



London, (By Mail.)—Almost com-plete disappearance or the ragged but picturesque street vendors and other idnerant frequenters of London's

picturesque street vendors and other iffnerant frequenters of London's thoroughfares is one of the notable changes brought about by a year and a half of war.

Hefore hostilities began the curb stones of the principal streets were lined from morning to night by hawkers of pirated copies of popular songs, cheap toy sellers and match vendors, while at every few yards the passerby was accosted by a man or woman carrying a fruit-basket or a tray laden with chocolates or other candies. Now these are gone and pedestrians are grateful for the relief from the constant appeals to buy. At the same time the police are pleased to be freed from the continuous duty of keeping the ragged army within the limits of the city ordinances.
