Washington, March 29 .-- General Carranza has agreed to permit the movement of supplies to the punitive expedition over the Mexican Northwestern railroad. The supplies will go as commercial freight to concerns in Mexico with which the army has contracts.

The use of the railroad will so facilitate the movement of troops and supplies that the work of the punitive expedition in Mexico will be greatly shortened.

The success of the expedition depends largely upon getting men and supplies behind Villa quickly and to portions of the country where the army motor truck trains cannot go.






