tle, in places. There has been 23 of an inch of moisture during the seven days ending April 12.

RAILROADS AND AUTO MAKERS IN MOVE FOR PREPAREDNESS

New York, April 24.—Development of a system of military transportation as one step toward national preparedness has been undertaken by representatives of railroads and automobile companies with the cooperation of the war college. It is announced here, on behalf of the society of Automobile Engineers. A conference was held at the war office in Washington last Monday, the society's statement disclosed and suggestions declared to be favorably regarded were made, that motor truck corps be placed under the jurisdiction of the quarter master's department when the final plans have been made and the railroad transportation corps of the army be organized.

It was stated that the board of directors of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce had authorized its executives to "meet the military authorities at any point" and that the American Automobile Association and the American Railway Association committee also would lend cooperation.

'BUMPTIOUSNESS' OF NATION CRITICISED

Speaker at State University Derides Idea That Americans Are "Chosen People."

Special to The Times. Austin, Texas, April 24.—Scolding and at the same time philosophically explaining group egotism, which he said was the basis of American bumptiousness and provincialism, Dr. George E. Vincent delivered a very notable address in the auditorium of the University of Texas recently. "Preparedness he declared was largely a matter of efficiency, unity and solidarity within the nation. And in order to have a unified nation it was necessary to grant opportunities to make a decent living and distribute the burdens of society as equally as possible upon all. This he declared was the secret of the wonderful efficiency and unity of Germany at the present time. The subject of his address was "Sense and the States" and his talk was largely an analysis and interpretation of this phrase. He said that the state should not be looked upon as an opportunity for private gain, but as a collection of services for the common good. He ridiculed the "chosen people" idea and the "manifest destiny" notion which the American nation seemed obsessed with, and recommended careful planning and logical and efficient development, a national purpose and policy, and strictures. He declared individualism and run rampant in America, and that unless it was checked and the nation acquired more social vision, America could not hope to go forward. He declared that whether America liked it or not, collection was coming; that the state would be compelled to take

over more and more of the tasks of society. His sallies of wit, his biting sarcasm with which he ridiculed the follies of the American people, and moreover, his wonderful delivery of about 300 words a minute kept his audience thoroughly interested and in peals of laughter much of the time. Dr. Vincent is president of the University of Minnesota, and is a son of the founder of the great Chautauqua movement.

SIMPLE BUT TASTEFUL DESIGNS ARE OFFERED IN SUMMER STREET DRESSES

New York, April 24.—Although the fashions are still undergoing changes—and before summer is fairly here, we shall probably find many novelties which have as yet not put in an appearance—for the most part, at least, styles are established. The palettes, bustles, ruffles, wired hip pockets, and other weird effects are relegated to the house for evening and afternoons.

The Morning Walk on the Avenue. One is gratified at the simple, trim street suits and the smart little frocks of taffeta and other silks which greet our eyes in a morning walk on the Avenue. The jackets of the serge, gabardine and novelty wool suits are hip or knee length, fitted well through the shoulders and at the waist, which is usually a trifle raised, and are finished with full basques. The skirts, many of them, are of the circular gored models and hang full and gracefully from the top of a high inside belt. The effect of these jackets, worn with this type of skirt, or with one of the numerous pleated models which are equally popular, is

as a charming little model of plain sky blue taffeta, combined with Pompadour silk; it has a full gathered skirt of the plain blue, and a quaint corsage and bustle effect of the Pompadour silk, in its soft, delicate colorings. There is a quaint sacac-bodie which lends dainty touch. The sleeves and body portion of the waist are of white lawn, and the belt girde is laced over the bust and held in place with shoulder straps.

Belts and Girdles Again in Favor

One of the most interesting details of the smart little summer frocks, both of silk and wash fabrics is the girde. This is made of ribbon, one of the flowered or figured taffetas, an attractive Oriental silk or a metal embroidered novelty; and for the serge frock or suit, the various leathers, suede, patent leather, buckskin or a novelty of awvettes, ante-lope skin. The ordinary silk girde now measures at least four inches in width at its narrowest point, and at its widest, often from nine to twelve. The widest point is directly in front, the point as a rule, extending down over the front of the skirt. In some instances the point extends both up on the corsage and down below; this of course is nothing more or less than the quaint, fascinating bodice of our grandmothers' days. Others of the ribbon girdles are trimmed at the ends, gathered straight to the belt and forming a half tunic effect, with ribbon ruching at the bottom; or again, the sash ends are attached to the girde at the sides, hung to the knees and are turned back on themselves and caught at the back. Suspender-trimmings, sash bows, rosettes and all forms of ribbon trimmings are tremendously favored.

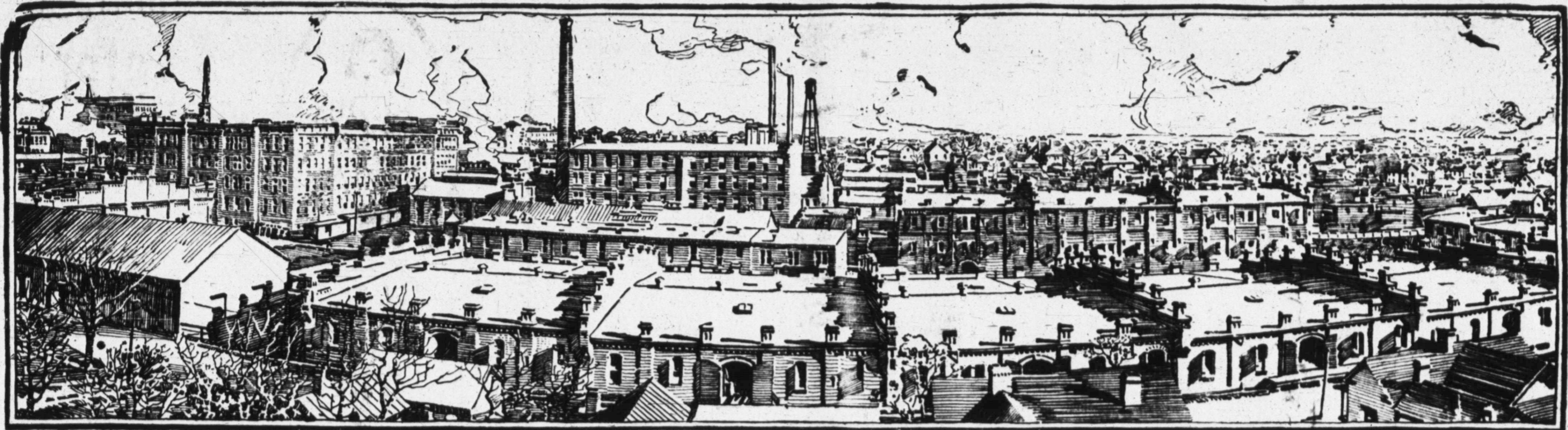

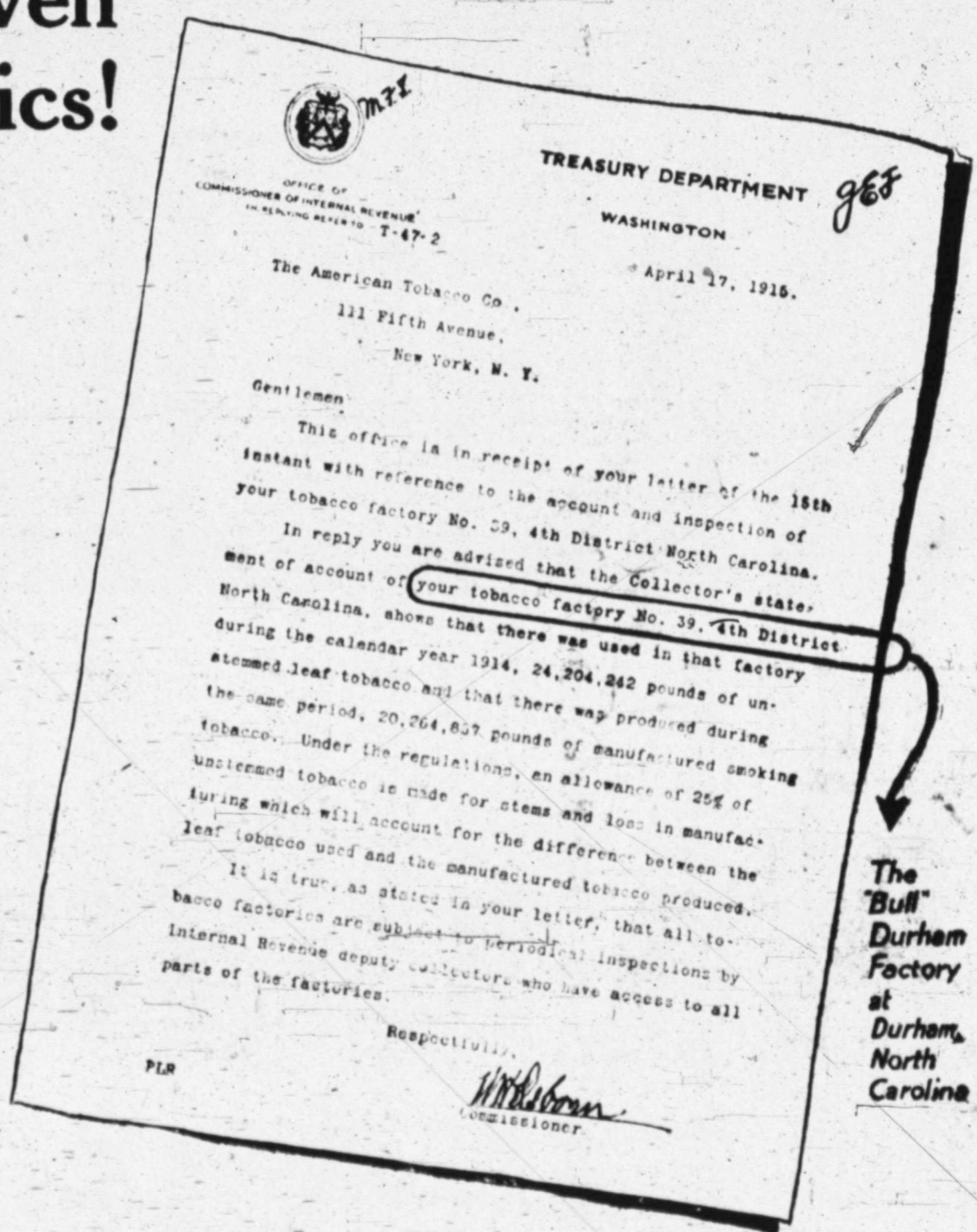

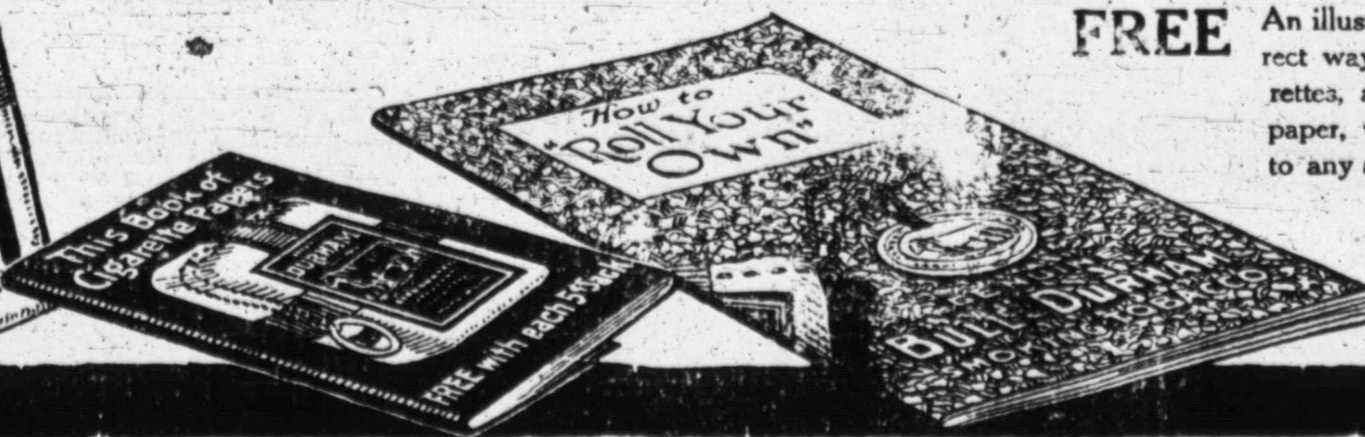

The wheat market closed unsettled, a shade to 7-8 decline with May at 1.12 1/8 and July 1.12 1/4.

New York Cotton. New York, April 24.—The cotton market was active and unsettled during today's early trading. The opening was barely steady at a decline of 7 to 11 points. Uneasiness over political conditions doubtless contributed to the nervousness of the market. May advanced from 11.76 to 11.78, July from 11.90 to 11.96 and October from 12.10 to 12.16.
