London (By mail) - Teetotalers and rohibitionists have hailed with joy an intimation by David Lloyd George the minister of munitions, that all stent whiskey stills in the British eles will be taken over by the gov ernment for war work until the end of the war, to be used for the production of certain of the ingredients

explosives. There will be no shortage of whiskey, however. The distillers say they have a stock in bond quite sufficient to supply the normal consumption in this country for at least three years. also point out that unless the war should come to a sudden end their supply would last four years owing to the lessened consumption due to the restricted sale now in




