Tukes Feed to Monve Whited Coll
According to Ray w. Snyder, neat speciaist of we tondo and ranchers should start nomer feed calves for home slaughter, for there is no magic in cernte that will change a scrubby, imma ture, rough and rangy cals tato chotee beef. Tender, Julcy, tasty neat comes only from high quallt animals that weigh from 500 to 300 pounds and to get such a fintst a caif should be fed at least 20 to 150 days.
A ralf that has had milk and ood grazing will be acceptable, out can be much improved by feed feed calves oats, shetled is to milo before weaning. To a weaned calf in a dry lot supply all the hay it wilh eat, all the fattening feeds such as shelled coarn, crushed ear corn or millo heads it wit eat without gcouring, and 1 to $11 /$ pounds per day of cotton seed meal or a limited amount of cottonseed, not to exceed $21 / 2$ pounds dally. At the start a call will consume about 2 pounds of grain
per day, and this will gradually per day, and this will gradually
increase, to 10 or 12 pounds per incre
day.
A beef-bred antmal should be fattened ir possibe it yelde more chotce, thick muscles than ${ }^{n}$ through the lean muscles, therebs Increasint tenderness : ylelds superlor white, crisp fat, and the lean muscles are a bright, attrac tive red color. Select a deep, thlek, compnetly built calf in preference to a rough rangy one, because the former whly carry more natural deshing and will fatten more unlormly. Fatten the best animal is steer or helfer. Helfers fatten a little quicker, but few people can tell the difference in the carasses. Always select for kilutne that is losing weight.
