than good roads. This fact has been recognized since the earliest days, and the Romans, to whom the world owes so much, were great pioneers of road building. Whenever they took charge of the administering of a country, one of their first acts was to build great roads over which the civilizing influence of commercial interchange could pass and re-pass with as little difficulty as possible.

In the United States, the great distances between cities, the com-paratively scattered population of the country districts and similar features of an immense continent have had a tendency to delay road building more than in most other progressive countries, and it must also be re membered that in many instances in this country railroads, both steam and electric, superseded roads be fore the latter were built. In a general way, American roads have been sadly neglected in many parts of our country to the great disadvantage particularly of the rural population

It is certainly obvious that the rounty that possesses the best roads is the county that will possess the largest and most prosperous popula tion for the very good reason that reople will be attracted to a community where traveling by road enhanced by good roads that ad

This is of especial importance to the farmer, because with good-roads the cost of transporting farm product to the market is materially decreased and, of course, the upbuilding of communities materially increases the business, prosperity and population of the towns and cities

of the county It certainly requires no argument to convince a farmer of the actual money value to him of a good road leading into town. The time and rouble saved, the immensely reduced strain on his horses, the comfor and satisfaction of shorter trips these and many similar reasons are immediately apparent, as every farmer who has had to struggle with mir erable roads knows only too well Furthermore, good roads mean an in creased demand, at better prices, fo the products of the farmer, because good roads hasten the development of the farmer's business such, for ex ample, as dairy products and thimeans added prosperity to the farmer and to every other citizen in the county.

To quote only one instance, there is at the present time being shipped into our city each month thousands of dollars worth of butter from distant points and this would of course not be the case if good roads were ful and the farmers had the op portunities they should have for de livering their dairy products conveniently and economically.

The better the roads are that lead into town the larger is the population the farmer has as a market, the less is his cost of transportation and the more comforts and conveniences are added to life on the farm.

One very satisfactory feature about good roads is that they benefit ev-erybody impartially. There is no favored class who derives benefit more than any other. The city man benefits as well as the farmer and every person who has occasion to travel upon the roads reaps satisfaction and comfort from the improvement of the public highways for anything that tends to make connection between tends to make connection between people easier is an advantage and DEFENSE MEETING certainly that is the great achieve-


