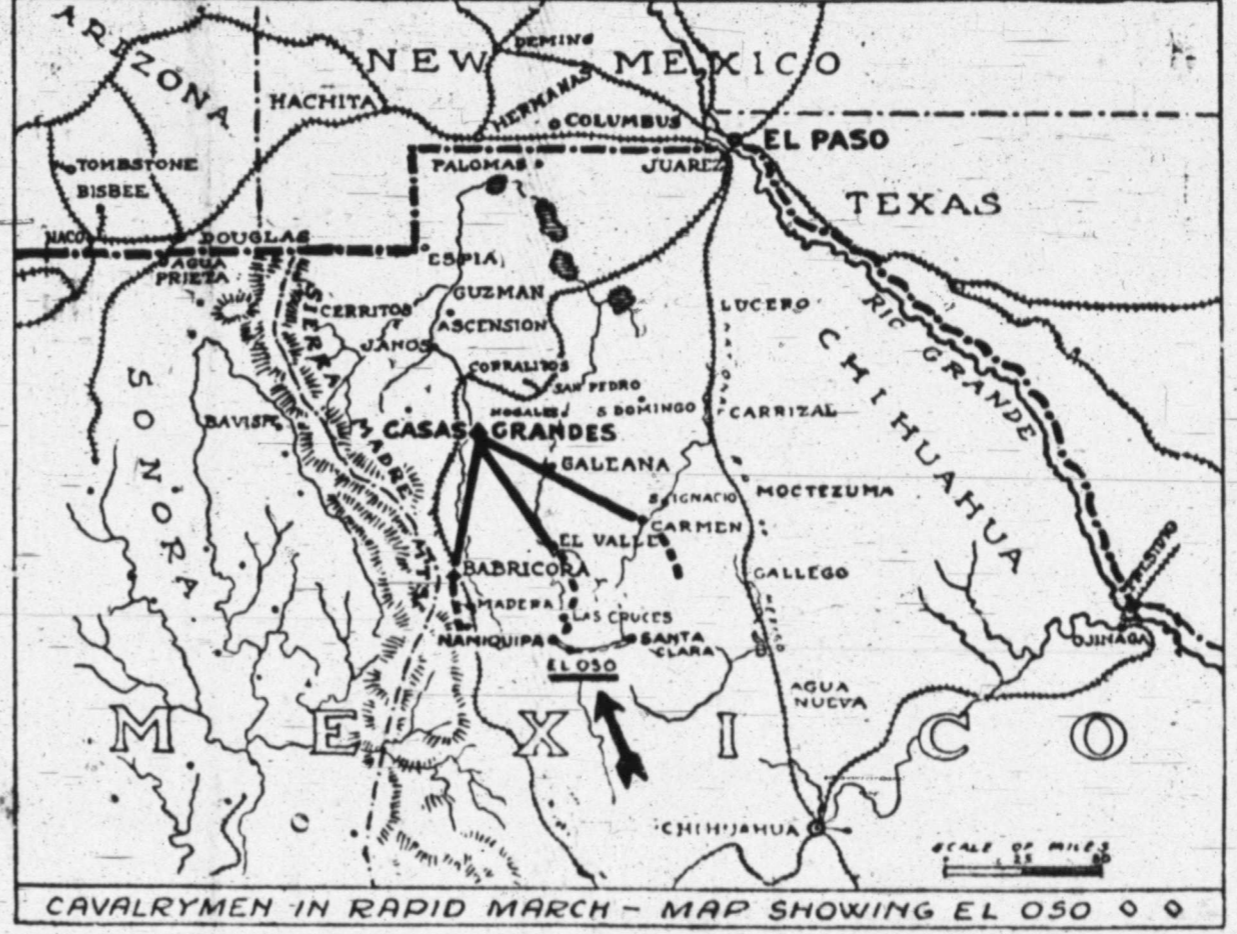

30 DEAD IN OHIO WRECK OF 3 TRAINS

NEW YORK CENTRAL FLYERS ARE INVOLVED IN COLLISION AND DERAILMENT AND CASUALTY LIST WILL BE HEAVY.

FOG HID SIGNALS

Second Section of East Bound Crashes Into Front Section, and Twentieth Century Limited is Derailed by Wreckage.

By Associated Press. Cleveland, Ohio, March 29.—Three of the New York Central's fastest and finest trains were involved in a double wreck at four o'clock this morning near Amherst, 37 miles west of this city, described as one of the worst railroad disasters in the state's history.

It was known at noon that at least 30 persons had been killed, the exact number not being available before nightfall, and that more than 40 had been injured.

A dense fog obscured the signal set by the first section of the east-bound train to Pittsburg, Baltimore and Buffalo, and the second section crashed into it. The wreckage was scattered over the track of the west bound train, the Twentieth Century Limited, which was derailed.

This afternoon 25 bodies had been taken from the wreck and at least five more are known to be in the debris. Rescue parties are working frantically to recover other injured.

When the total of dead and injured is finally ascertained, it is believed the wreck will surpass in cost of life and limb even the wreck in the Twentieth Century Limited at Mento, near Cleveland, in 1904, when the fast train ran into a freight on its second trip on the New York-Chicago 20-hour run. The wreck is one of the worst in the history of Ohio, involving three of the New York Central's fastest and finest trains.

Had Stopped For Water. The three trains in the wreck, east-bound train No. 88, the east-bound Chicago to Buffalo Flyer, and the Twentieth Century Limited, the pride of the New York Central. The second section of the Flyer crashed into the first section in a heavy fog when the first section stopped to take water.

The limited westbound plowed through wreckage which had been hurled to the westbound track before flagmen could be sent out to stop it. Most of those killed were asleep in the rear day coach of train No. 88 at the time of the crash and they had removed wraps and other articles of identifying clothing.

Some dead were found in the rear coaches of the second section of the Flyer which buckled over onto the limited's track and was splintered by that train. Most of the dead are said to be foreigners.

Bodies Are Mangled. The bodies of many of those scantily clad victims were so horribly mangled that identification will be impossible. Heads, arms, legs and portions of bodies were scattered through the wreck.

Two coaches of the limited were overturned, but none of the train's passengers was killed, although a number were injured. The low casualties are attributed to the fact that the limited was going slowly because of fog. The second section of the Flyer was traveling at high speed when it struck the first section.

Train crew casualties in the wreck included one fireman whose body was found on the boiler of one engine. Search will be made for the bodies of two express messengers, expected to be found among express car wreckage piled twenty feet high.

One Engineer Unhurt. C. C. Robinson of Toledo, engineer of the Twentieth Century, crawled uninjured from under his engine after it had plunged 400 feet along the ties.

A Conductor of Pittsburg, a survivor of the wreck today said he saw a woman die in the wreck before he could extricate her. Another woman was badly injured and a man had his arms torn from their sockets.

Alfred Fritzele of Cleveland escaped injury and helped in the rescue work. A. B. Ray of Pittsburg, was thrown from his berth in a sleeper in train No. 10 into one of the piles by a coach across the aisle, but was uninjured.

STATE TUBERCULOSIS PROVISIONS INCREASED

San Angelo, Tex., March 29.—Provision is being made the state tuberculosis colony at Carlsbad, near El Paso, for the accommodation of the additional patients, according to Dr. McKnight, superintendent of the institution. This will increase the total capacity of the institution to approximately 250. About 100 persons have applied for admission into the colony and the new provisions are believed ready to receive them. The new buildings in the course of construction will be completed and ready for occupancy not later than August 1. The additional facilities include a dining hall which will have a capacity of 100 persons. Appropriations were made by the 34th legislature for these improvements and all buildings are modern in every respect.
