Caffey Attends School Meeting

The Mid Winter Conference of the School Administrators of Texas was held in Austin, Texas January 5 and 6, 1950. The local school was represented by Supt. Dalton Caffey. The program of this confer-

ence was divided between the new State Board of Education. The State Dept. of Education. Directed by Dr. L. A. Woods, and The Foundation School Program directed by L. P. Sturgeon. The Thursday Morning session dealt with the progress and status of Education in the State of Texas. Thursday evening session dealt with the problems of the Minimum Foundation Pro-gram in the state. One of the high lights of this program was the fact that the Foundation school program directors have arrived at the actual cost of educating a child in the state for one day. This average amount is .93 cents per day, bringing that down to the Friona Schools we can readily see that since we qualify for financial assistance from the Foundation fund on a

casis of Average daily attendance, every day a child is absent from school, our school losses 93 cents and the tax payer has to dig down in his pocket and produce that much revenue. The Friday sessions dealt with adjustments in education, and plans for improvement in






