Poll: Security more valuable than liberty

Americans skeptical of the federal government's effectiveness and resentful of its reach. But the 1,009 adults polled Friday Tuesday through give widespread support to broader government powers for domestic security investigations:

 58 percent support government power to quickly expel any foreigner suspected of planning terrorism, even a person who committed no crime.

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



Despite truce, tensions mount **between factions**

ZAGREB, Croatia (AP) - Ballet dancers and children were among the nearly 200 people wounded after Serb rockets hit Zagreb for two straight days. Still, neither. Croats nor Serbs were backing down, even as a wider war loomed.

The Children's Hospital and a rehearsal room full of dancers were struck Wednesday when Serbs, avenging a surprise Croatian offensive this week, sent 11 surface-to-surface missiles hurtling into downtown Zagreb. Attacking the capital during

lunch "was intended with one sole, single purpose: to kill as many people as possible," said Peter Galbraith, the U.S. ambassador to Croatia..

The U.N. Security Council, meanwhile, warned Wednesday that Croat troops might be broadening their attacks, noting Croat incursions in eastern and southern Serb-held parts of the country.

U.N. spokesmen spoke of extreme tension in those areas. In addition, Croat troops have seized nine U.N. observation posts manned by Czech peacekeepers about 90 miles south of Zagreb.

Thousands of Serb civilians in lands recaptured by Croatia are to start leaving today if they wish, and hundreds of Serb soldiers are to surrender their weapons today to U.N. peace-

The United Nations, however, has only a verbal promise of a truce, and leaders on both sides

are talking retaliation. **Croatian President Franjo** Tudjman warned Serbs will have to stay in territory taken this week if there are more deadly missile attacks on Zagreb.

One policeman was killed Wednesday and 64 people, including 21 rehearsing ballet dancers, were injured when 11 missiles hit. A day earlier, five people died and 121 were wounded.

"If such a criminal attack is conducted only once again, Croatia will undertake most decisive steps," Tudjman announced on national television Wednesday night.

Croatian Serb leader Milan Martic admitted that "we have avenged dead Serb civilians by bombing Croatian cities," and threatened to attack Zagreb again if the Croats strike at Serbs.

Martic spoke before holding talks on cooperation with his Serb counterpart in Bosnia, Radovan Karadzic. The two leaders were expected in Knin today, Serb sources said, a move that may indicate the separate Serb rebellions in Bosnia and Croatia could merge into one war.





Jury system blind about justice

This hasn't been a very good period for those who believe that there is something sacred about the American jury system.

In the O.J. Simpson trial, another juror has been tossed out for violating the judge's instructions on how they should behave.

rate jurors are being replaced, Judge Lance Ito could run out of warm bodies before the trial is over, and they'll have to start over again. If that happens, even animal lovers will begin hating the legendary barking dog.

Also in California, another judge just blew his cork when he learned that jurors in the trial of Heidi Fleiss, the enterprising young woman who provided horny guys with female companions, made up their own rules.

To get the case over and go home - the primary goal of most juries -- some of the Fleiss jurors have admitted swapping votes and voting guilty when they thought Fleiss was innocent. So this trial might have to be repeated.

But the most educational insight into how juries operate was provided in Chicago by a juror in the original trial of three men for the rape-murder of Jeanine Nicarico, a Chicagoarea child.

Two of the men, Rolando Cruz and Alejandro Hernandez, were convicted and sentenced to die. The jury couldn't decide on the third man, and charges against him were dropped. After 12 years, the case is

still bouncing around the courts. It's a legal mess, and third trials are going to be held.

And after 12 years, this is

what the juror had to say about rationalized this in my decihis deliberations in a message he posted on a computer bulletin board where a discussion of the case was being held:

"My group was the first to find two of the three-guilty. ... I was never totally satisfied (even while we were deliberating) that Cruz and Hernandez were the culprits.

"All I could hope for was that the truth would eventually come out during the appeal process, because even though I voted to convict the two, I was far from convinced that Cruz and Hernandez were really guilty and I knew I would never had voted to give them the death penalty based on the 'evidence' heard at the time.

"Most of the jurors felt that the authorities would not have arrested the three if they did not commit the crime. Most of the jurors were convinced of the guilt before the trial started and the procedure was a mere formality.

"The first day of the trial ... the person who was ultimately selected as jury foreman said, Well, these guys are here, so they must be guilty of something.

"... If I had had more guts, I would have followed what I really believed, which was that there was not enough quality evidence to send Cruz and Hernandez to the electric chair.

"... I voted to convict only because I did not want to be the only juror who would hold out. Actually there might have been two or three more jurors

... who were not convinced. However, the pressure of the situation was something that is hard to describe.

"During the course of the trial, I kept thinking that it would end in a 'Perry Mason' type of ending, where the guilty person would just come forward and admit to the crime.

"When this did not happen, I got sick to my stomach.

"Again, I felt I could live with myself knowing that sooner or later the real person or persons would be found, and I

flatly admits voting to convict two men he thought had not been proved guilty. Why?

"I live in DuPage County, have a family in the county, and I felt I did not want to be the person who would go down in history as the one who let ... murderers go free. I really felt that the appeal process would ultimately get to the truth." If that shocks you, it should-

n't. Most trial lawyers will tell you this kind of wishy-washy thinking goes on in most juries. The lawyers don't mind. They don't want jurors who are a threat to think clearly and with total fairness. They prefer people who can be swayed and prodded.

That's why jury selection is often a demonstration in the dumbing down of the legal system. Anyone with an impressive education, a high I.Q. or a professional job is usually given the boot. Just the other day, a high-ranking White House official was called for jury duty. The lawyers rejected her.

And that's why people often get angry at the wrong people when they read about a woman being awarded more than \$1 million because she had spilled her hot coffee on her lap. It was a jury of allegedly average people who decided that a person is not responsible for her coffee and her lap.

Back in the simpler times when a jury of farm neighbors would decide on which pig farmer owned a stray pig, the jury system might have worked.

But today, with civil and criminal trials becoming more complex, jurors can't absorb all the information. Especially when the brightest people are shunned.

There has to be a better system. But I can say that because I'm not a lawyer with a high regard for stupidity.

'Stroke Belt' snaps its buckle

DALLAS (AP) - Now that new research has shown the South no longer is the nation's "Stroke Belt," researchers want to determine the reason for the phenomenon.

For decades, Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas showed the densest concentration of areas reporting fatal strokes.

But the May issue of the **American Heart Association** Stroke contains journal research that shows that as stroke mortality rates have declined nationwide, the Stroke Belt has disintegrated.

Two leading neurologists -Dr. Michael Moskowitz and Dr. Lewis Caplan — said they are not surprised by the findings and are encouraged that the researchers now plan to search for the patterns behind the geographical trends.

"The cluster may have disappeared, but stroke is still the No. 3' cause of death in the nation," said Moskowitz, a neurology professor at Boston's Harvard School of Medicine. "The problem is a major one, just no more major (in the Southeast) than anywhere else."

Caplan speculated that better education, health care and economic development contributed to the death of the Stroke Belt.

"People are becoming far more aware of those factors that can lead to stroke," said Caplan, neurology chairman at the **Tufts University New England** Medical Center in Boston.

The new study was based on two years of computer analysis of all death certificates filed nationwide from 1962 to 1988. Comparisons were drawn from year to year, region to region and people to people.

For example, for black women, 72 percent of the Stroke Belt regions were among the riskiest 20 percent nationwide in 1962.

The patterns were similar for other ethnic and gender groups. The explanation is anybody's

guess, the top researcher said. "There are no clear and easy answers to that," said Michele

Casper, an epidemiologist with the national Centers for Disease **Control and Prevention in** Atlanta.

"They (high-risk individuals)

may be moving out the area. Lower stroke risk people may be moving into the area. The findings come together in a whole constellation of issues,' she said Wednesday.

Since the 1950s, researchers had found high stroke-related death rates to be most densely concentrated in the Southeast, between the Appalachians and the Atlantic.

Theories had varied on the reasons, from the inadequate levels of the trace element selenium in the soil to soft water and the muggy climate.

But since the trends were similar for black and white men and women in the Southeast, no dietary or socioeconomic conclusions have ever been drawn for the Stroke Belt's existence, Dr. Casper said.

There still haven't been conclusions made. But the study raises new questions, she said. The most compelling is: What happened to the Stroke Belt? Researchers suggest the economic development of the South

Weary rescuers close to ending search for Oklahoma bombing victims

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) -Bone-weary after a frustrating two weeks of work, crews are close to ending the search for bodies in the ruins of the bombed federal building.

When they leave, relatives of the victims will be allowed to have a last, private remembrance at the site.

Hormone may help AIDS-related condition

NEW YORK (AP) - A hormone found in pregnant women may be useful for treating Kaposi's sarcoma, an AIDSrelated condition that causes disfiguring skin lesions.

The hormone killed Kaposi's sarcoma cells in the laboratory, and in mice it shrank tumors caused by injections of Kaposi's sarcoma cells, Dr. Robert Gallo said.

Gallo, chief of the Laboratory of Tumor Cell Biology at the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md., reports a series of experiments in Thursday's issue of the journal Nature with colleague Dr. Yanto Lunardi-Iskandar and others at the National Institutes of Health and elsewhere.

Kaposi's sarcoma, once seen mainly in elderly men, now appears most frequently in homosexual men infected with the AIDS virus, affecting more than 30 percent of them in the United States. Researchers don't know why gay men are more

likely to get Kaposi's.

Senate rejects changes to handgun legislation

AUSTIN (AP) — Legislation to allow Texans to carry concealed guns is ricocheting toward a conference committee after the Senate rejected numerous changes made by the House.

In voting Wednesday to send the bill to a special negotiating panel to resolve those differences, senators also overwhelmingly rejected a move to require a voter referendum on the question.

"You do not have arbitrary popularity votes on fundamental elements of the U.S. and Texas constitutions," said Sen. Jerry Patterson, R-Pasadena, the bill's author.

He called the ballot requirement added by the House "a cruel hoax on the voters." The referendum would not affect the bill's implementation and would be held on Nov. 7, even though the new law is scheduled to take

the Legislature.

The vote would be "kind of a silly, nonbinding referendum that would occur two months after the effective date of the bill," Patterson said.

"The voters are of the opinion that what was added in the House gives them a say in the matter, and it doesn't," he said. "I don't want to be a part of having that egg on my face."

Sen. John Leedom, R-Dallas, sought to order Senate negotiators to agree to the voter referendum.

"There's been an impression that everybody thinks it's a good idea (to allow concealed guns). It isn't," Leedom said.

"If we trust the people, even if (a referendum) doesn't bind us at that moment, it gives us direction for the future," he said.

But the Senate disagreed, defeating his motion 23-8.

An effort to delay the bill's effective date until after a referendum also failed.

In addition, senators rejected a bid by Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Houston, to accept a House proposal requiring 15 to 30 hours of training before obtaining a permit. The Senate bill called for 10 to 15 hours, and Patterson said the cost of extra instruction "makes this a rich man's privilege."

Patterson and four other senators will serve on the negotiating committee.

Under the pending legislation, Texans would be eligible for a concealed handgun permit if they meet certain requirements, including: being a legal resident for the six months preceding their application; age 21 or older; have never been convicted of a felony; and not chemically dependent or of unsound mind.

Means testing plan dusted off

WASHINGTON (AP) - People who earn more than \$100,000 from off-farm activities will have to make do without government farm payments, if the Clinton administration has its wav.

Although no formal announcement has been made, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said Wednesday he expects an income cap to be part of the administration's recommendations next week for the 1995 farm bill.

If the proposal sounds familiar, it should. Clinton tried it in 1993. So did the Republican Bush administration the year before and bipartisan farm pro-

Speaker Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, has blocked out three days for the House to debate the measure. He earlier sent a memo to lawmakers detailing deadlines that must be met so the education bill can be completed before the regular session ends on May 29.

"As you can see from the schedule, there remains a great deal of work to be done in very little time," he said.

TEA drawn into school battle

EL PASO (AP) - The Texas Education Agency has again been pulled into a management dispute involving the El Paso school district.

TEA auditors visited the El Paso Independent School District this week to intervene in a equitable treatment under the quarrel fueled by a trustee's accusations that the superintendent has spent thousands on expensive dinners and other questionable expenses. This is in addition to an even older complaint that board members are interfering with school administrators, a contentious issue that surfaced last year and forced the agency to step in to mediate. James Vasquez, a top TEA administrator who made the trip, said that of the approximately 300 annual complaints from from the state's 1,000 districts, about 10 to 15 percent are related to governance problems in El Paso. "It seems disproportional," Vasquez said.

AUSTIN (AP) - A former state employee who was fired after reporting alleged wrongdoing at his agency would receive a \$5 million settlement under legislation approved by a House committee.

But George Green, who has been battling since 1991 to collect a \$13.5 million court judgment awarded to him, condemned the offer and said he would not accept.

"We came here and we were not swinging the bats well, but we got going. This is the kind of place where some of our guys like to hit," Houston manager Terry Collins said.





FISHING

Fishing activity continues to improve on Lake O.H. Ivie, with reports of nice catches of white bass, crappie and black bass reported.

White bass fishing was classified as good-to-excellent along the points, flats and sandy shorelines as well as in the main lake. Some nice stringers of whites up to 1-3/4 pounds were reported using small spinners and crank baits. The best fishing came at depths up to 20 feet and came while casting or trolling. Crappie fishermen on Ivie reported good activity at depths up to 20 feet. Best fishing for crappie came in the main lake as well as around brushy areas and coves using both minnows and jigs.



Loyola also wrote about his siblings and included a picture of himself sitting in his room next to a portable stereo.

"He's a cute little guy," said Amy's mother, Linda.

In September, a 14-year-old New Jersey girl joined five of her friends in attaching their names to a note that was bottled and heaved into the Atlantic Ocean off Cape Hatteras, N.C. Last month, she received a reply from an 11year-old boy in northwest France

WACO - Remember the shy kid who never talked to anyone on the playground? Or the bossy girl everybody hated?

For most children, friendships usually come naturally, but some children never quite catch on to the art of making friends.

This inability to make friends may stem from personality types, said Kristi SoRelle, a clinical social worker with Waco **Psychological Associates.** For example, children who talk too much or too loudly often have trouble making friends.

On the opposite end of the spectrum, children who don't talk enough or are socially withdrawn may have trouble making friends. These children are often mistaken for being snobs, said SoRelle.

Parents may really have to watch children who are meek because they may be drawn into negative activities because they don't feel comfortable speaking up for themselves, she said. They may lose their own sense of self in relationships with other people.

Members of the "in crowd" also have certain characteristics, according to Richard Lavoie, executive director of **Riverview School in East** Sandwich, Mass. They include:

"As you look at the risk versus benefits ratio, it probably tips toward allowing people to contract the illness naturally" instead of giving the vaccine, says Dr. Richard Young, chief of pediatrics at the Hospital of St. Raphael in New Haven, Conn.

Young sees some beneficial uses for the vaccine against the contagious disease whose most pronounced symptom is blisterlike eruptions on the skin.

"I would say that an adult who has no (history of chickenpox) should get it," he says.
