200 ENTRIES IN SCHOOL CONTEST

NORTHWEST TEXAS DISTRICT INTERSCHOOL MEET TO BEGIN FRIDAY.

SEND STRONG TEAMS

Large Squads Coming From Bowie and Other Towns—Contests to End Saturday.

With about 200 entries in the various track, field and literary contests the Northwest Texas District Interscholastic Meet to be staged here Friday afternoon and all day Saturday promises to be the biggest event of the sort in the history of the interscholastic league in this district. Entries have already been received from 23 schools and there will be perhaps others to enter today and tomorrow. Bowie has 24 contestants from her schools alone and the town of Margaret is sending 20 students to participate in the various events, including a girls' basketball team which will play the Henrietta basketball team Saturday morning on the high school court. Nocona, the cup winner of last year, is sending a large delegation, having men entered in every event, having men entered in every represented in every contest with the exception of the girls' declamation contest.

The local winners in the junior meet who will represent the county in the district events will have strong opposition to their champion claims in Halesell, which is sending a strong representation in all junior events. It is not known just yet what opposition there will be in the junior declamation contest but there are a number of entrants.

The track and field preliminaries both junior and senior will be held Friday afternoon and the contestants narrowed down to five or possibly four men in each event. Owing to the large number of entrants the preliminaries will take more time than usual. The debating and declamation preliminaries will be held Saturday morning and the junior track finals at the same time. The girls' basketball game will be held also Saturday morning. Saturday afternoon will close the athletic contests with the senior track finals and the baseball game between the Wichita Falls high school and Henrietta. Saturday night the debate and declamation finals will be held and the prizes awarded to the winners in all contests.

There will be no admission charged in the preliminary meets but Saturday afternoon a charge will be made for the meet and ball game that a part of the expenses may be met in this manner. An invitation has been extended to the public to attend in order to encourage high school sports. It is expected that the schools sending representatives will also send delegations of rooters as has been the custom in the previous meets.

The schools already entered include: Bellevue, Northfield, Nocona, Holliday, Archer City, Bowman, Margaret, Ikard, Baxter, Bowie, Petrolia, Falsell, Margaret, Crowell, Henrietta, Quanah, Tolbert, Bushyhead, Electric, Graham, Newcastle, Yanti and Caldwell.

Friends of Mr. Henry have leased the Wichita theatre for the meeting which will be held at eight o'clock Saturday night, April 30. Mayor A. H. Britain will introduce Mr. Henry.

JOHNSON NOT TO ACCEPT POSITION

FORCED TO DECLINE SECRETARYSHIP OF LOCAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

IS UNDER CONTRACT

Gainesville Organization Unwilling to Release Before First of Next Year

B. F. Johnson, secretary of the Gainesville Chamber of Commerce, who was elected secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday, declined the position today in a telegram to J. W. Thomas, acting secretary. Mr. Johnson declared that the Gainesville Chamber's directors declined to accept his resignation until the first of January, 1917, and that while he could quit immediately he did not care to do so, as such action would incur the enmity of the board.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce received the news with deep regret, for they consider Mr. Johnson about the best man they could get to fill the position.

President Huff of the Chamber of Commerce received the following letter from Mr. Johnson this afternoon:

"Mr. R. E. Huff, Wichita Falls, Texas. Dear Sir and friend: Never have I been placed in such an awkward position as that in which I find myself at present. My directors have refused to accept my resignation, maintaining that I have no right to resign until my year was out and that the thirty days notice was understood to mean notice of my dismissal for cause.

"I realize that I have embarrassed you and your committee unintentionally and hereby apologize to all concerned. I could keep faith with you by wounding the feelings of those with whom I have worked for the past several years, but between the

law has estimated that it will cost the ginners of the state \$2,000,000 to observe next year, the new law in all its provisions relating to the gin. He claims the expense of the warehouse commission are more than the entire expenses of the railroad commission.

A bureau of information under the direction of the state warehouse department will be maintained here during the convention and one or two experts from the department will be on hand to explain the new law in all its phases.

According to the statement of members of the commission, there are thousands of ginners and farmers in the state not familiar with the provisions of the new law. Since the measure was held constitutional by the higher courts, ginners have been making effort to comply with the provisions, but it is said to be apparent that some phases of the act are not fully understood.

UNPARDONABLE SIN SERMON SUBJECT

Dr. A. S. Andrews Preaches On This Theme at Revival Service Wednesday Night.

Dr. Andrews' sermon on "The Unpardonable Sin" at the M. E. Church South last night was heard by the largest congregation of the week, a congregation that was responsive to the earnest appeal of the sermon, which resulted in the acceptance by one man of the pastor's invitation. There were also five requests for prayers. The music as usual was a feature of the service, Mesdames Thornburn and N. M. Clifford singing "Face to Face" as a special number.

The unpardonable sin was defined by Dr. Andrews as continued resistance to God. He announced his text from Mark 11:25-27:

"Verily I say unto you, all sin shall be forgiven unto the sons of man, and blasphemies whosoever they shall blaspheme; but he that shall sin against the Holy Ghost shall never be forgiven." In his opening remarks the speaker referred to Christ as the forgiving Savior.

"God," he said, "is the sinner's best friend. It is sad to know that there is one among the catalogue of sins which even God can not forgive.

"What is the unpardonable sin? Let me say first that as all rivers flow to the sea, so all manner of sin will lead to the unpardonable sin. All intentional sin is dangerous. When we sin against light and knowledge we crucify the Son of God afresh. A settled course of premeditated sin is but the beginning of the end. In the second place, the non-use of the powers given will lead to the decay of those powers. Let your arm hang helplessly by your side and soon its strength will be gone. Fail to use your eyes to drink in the light, and the power of sight will be taken from you. This is nature's inexorable law. God has given us spiritual sight and apprehension, and if we fail to use this God given power it will be taken from us."

Dr. Andrews spoke of the mole that burrows in the ground, and the fish in the Mammoth Cave who have lived in the darkness so long that they are now blind, and will be forever.

"In the third place," he continued, "continuance in sin hardens the heart of man until he becomes fixed in his life course. It is improbable that such a man will ever change. More than this he is dulled into a false security, and finds no pleasure save in a life of sin."

The speaker described a man lost in a snow storm. At first the cold was biting and awful, but soon it became pleasant, and the man could sink to sleep in comfort. He would feel warmth while he was freezing to death.

"What then is the unpardonable sin?" He is confirmed resistance to God. It is the continual denial of God. It is day by day resisting the Holy Spirit until we bolt the doors of our hearts forever."

Dr. Andrews referred to the budding of the trees for spring time, and spoke of seeing one tree in which the sap would never rise again. It had sinned away its day of grace. Its decayed branches were slowly falling. Soon the wind would blow it down, but for months it has been dead.

"So it is with many lives," he said. "Resisting God, rebelling against God they have sinned away their lives and have gone forever beyond the reach of God himself."

Tonight Dr. Andrews will preach on the "Eternal Punishment of the Wicked." The subject will be treated from a rational and Bible standpoint. The public is cordially invited.

COUNCIL TO ACT ON PAVING BOND ISSUE

Will Probably Order Election at Meeting Tonight For From \$30,000 to \$40,000

A new street improvement bond issue of between \$30,000 and \$40,000 will be ordered tonight by the city aldermen at the regular weekly council meeting, to continue the work of paving Eighth street from Scott to Brook avenue, Burnett avenue from Eighth to Seventeenth street and on other streets. The date of the election will be the same as that for the \$65,000 school bond election.

Four additional members will be appointed on the health board upon recommendation of Dr. J. T. Traylor, city food and dairy inspector and Dr. J. F. Reed.

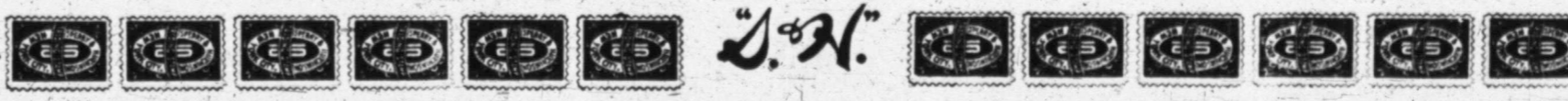

In a letter to Messrs. Jones and Eller, Mr. Prescott submits his proposition, as follows: "Gentlemen: Many of the voters of the 11th congressional district express the belief that one candidate can easily defeat the present incumbent, Mr. Stephens, but a majority think that if we three continue in the race Mr. Stephens will be re-elected for his 11th term. Many of the voters and voters of the district are asking that we arrange some kind of an elimination and that only one man make the race. In deference to the opinions of these good people I think it nothing but right that we should make an effort to comply with their reasonable request. I made the race in 1914 and have never ceased to run since that time, having in mind that I would surely make the race again in 1916. I am not a politician, in the least, the right of each of you to make the race also. The field is open and the water is fine. In no manner do I claim a superior right to make the race for congress above that of any other man in the part of any good citizen to desire to represent his people in the national congress, yet I am willing to defer this ambition for the common good. I am writing you in the spirit of friendship, having no other motive than the desire to see the will of the people of the district made known."
