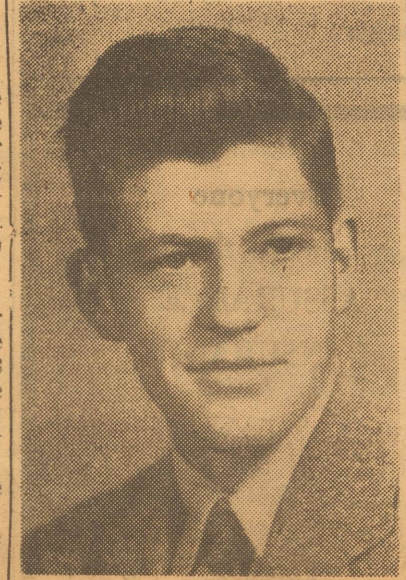

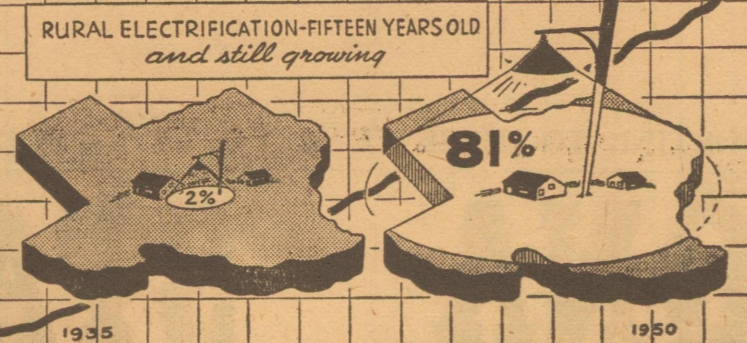

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Rural Electrification Administration Observes Its 15th Anniversary

May 11 is an important anniversary for Texas farmers. For on that date in 1935 President Roosevelt ordered the establishment of the Rural Electrification Administration, and such previously indispensable rural gadgets as the coal oil lamp, the wood cookstove, and the old-fashioned washboard were on their way into oblivion.

In 1935 only 2 per cent of rural homes in Texas had electricity, while today 81 per cent of Texas farms and ranches put electricity to more than 300 different uses. Texas' 77 rural electric co-ops now serve more than 256,000 rural homes over 104,000 miles of wire, enough to reach four times around the world.

Texas has been a leader in the rural electrification program from the start. The first rural power lines in the country built with money borrowed from the government were energized by the Bartlett Electric Cooperative at Bartlett, Texas, in March, 1936.

Rural power lines spread rather slowly over the state for the first few years. REA provided nothing except technical advice, guidance, and loans to be paid back with interest. Rural people talked it over, organized co-ops, and built more and more power lines as it became apparent that the co-ops were financially practical and would be able to pay-back their loans to REA.

Then came the war and rural power lines were built even more

rapidly, for the government realized that rural electrification would have to play a vital role in wartime production of food, replacing the farmers' sons and hired hands who went to war. Rural electric co-ops were given high priorities for construction materials, and the war effort benefitted from the resulting increase in food production.

But rural electrification in Texas is past the stage where the accent is on the extension of lines. It is developing to a point which will create a new problem, arising from an increased farm use of power to create income. In December of 1941, the average power use per farm for that month was 45 kilowatt-hours. In December of 1949, it was 90 kilowatt-hours. The national average is 141 kw. This constantly increased demand for power on the farm eventually is expected to throw an additional strain on Texas' power sources. Even now many suppliers are nearing the limit of their capacity to produce dependable service. Co-op leaders are hoping for new dams to provide more hydroelectric power to meet the increased demand.

Texas' 77 rural electric co-ops now have a monetary value of more than \$125 million. They are owned and controlled by the rural families they serve, and each of them is repaying its loan to the federal government on or ahead of schedule.

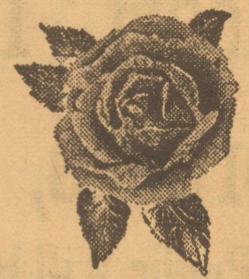

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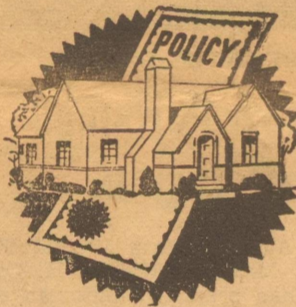

Organized Reservists Will Have 15 Days Of Intensive Training

An estimated 2,000 officers and enlisted men of the Army's Reserve Corps throughout the state of Texas, will take 15 days of intensive training at field camps between May 28th and August 26th, 1950.

Organized Reserve Corps units will train near home stations wherever possible, except for certain highly technical groups according to Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of the Texas Military District. Current status of units will determine the type of field training offered.

The training objectives at the encampments will have four major objectives: (1) to afford maximum practical training of units on subjects which cannot be covered adequately in Reserve duty training assemblies; (2) to provide practical staff experience to all echelons; (3) to offer planning and supervisory training for all echelons, and (4) to familiarize Reserve components with new techniques developments, doctrines and organization.

Organized Reserve Corps commanders and their staffs will have a part in preparing training programs for their own units. All plans will be coordinated with commanders of installations where training will take place. These commanders will assist the Reservists with demonstrations, technical advice and logistical support.

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Former Frionian To Receive Honorary Degree At Abilene

President Floyd Golden Becomes Doctor of Laws In May 29 Ceremony

President, Eastern New Mexico University at Portales

President Floyd D. Golden of Eastern New Mexico University will be honored by Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas, when it confers upon him a doctor of laws degree May 29 according to an announcement made today by Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, the president. President Golden, who has been president of EMNU since 1941, has been an educational leader in the Southwest since 1920 when he became principal and then superintendent of the Friona, Texas, public schools. After serving as an administrator in the schools of White Deer and Miami, Texas, President Golden became superintendent of schools of Portales in 1928.

When Eastern New Mexico University opened in 1934, he became the first dean, a position he held until he became the second president of the institution in 1941. Under his leadership, the University has grown from a junior college to a university offering both the bachelor and master degrees. The physical plant has increased in valuation from less than a hundred thousand dollars to approximately four million.

Not only is President Golden an educational leader, but also is prominent in the life of his community and state. He is a past district governor of Rotary International and has served in many executive positions in educational organizations.

Other degrees held by President Golden are the bachelor of sciences, West Texas State College, Canyon, and the master of arts, University of Colorado. In addition President Golden has studied at Colorado State College of Education, Greeley, Colubia University, New York City, and the University of Texas.
