NO AMERICAN CASUALTIES ARE SUSTAINED IN SECOND CLASH WITH VILLA FORCES

No American casualties whatever were sustained in the fight of April 1 at Aguas Callientes, in which the Tenth United States Cavalry defeated a force of 300 Villistas, 30 of the latter being killed. The first news of the fight was published here in a second edition of The Times Tuesday afternoon. Villa was not with the detachment that the Americans defeated. The Villista band had relaxed its vigilance, believing little well away from the pursuing Americans, when the latter, under the command of Col. W. C. Brown, appeared. The Mexicans fled precipitately, offering little resistance. Details of the conflict are meager.



In fact such eggs are apt to be better than a good part of the fresh eggs found upon the market which have not been refrigerated at all. But if you paid for strictly fresh eggs you should get them.

There are not as many cold storage eggs on the market as commonly supposed. Only about 15 per cent of our market eggs are really cold storage eggs.

Refrigeration preserves eggs because it prohibits the growth of these bacteria.
