

NOTABLE DEVELOPMENTS CONSIDERED IMMINENT IN EXPEDITION MOVEMENTS

QUICK DASH BY CAVALRY IS PLANNED

GENERAL PERSHING HOPES TO CLOSE IN ON BANDIT VERY SOON BY MEANS OF FAST DRIVE WHICH WILL START AT ONCE.

MEN ARE PICKED

Selected Troopers Will Take Part In Maneuver—Field Headquarters of Expedition May Soon Be Moved South From Colonia Dublan.

Field Headquarters, American Expeditionary Force, Colonia Dublan, Mexico, March 28.—(via wireless to Columbus.)

Preparations for closing in on Francisco Villa in a quick, thoroughly prepared drive were being pushed forward rapidly today at the field headquarters of Brigadier General J. J. Pershing, expeditionary commander.

A body of picked cavalrymen has been concentrated and is now in reserve at the front somewhere south of Namaquipa on the northeastern edge of Namaquipa on the northeastern edge of Guerrero district. These men are prepared to make a dash of indefinite duration as soon as the bandit chieftain is located.

It is known that American military leaders look to the cavalry for the actual capture of Villa. With the establishment of a new American advance base 120 miles south of Casas Grandes and with developments apparently imminent, it is believed that the field headquarters may be moved shortly from Colonia Dublan to a point near the front, so that General Pershing may be in closer communication with the troops in the American vanguard.

Army reports indicated today that quiet continued to prevail along the American line and that there has been no engagement in which American troops had a part.

WILL RAISE \$50,000 REWARD FOR VILLA

American and Mexican Business Men at Monterey Plan Large Fund.

Brownsville, Tex., March 28.—American and Mexican business men at Monterey are endeavoring to raise \$50,000 in gold as a reward for the capture of Villa, dead or alive, it was said today by Americans returning from there. It is planned to have the reward go either to the capturers or to some charitable institution.

HEAVY AMMUNITION SHIPMENTS ARRIVE

Now at Columbus and May Be Intended for Use by Expeditionary Force.

By Associated Press. Columbus, N. M., March 28.—A considerable quantity of ammunition has been unloaded here within the last few days, several carloads arriving today. Whether or not this is to be sent to General Pershing's command is not known. (Six words deleted by censor.)

With the establishment of the new field base 120 miles south of Casas Grandes the vanguard of the force has reached a point in the mountainous region where motor cars are no longer available for service and mules are to be used exclusively. Newspaper correspondents here were notified today that the army censorship regulations are being taken here and at other points where news concerning the progress of the pursuit of Villa may develop.

CARRANZA URGED TO GIVE ANSWER AS TO RAILWAYS

MEMORANDUM IS DISPATCHED TO HEAD OF CONSTITUTIONALIST GOVERNMENT BY STATE DEPARTMENT TODAY

ASK PROMPT ACTION

Problem Declared Very Pressing and Washington Does Not Want to Wait Upon Completion of Protocol Now Pending

By Associated Press. Washington, March 28.—A memorandum to General Carranza pressing for an immediate reply to the request for permission to use Mexican railways in supplying American troops in pursuit of Villa was prepared today at the state department. It will be forwarded to Queretaro probably late today and be delivered by special representative, Rodgers to General Carranza and General Obregon. The memorandum points out that the problem of supplying troops now more than 200 miles from the border is a pressing one and need not be delayed for the protocol covering the general subject. General Carranza's suggestion as to the modifications and additions to the draft of the protocol are still under consideration in the state department. As considerable time may be required to bring the agreement into effect the American government will urge that the immediate use of Mexican "Northwestern" lines be considered separately at once.

GIRL CONFESSES FIRING BUILDING

TWO ARE KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED IN BLAZE WHICH RESULTS

FIVE UNDER ARREST

Girl's First Story Was That Masked Man, Board and Gagged Her In Her Room.

By Associated Press. Cleveland, O., March 28.—That she set fire to her room in an attempt to commit suicide this flames sweeping through an apartment building causing the death of two persons and serious injury to a score of others was the substance of a confession the police today said Miss Bessie Reimers, a waitress had made. Earlier in the day the girl had said that a masked man entered her apartment on the third floor of the apartment house, bound and gagged her and then set fire to the building. The police took three men and a woman into custody and placed a guard at the bedside of the Reimers girl. Later she is alleged to have made the confession.

Nearly all of the five held by the police were involved in a white slave investigation a few days ago, according to police officials, the Reimers girl being the alleged victim. One woman was sent to jail in connection with this affair.

Deaths Of Wealthy Couple Followed By Arrest Of Their Son-In-Law



As an outcome of his investigation of the deaths of John E. Peck, a millionaire drug manufacturer of Grand Rapids, Mich., and his wife at the home of their son-in-law, Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, in the Coliseum, an apartment house in New York City, on March 12 and Jan. 26, respectively District Attorney Swanwick directed detectives attached to his office to arrest Dr. Waite on a homicide charge. When the order was given, it subsequently became known, Dr. Waite was lying at his home in a state of coma, the result of drugs taken either to end his life or to quiet his nerves. Since the investigation began he has been watched by detectives and all visits from his home have been guarded, all of which he knew. He was not removed from his apartment, but detectives were left to guard him. On learning of this latest development District Attorney Swanwick put the evidence in his possession before the grand jury, calling as witnesses Dr. Jacob B. Cornell, a distant relative of the Pecks, and Dora Hillier, a waitress who was employed in the Waite home. The latter said Waite gave "medicine" to Peck in food. Dr. Waite is an expert indoor tennis player and a student of chemistry. In the accompanying pictures No. 1 is John E. Peck; No. 2, Mrs. Peck; No. 3, apartment house in which Dr. Waite (No. 4) and his wife live and in which the Pecks died.

BELIEVE JEALOUS LOVER SLEW NURSE

Police at Dallas Are Working On New Theory, But Have Made No Arrests

Dallas, Texas, March 28.—No arrests had been made today in the case of Miss Zoala May Cramer, aged 24, the trained nurse who was found choked to death early yesterday on the Oak Cliff high school campus. Officers, however, have changed their opinion that the woman was criminally assaulted. An examination of the body, it was said, failed to substantiate this belief.

Officers are now working on the theory that she was attacked by a jealous lover. The opening of her suit case and the securing of her contents has given rise to the theory, the police say, that the assailant sought to obtain letters to Miss Cramer believed to have been in her possession.

MORE AEROPLANES ARE TO BE BOUGHT

Government Expected to Purchase Armored Machines For Service in Mexico

By Associated Press. San Diego, Cal., March 28.—Captain V. E. Clark, aeronautical engineer of the signal corps aviation school here and Lieut. Thomas DeWitt Milling, junior military aviator and instructor in flying, have received telegraphic instructions from the war department in Washington to purchase and inspect a number of new aeroplanes to be sent to the forces in Mexico. They said their instructions were to leave immediately. It is understood Captain Clark and Lieut. Milling are to purchase from eight to twelve 160 horse power armored aeroplanes. Machines similar to this type have been shipped in large numbers to the British and French flying corps. It is said, and have given excellent service. These planes are protected by a plate of heavy steel. They develop a speed of from 80 to 90 miles an hour with pilot and observer and can carry enough fuel for a 500 mile flight.

GERMANS MAKE AIR RAID UPON SALONIKI

Heavy Fighting is Developing On Franco-Belgian Front According to Statement

Berlin, March 28.—The development of heavy fighting on the Franco-Belgian front south of St. Eloi and along the adjacent lines is reported by German army headquarters in today's official statement. According to the announcement a German flying squadron made a raid on Saloniki yesterday dropping many bombs on the north harbor and petroleum depot and on the camp of the entente allies north of the town.

FLOOD CONDITIONS IN OHIO SERIOUS

No Lives Known to Be Lost, But Large Section of Territory is Inundated

By Associated Press. Columbus, O., March 28.—Flood conditions in central and northern Ohio has not improved sufficiently today to allay all fears of serious damage. Many rivers and creeks overflowed their banks yesterday and last night inundating thousands of acres of lowlands and driving hundreds of families from their homes. Property damage, however, was not high, and so far as known no lives were lost.

GERMANY ASKED NO NEW ATTACK FOR INFORMATION MADE AT VERDUN; IN SUSSEX CASE ARTILLERY BUSY

INQUIRY IS SENT TO ASCERTAIN IF ANY OF HER SUBMARINES TORPEDOED BRITISH CABINET DISCUSSES SITUATION

OUTLOOK FOR BREAK SUBMARINE RESULTS

Much Depends Upon Answer That Germany Makes—Grave Outlook is Taken as to Possibilities of Incident of Recent Days

By Associated Press. Washington, March 28.—The United States has invited Germany through Ambassador Gerard whether any of its submarines torpedoed the British channel steamer Sussex. Secretary Lansing announced after the cabinet meeting today that it had been decided to make such an inquiry and later it was learned that the inquiry had been made and the fact probably is already in Berlin. The present status of communication is that of an inquiry; it has not advanced to the stage of a protestor demand. The president and cabinet members were furnished with all reports concerning the disaster when they reached the state department from diplomatic and consular representatives in France and England. While cabinet members declared the situation grave, they took the position that a break with Germany was not an immediate prospect, it was said, however, that if Germany admitted torpedoing the Sussex a situation would be brought about which would be most serious. Cabinet members agreed that the decision would depend much on Germany's reply to the American inquiry. Should Germany deny that one of her submarines attacked the Sussex, the American government would reach its conclusion from the evidence now being collected by its diplomatic representatives abroad. Cabinet members said the decision to make an inquiry of Germany was in line with the policy of collecting all the information before a decision was reached. Should Germany admit the attack but claim the submarine commander exceeded his orders, officials believe that would be regarded as sufficient to make it impracticable for submarine commanders to attempt to distinguish between armed and unarmed vessels. The possibility that the attack on the Sussex might lead to a general clearing up of the submarine issue was discussed at the cabinet meeting.

The Associated Press summarizes the European war operations as follows: Infantry continues inactive at Verdun and even the notable artillery fire reported for some days in the Ypres salient has slackened. The German drive has resumed a heavy fire to the west of the river, however, showing the French lines south of Malancourt in the sector where the recent German drive took the crown-prince's troops south to the edge of the Avocourt woods from which a new attempt to debouch may now be preparing. A surprise attack by the French in the forest of Petroy in Lorraine is reported by Paris, a German trench being blown up after which the attacking forces withdrew with some prisoners. On Italian Front. Bitter fighting is again taking place along the Austro-Italian front. The Austrians launched an attack on Val Piccolo, taking a trench, but in counter attacks the Italian forces not only succeeded in reconquering the position but took Austrian trenches elsewhere according to the Rome report. Vienna declares that Russian activity in Galicia has slackened, the Russians having attempted no attacks against the army of General Pflanzer during the past week. British airmen have made a successful raid on the Turkish advance base at Bir El Hasaanah, 100 miles east of the Suez canal, according to reports from Rome. Damage to Shipping. London figures on the damage done shipping since Germany's new submarine campaign was begun show that in less than a fortnight beginning March 15 vessels with an aggregate tonnage of 70,000 have been sunk, one-third of this tonnage belonging to neutrals. Today the sinking of the British steamer Empress of Midland, 224 tons, is reported; the crew was saved. Casualties from the explosion which damaged the cross channel steamer Sussex are not expected to exceed 20, the steamer's agent announces.

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MINE EXPLOSION CAUSES 3 DEATHS

West Virginia Coal Workings—Scene of Fatal Accident This Morning

By Associated Press. Wheeling, West Va., March 28.—An explosion occurred this morning in the east entry of the King Coal Company mine at Kimball near here. Three deaths and five injuries were reported by the mine. It was not known just how many men were affected by the blast. The workings extended forty-two miles from the opening. Ordinarily some 400 miners are employed.

GIVES ESTIMATE OF PARIS FIRE DAMAGE

State Fire Marshal Says Loss is Ten to Fourteen Millions—50 Per Cent Insured

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 28.—An official statement issued here today by State Fire Marshal Wallace Hughes places the total loss in connection with the Paris, Texas, fire at from \$10,000,000 to \$14,000,000. Insurance will cover 50 per cent of the loss.

MANY AMERICANS LEAVING TAMPICO

Women and Children Sent Away From Oil Fields as Retaliatory Measure

It is not known how many persons are on board the yacht. Reports are that Tampico is still quiet but that it was decided to send the women and children to the United States as a precautionary measure.

APPROPRIATION FOR EXPEDITION MADE

Socialist is Only Member of House To Vote Against Emergency Measure

Representative Meyer London of New York, the lone Socialist member of the House, declared the Mexican expedition was a blunder that would lead to war and cast the only dissenting vote. Former Speaker Cannon declared that whatever the result of the Mexican expedition the country would stand together on the question of national defense. Republican Leader Mann demanded a record vote on the bill to demonstrate that whatever was needed for defense would be voted without a dissenting vote.

### MANY OLD TIMERS KNEW TEX RICKARD

Well Known Fight Promoter Resided at Henrietta in His Early Days.

"Tex" Rickard, who promoted the Willard-Moran combat in New York Saturday, is known to many old timers in this county and in Northwest Texas, as he from his early days in Henrietta and was a more or less frequent visitor to Wichita Falls. Since he became such a prominent figure in the pugilistic world he has been extensively "written up." Few men have had more vicissitudes of fortune and "Tex" has in many ways surprised the old timers who recall him as a gawky cowboy.

One of the many articles recently published about "Tex" says he was a city marshal of Henrietta at the age of 22. This is disputed by some folks who know him, although they believe that he sported a badge and toled an officer's gun, being probably a deputy constable or something of the sort. One of the biographers of him recently published the following:

Rickard is the personification of all that is implied in "a dead game sport." Only a man as is Rickard could have so successfully promoted the greatest contest of its kind. Tex Rickard is a quiet, frank faced, youthful man, with an undistinguished air of the wild west—when it was wild. He is 36 years old—but appears younger. He looks out of a keen, dark eye, and has a closed mouth ready to curl in friendly smiles or tighten into ominous lines. His speech is quick, and his tongue has the twist of a Texas cowboy. His hand is always open to grasp the palm of a friend distressed or to clinch in defense of those he cares for.

He has won and lost fortunes. He has won and lost them without a murmur, without a single word of joy or sorrow. He has traveled the uncertain road from rags to riches and back again, with never a complaint to life's street commissioner. At the present moment he is on the sunny side of Easy avenue—and walking fast.

Although his cognomen is "Tex" (short for Texas), he is not from the Lone Star State. Rickard was born in Kansas City, Mo., January 2, 1871. When two years old young Rickard was taken by his family to the Panhandle—Henrietta, Texas, where his father built the first flour mill that those frontier days knew.

But young Tex did not become a millwright. At the age of 10 years he punched cows and Indians and buffaloes from the Indian Territory to the wilds of Montana.

At the age of 22 he was elected city marshal of Henrietta, Texas. It was while keeping the peace of the town that he first heard of far away Alaska and her fabulous fortunes.

In the fall of 1895 we find him in "Chitchee" City, Alaska. Then came the famous "Klondike strike." Within two months, after suffering untold trials and horrors, he reappeared in Alaska. There he staked a claim, worked as a miner and helped wash the first gold ever uncovered—in a washing machine. In a little over an hour the machine produced \$10,000 worth of gold. This created a sensation and Rickard, longing for the city, sold his claim for \$25,000 over an hour. This was his first fortune. In three months it was all gone! Tex undertook to run a gambling house in Dawson City and he broke his hand.

First broke, Rickard went to chopping cord wood with Rex Beach, the novelist, as a partner. In a few weeks he made enough to take him to the coast. He arrived there on the floating sea on June 29, 1899 with two ounces of gold dust—about \$20.

These months and 20 days later he returned with \$40,000 in the purse's keeping. The saloon and gambling house, he says, was his gold mine. For the next five summers Tex averaged close to \$100,000 and grub staked every broken "sour nough" who came to him for a loan.

Then, aspiring to a metropolitan existence, he journeyed forth to Seattle, where he lost it all!

He returned to the coast of gold at Goldfield in 1904. Rickard, ever alert traced it back immediately, landing among the scattered shacks of a mining town. He was in luck. He was a bona fide handkerchief. Before long there was another Northern saloon and gambling house.

In the course of a year the Northern made a round million dollars profit for Tex.

Then came the panic and he was broke again!

Times soon brightened, however—the pendulum of fortune swung back and Tex accumulated another million. However, the boxing game was nothing in the western man's young life. The first fight he ever saw was between Britt and McGovern, May 2, 1905, in Madison Square Garden. Tex was in New York on business at the time and when he returned to Goldfield he decided to give a big fight out here would boast and advertise the town.

He started the sporting world by offering Gans and Nelson a \$20,000 purse for a 15-round fight. They thought him "loco." However, the gate receipts of \$67,715 proved how crazy he must have been. This was his first experience as a prize fight promoter. And he wasn't very stuck on the job either. The holdup methods of Nelson's manager, "Ike" Nelson, and a few others nearly cured him of ever assaying the role of promoter again.

We are all familiar with his part in the Johnson-Defries contest. The trials and tribulations of the Gans-Nelson battle paled into insignificance when compared with that big battle in Reno. However, the world receipts of \$270,775. The purse was \$100,000 with a \$10,000 bonus to each man. Those records will probably never be surpassed.

Rickard meant the Reno fight to be his last but the first thing he knew was he was tangled up in the Willard-Moran affair. He didn't intend to have a thing to do with it—he merely wanted to give his friend Sam McCrackin, a little advice and was engaged to give the fight. He decided to go the limit, as is characteristic of his nature. As a result the size of the purse broke all records for a round no decision bout. Tex is paying the fighters \$71,250 and Willard receiving \$47,500 and Moran just half that much.

"Sure! I've had my share of bumps and boosts in life, and I am about ready to retire. I have worked hard the last ten years and I am going to enjoy the rest of my life. I own 37,000 acres of land in Paraguay, South America, besides some stock in the Paraguay Lumber and Cattle Company, which ought to keep me comfortable the rest of my days."

"Promoting this fight has been fun for me—I needed a little recreation."

## PERSHING DOES NOT ANTICIPATE EARLY SUCCESS

Columbus, N. M., March 25.—A speedy termination of the American expedition into Mexico is not looked for by General Pershing, commander of the forces in the field, according to advices received here. It was asserted that following a staff conference General Pershing announced that the people of the United States should not place too much confidence in reports that Villa, the factional leader, whose commands attacked this town several weeks ago, has been bottled up, either by the American forces or by Mexican troops. The nature of the country, he was pointed out, in which Villa is supposed to be renders it difficult for any force to surround effectually a small band in the mountains with passes and trails well known to the hands offering a means of escape.

While it was understood that General Pershing does not attempt to predict the length of the time American troops may be in Mexico, it was intimated that the period may extend into months.

Other reports also received from unofficial sources indicated that with (deleted) troops in the field, American military authorities believe a sufficient number of men of all arms of the service have been concentrated at Las Ascension, Casas Grandes and Colonia Dublan.

## BIG DECREASE IN 1915 COTTON CROP

Wichita County Produced Less Than Half as Much as in 1914, Census Shows.

Wichita county's 1915 cotton crop was considerably less than half of the 1914 yield, according to the census bureau's report for the two years and the same proportion prevailed in practically all Northwest Texas counties. ### AVIATION TRAINING SCHOOL PROPOSED

St. Louis Citizen Offers to Aid Government in Securing Enough Army Flyers.  
By Associated Press.  
St. Louis, Mo., March 28.—Albert Bond Lambert of St. Louis, head of the United States Aviation Reserve, who has offered the co-operation of the organization to the federal government for service in Mexico, hopes to see the mobilization soon of civilian flyers on a 64-acre field here, offered free to the government by the St. Louis Citizens' Aviation School. Lambert telegraphed to Senator Stone of Missouri recommending that a bill to call out the reserve corps of flyers and organizing a school for mobilization of aviators and co-ordinating elements be introduced in Congress. The war department is powerless to take action in the matter without the sanction of Congress.

Our actions are not in anticipation of war, Mr. Lambert said, but for protection of the troops now on the Mexican border. The army should have at least one airplane for every 200 men. The present aid is to get Congress to call for the mobilization of the reserve corps of flyers. A field of 640 acres has been offered free to the government for this purpose. From the Chicago camp, the army field at San Antonio would be suitable. This concentration would offer the army its choice of men for first line work.

Mr. Lambert declared that aeroplane exports to Europe average about \$215,000 a week, or about 65 machines. "In case of more serious difficulty with Mexico," he said, "the government probably would be compelled to hold up these shipments for its own use. Aeroplanes are useless, however, without men who understand them. This lack of preparedness in army aeroplanes is illustrated in the National Guard. Only two states, New York and Rhode Island, have given aviation service any attention. 

Change in Customs of Courtship is Probable as One Result of War
Paris (By Mail)—Genuine courtship is being made an incident to marriage in one of the innovations that war has brought to France. It may develop into a revolution of the marriage system, and is most certain in any case to be the death of much of the real time that has entangled and more or less strangled cupid's shafts. Marriage was hard hit during the first months of the war, but by reason of the authorization of unions by proxy and the infusion of war insurance, it is rapidly recovering. In Paris there were only 768 marriages in January, 1915, as against 2,441 in January, 1914. In December, 1915 there were 1,289 showing a remarkable recovery under the circumstances. In a great many of these war marriages, it is noticed that girls without fortune are for the time being winning their more favored sisters a steady courtship, and in some cases a bullet wound in her head.
