



Heavy Infestation **Insects Indicated** In A & M Reports

County Agent Joe W. Jones states that Guy E. Carpenter, Associate County-Agent - Entomo- termined. logy, has released a statement that indications point toward a heavy infestation of insects for the year 1950. This is mainly due to a mild winter and a large number of overwintering eggs and adult insects. Whether this infestatioin materializes depends to a great extent on weather conditions, especially moisture.

This is not meant to alarm farmers, but to alert them so that if insects do appear, the proper control methods may be applied before too much damage is done.





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
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
